A NEW GOVERNOR FOR SYRIA

INDIA HAS NEW MEANS OF SECURITY

Railway Through the Kyber Pass Has Been Opened.

TRIUMPH FOR ENGINEERS

Work on Road Has Been Going On for Five Years.

(Special to the DAILY MAIL by the British United Press) London, Nov. 2—A great railroad through the Khyber Pass giving India a new measure of security, was opened today after five years effort by the British engineers and thousands of native workers. The Khyber pass has been the gateway to Hindustan for invaders bent on plunder or destruction since the days of Alexander and Great. Now India is in a position to throw troops quickly into the Pass to hinder fresh invasions.

WALES TO REST BUT PREPARES FOR HUNTING

London, Oct. 31—The Prince of Wales lost no time after his return from South America in rushing down to Crauen Lodge in the famous Melton Mowbray hunting country, to look at the horses which he will ride this season. He spent one night there this week, returning to London.

There has been competition among American hostesses here for the honor of giving a dinner and dance for the Prince. In view of the fact that he has decided to reduce his social activities to a minimum until he is thoroughly rested, most of them are likely to be disappointed.

The Prince has succeeded in obtaining a postponement of the scheduled Guildhall banquet tendered to him by the City Fathers but it is likely that he will accept an invitation to a banquet in his honor by the Latin-American Society at the Savoy in the near future.

THREATENING FIRE SATURDAY AT OROMOCTO

(Special To The Mail.) Oromocto, Nov. 2—A large building owned by The River Valley Lumber Co., at Oromocto was destroyed by fire Saturday evening with a loss of about \$2,000 with some insurance. The building was used as a cook-house. Two dwellings intervened between the burning building and the residence of R. B. Smith, ex-M. P. P. Had they burned his house would have gone also. Fortunately the fire was checked there.

SERIOUS FIRE AT WOODSTOCK

Woodstock, Nov. 1—Fire Saturday destroyed the barn and stables of R. E. Hamilton. Starting in the office maintained at the rear of the stable, the fire had gained a good start before the blaze was discovered by the caretaker. Four highly bred races horses, owned by Fred Cameron, Fredericton; William Robertson, Upper Woodstock, and Mr Hamilton, and valued at \$4,000, were saved. The loss was estimated at \$3,500, covered by insurance.

A MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE PASSES AWAY

J. M. Flewelling Died Yesterday in a Montreal Hospital.

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE

Had Been Active in Public Life for Several Years.

St. Stephen, N. B., Nov. 1—John Medley Flewelling, member-elect of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick, died yesterday at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, where a few days ago he underwent an operation. He had been ill for several months and had been to Montreal for treatment a few months ago.

The community was greatly shocked at the news that Mr. Flewelling had passed away at 6 o'clock. Only in the noon mail had come letters to relatives and friends here stating that the operation, the second he underwent during his illness, had been thought to be successful and everything looked brighter than ever before for his recovery.

About 4 o'clock a telegram came for his sister, Miss Jean Flewelling, R. N., stating that he was critically ill and asking her to go to Montreal. She and her brother, Emery, left on last night's Montreal train, but did not reach there in time. Mrs. Flewelling had accompanied her husband to Montreal and was with him at the time of his death.

Born at Woodstock.

John Medley Flewelling was born at Woodstock, N. B., June 23, 1879, a son of Rev. J. E. and Mrs. Flewelling. He was educated at Centre ville, N. B. and in June, 1908 was married to Sarah J. McVay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McVay, of this town. Mr. Flewelling came here about 16 years ago and went into the insurance, real estate and brokerage business, in which, with his genial personality and his ability, he worked up a large business.

In 1920 he was elected to the Legislative Assembly as one of the Conservative representatives for Charlotte. Again on August 10, 1925, he was elected, although sickness prevented him from campaigning or taking any part in election. He scored a large majority and was to represent the new constituency of St. Stephen-Miltown.

For Others' Good

Mr. Flewelling was a man ever looking after the interests of his town and country, always putting the interests of others ahead of himself. He was a great giver to all deserving objects and this town and country has lost one of its best citizens, while the Province of New Brunswick loses one of its most valued legislators.

He was a past president of the St. Stephen-Miltown Rotary Club. A member of Masonic Lodge, also of the St. Andrew's Society, a director of the St. Stephen Agriculture Society and a member of the Fredericton City Club and other societies.

Surviving Relatives

Besides his wife, he leaves one daughter, Jean, two young sons, Joseph and John, his father, Rev. J. E. Flewelling, and several brothers and sisters. Miss Jena Flewelling, R. N., of this town, is a sister, and Sterling of Dufferin, is a brother. Emery, another brother from the West, is also here, having come last week to see his zrother. Mrs. J. G. McNally of Fredericton is another sister. The body will arrive at St. Stephen tomorrow noon. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

The Prince of Wales Has Ruled Against Modern Feminity

Gives Opinion on the Close Cropped, Cigarette Smoking, Mannish Girl—Declares This Type Does Not Appeal to Him—A Specification of the Future Princess of Wales.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Nov. 2—The Prince of Wales has ruled against modern cropped feminity in less mannish women.

He confided his secret judgment to a woman and the secret has met the usual fate after circulating confidentially in South Africa societies since the Prince departed for Southampton.

