Prof. E. L. Harvey Gave
Address on India and
Its People — Met at
University.

Last night the fifty-fourth meeting of the Fredericton Science Club was held in the University, entertained by Mrs. John Stephens and Mrs. C. C. Jones. In spite of competition of rival attractions the attendance was very large, about forty-five members and guests being present.

The next being the annual meeting the president, W. E. McMullen, who occupied the chair, appointed the following as nominating committee, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Babbitt, Mr. and Mrs. Lebaron Bull, and Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Lister.

Prof. Harvey's Address
The chairman then introduced Prof. E. L. Harvey, the speaker of the evening, who had chosen as his subject title, "Wayfaring in India". Prof. Harvey said that the reason for this was that he had been very lucky in the scenic quality and variety of the various stations to which he had been sent by the army in India, during the war.

Odorous Bombay was his landing place and he described, in his tour, a host of places with most unpronounceable, and more unspellable, names. Discussion of varied religions, architectural criticism, with illustrations—agricultural methods and various historical side-lights gave a most fascinating sparkle and variety to the talk.

Particularly delightful were some views of the Taj Mahal, reputed the most beautiful structure in all India. It is a mausoleum erected at Agra by Shah Jehan in honour of his favorite wife. He invited contributions from all the sovereigns of the world for its erection and the Pope sent architects and cunning craftsmen to assist. Queen Elizabeth, then reigning in England, sent amber and jewels.

At the conclusion of the lecture, an unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the speaker. Delicious refreshments brought to a close the first meeting of this winter season, the full attendance showing that interest in the club's work is by no means on the wane.

DOUBLE-HORNED
MOOSEHEAD WILL
COME THIS WAY

Department of Lands
and Mines Has Pur-
chased the Freak—
Will be Mounted
Here.

The Department of Lands and Mines of New Brunswick has purchased the freak moosehead which was obtained in Charlotte County, the feature of which is the double set of horns. Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon this morning upon learning of the killing of the double-horned moose, placed before the Minister, Hon. C. D. Richards the proposal to buy the head for the Province. Hon. Mr. Richards approved at once and the Chief Warden got in touch by telephone with Hon. Dr. Taylor at St. George, and secured his good offices in purchasing the head.

Owner Parted With Head.
Hon. Dr. Taylor found that Charles Lee who had shot the animal had partially closed with an American for the sale of the head but upon learning that the Province desired the trophy he accepted the offer of the Chief Game Warden.

The head will be shipped by express from St. Andrew's probably tonight and will be mounted here by G. A. Davis for the Department.

On One Root.
The description given to Chief Game Warden Gagnon differs in some detail from that contained in the press. Mr. Lee who shot the animal stated that the horns seemed to grow from the one root but branched a few inches from the head into two sets of blades.

This freak trophy is expected to attract great attention from naturalists, observers of wild life and others.

The man who killed the animal lives some nine miles out of Saint Andrew's.

RECORD PRICE
FOR TIMBER BERTH
WAS BID TODAY

Luther B. Smith of Saint
John Paid \$750 Per
Mile After Keen Bid-
ding Against C. E.
Clowes.

A record price for a timber berth was bid at noon today at the Crown Land Office when Luther B. Smith of Saint John was the successful bidder for two square miles on south side Nerepis Road south of Mersereau stream at \$750 per mile. The applicant for this berth was Charles E. Clowes of Fredericton. The applicant and Mr. Smith appeared in person and the bidding between the two was of the keenest.

Mr. Smith already holds considerable areas of lands in that vicinity which probably had much to do with the high price which he paid for this particular berth.

Good Prices For Others.
High prices were bid also for two other berths, offered but the prices did not come near the price bid by Mr. Smith. The upset price in each case was twenty dollars per mile.

Two square miles between Maguadavic Lake and Northwest Oromocto Lake were bid in by Clark & Sullivan of Lawrence Station, Charlotte County, for \$130 per mile. The applicant was James O. B. Vail.

Three square miles on south branch of Six Mile Brook, Cain's River, were bid in by Fraser Companies Limited for \$80 per mile. Everett Kervin was applicant.