A prominent woman asked the Prince what he thought of the modern girl. "If you mean" Wales replied, "the close cropped, cigarette smoking, mannishly dressed noisy girl one frequently sees in all countries, then I must confess that the modern girl does not appeal to me in the slightest."

CONFESSED THAT HE DROVE A DEATH CAR

Philadelphia, Oct. 2—Fred Thrope, negro chauffeur, confessed last night that he was the driver of the motor car that ran down and killed Isador Herman, his wife and daughter in West Philadelphia Sunday night. A charge of manslaughter was lodged against him.

The negro said he was speeding at the time. "I knew I had struck something," he told the detectives in his cell, "but didn't know what it was. At first I thought it was a horse and stepped on the gas and kept on going. Then I drove to the center of the city, where I saw that the wheels of the car were splattered with blood. This frightened me and I decided to abandon the cah."

Thrope sent for his former employer, Maurice Haimowich, owner of the death car, shortly before midnight and made his statement before him and a number of detectives.

CONVICTS IN SING SING HAVE RADIO

Receiving Sets Have Been Installed in the Death House.

SIXTEEN MEN AWAIT DEATH

Are Allowed to Listen in on Band Concerts, Etc.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 2—Radio has been installed in Sing Sing's death house it is learned. Evenings between 7 and 930 condemned men awaiting the electric chair hear orchestra music, band concerts, vocal selections and talks by comedians.

They are not however, permitted to listen in with other prisoners on lecture debates and reports of athletic contests. Warden Lawes said. Sixteen men are in the death cells now.

BIG DOINGS IN 1928 SAYS REV. MR. MCGREGOR

Says Bible Foretells a Great Religious War Within Three Years—Quotes Prophecies in Support.

An audience which just about filled the Opera House heard Rev. J. B. McGregor Sunday night after the regular church services in an address in which he interpreted prophecies made in various parts of the scriptures and appealed for preparation for the second coming of the Saviour.

Religious Conflict.

The seaker forecasts a great religious conflict to break out within three years. The reference in Revelations to the red horse ridden by him in whose hands lay power of war and death and said meant this great struggle. At one time he had thought the reference was to Bolshevism or to the struggle between Labor and Capital but a closer perusal of the prophecies had made him believe otherwise. The war would begin with a city which had power over the kings of the earth. He would not mention the city but his hearers might know which it was. The Ecumenical Conference was to be held in it in 1928 and about that time he expected the great religious war to begin.

Further Interpretation.

Further interpretation of prophecies were made by the speaker who quoted from Hosea, Ezekiel and Daniel. The age of railway development, the invention of the motor-vehicle and the capture of Jerusalem by General Allenby all were events foretold in Scripture as coming before the great religious war.

Rev. Mr. McGregor made an appeal to his hearers to prepare themselves for the coming of the Saviour which would follow the war but at a time which no one knew.

Elder Jacques of the Pentecostal Society took part in the meeting. Rev. Mr. McGregor has preached at the Reformed Baptist Church in this city and elsewhere in this vicinity.

Boys Smashed Windows

TWO KILLED WHEN PLANE CAME DOWN

Deaf Mute Had Hoped to Recover His Hearing.

WAS MAKING FIRST FLIGHT

5000 Spectators Saw the Machine Crash Down.

Independence, Kansas, Nov. 2—Deaf and dumb since birth Paul Gibson aged 25, saw an article in a newspaper telling how a man recovered his hearing after taking a ride in an airplane.

Clutching this faint hope Gibson engaged R. R. Caulkins, 23 of Parsons Kansas, a pilot for the experiment yesterday. When the plane reached an altitude of approximately 5,000 feet spectators saw one wing collapse and the ship crashed to earth. Both men wer instantly killed.

CHESTNUTS ARE SCARCE

Itaca, N. Y., Nov. 2—The chestnut as an American delicacy is facing extinction. Plant pathologists and foresters at Cornell University say the reason is a serious blight communicated from tree to tree by the wind, a contamination which has been unhampered during the last 20 years.

The disease, which these pathologists describe as incurable, makes the situation more serious. The blight was first discovered in a Brooklyn park in 1904, but it was not until two years ago that it was discovered in other parts of the country.

NEW FURNITURE FAD IN EUROPE

London, Nov. 2—Lacquered furniture has become very popular among society people. A suite of this kind of furniture for the bedroom has just been completed for the Queen of Spain, in a subtle shade of blue. Princess Mary Lascelles is having the exsoldiers at Lord Roberts Workshops turn out a bedroom suite for her new home, Egerton Lodge, at Newmarket. The ground tone is of old ivory with colorings in reds, blues and greens intermixed.

TIE VOTE IN QUEEN'S, P.E.I.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 1—The result in Queens, where Hon. John E. Sinclair, Minister without portfolio, and two Conservative candidates, D. McKinnon and John Messervey, are running neck and neck for the second seat, will remain in doubt until after declaration day, Nov. 10, when he ballot boxes will be opened and the votes, it is anticipated, recounted.

The Charlottetown Guardian tonight claims that with the figures from 14 polls still to be rechecked, John Messervey, Conservative, is leading the minister by 26 votes. The figures collected by the telephone company show a dead heat between Sinclair and Messervey.

It is generally admitted that a recount only can decide the issue, but this cannot be conducted before declaration day.
