## THE LIBERAL CABINET MEETING AT OTTAWA TODAY TO TALK OVER THE POLITICAL SITUATION

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—Premier King meets his cabinet tomorrow afternoon to discuss his course of action. Expectation is that decision will be reached to remain in office and meet parliament. Conservatives who hold the strongest group are meanwhile adopting an attitude of watchful waiting.

Until Premier King announces his intentions, they decline to make any official pronouncement. At the same time the feeling among Conservatives is that Premier King would have no justification for such a course. They take the ground that the defeat of so many members of the cabinet coupled with the majorities recorded against government supporters is evidence that the government has lost the support of the country and should resign.

### Standing in House

With three constituencies still doubtful, Conservatives now hold 116 seats in the next house; Liberals, 100; Progressives, 23; Labor, two and Independent one.

After the cabinet meeting the Premier plans to report his decision to His Excellency the Governor-General, and consult with him regarding the course of the government.

It is expected that it will require more than one conference of the ministers to reach a final conclusion, both on the question of retention of office and the manner in which the administration might be reconstructed, so that it is probable that an announcement by the Prime Minister of the result of his interview with the Governor-General will not be made before Wednesday.

From conversation with those intimate with the mind of the administration, it is now a practical certainty that the King Government will not resign but retain office. Whatever the actual final figures on polling day there is no possibility of the Conservatives being in a better position than having a majority of fewer than 20 over the next largest group and of being about seven or eight short of a majority over all.

During the week-end there were many conferences and interviews on the part of both Liberals and Conservatives. The Prime Minister was in consultation with various advisers, and on Saturday there were many callers at Mr. Meighen's office in the Parliament buildings, notably Premier G. Howard Ferguson, of Ontario; Fred W. Bowen, who defeated Hon. Vincent Massey in Durham, and Col. T. Herbert Lennox, who defeated the Prime Minister in North York.

### Ministers in Town

In preparation for tomorrow's meeting of the cabinet a number of ministers have come to town during the week-end, including Hon. James A. Robb, Hon. E. M. MacDonald, Hon. James Murdock, Hon. Vincent Massey and Hon. T. A. Low. With the exception of Hon. Charles Stewart, of Alberta, and Hon. Dr. James H. King, of British Columbia, there will be a pretty full attendance of ministers.

As to the duration of the coming session of Parliament there are two features. One is the fact that there might be a strong temptation to avoid any early upsetting of the position, so that Parliament might sit the 50 days which are necessary to elapse before the members may draw their full indemnity of \$4,000. Another is that the Governor-General may not be persuaded that there is any political prospect of a change of feeling in the country sufficient to warrant another appeal to the people within a year. That point is dealt with in Mr. Ewart's statement. Still another point as to the calling of Parliament is that there is no legal compulsion upon the Government to call another session before June 27 of 1926, which is 12 months after the date of the last prorogation.

### Comment by Ewart

Comment upon the present extraordinary situation was made today by John S. Ewart, K. C. In a statement he claims that the logical course for the Prime Minister to pursue is to retain office. Then "should Mr. King decide to retain office," added Mr. Ewart, "he ought, in my opinion, to impose upon himself three conditions. First, he ought to summon parliament for the earliest possible date. Secondly, he ought, as far as possible, to refrain from committing the government to courses of action. Thirdly, he ought to refrain, as far as possible, from making appointments to office. Support in the House alone will supply him with freedom in these respects."

### Choice of Speaker

An early difficulty to be dealt with when parliament is called is that of

the choice of a speaker. It is probable that Mr. King will retain Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux in this position, but in any case there would have to be a re-election of Hon. Mr. Lemieux, which vote would probably constitute the first test of strength in the new House. It is within the power of His Excellency the Governor General, when the two Houses are assembled in the senate chamber, to hear the speech from the Throne, to refuse to accept that document until a speaker has been chosen. Under the present stressful circumstances such a prerogative might not be exercised, but it is a possibility.

A big task for Mr. King will be that of reforming his cabinet or rather finding substitutes for the Ontario ministers who were unseated, including himself. It is said in government circles that the Prime Minister may accept the offer of C. G. Powers and accept the representative of the sovereign exercises his own judgment.

"Mr. King and his advisers may think that by meeting parliament and think that by meeting parliament and being defeated on a serious measure they may secure a new chance to win a dependable majority in the House of Commons and secure a reversal of the judgment which condemned the government as a whole and the Prime Minister and a lot of his colleagues in a special manner.

### Loss of Confidence

"The loss of confidence indicated by the comparing the results of 1925 with those of the election of 1921 which put Mr. King in power has rarely been equalled in the record of peace period politics. It is anything but suggestive that another appeal in another general election would better the Liberal position. The course of wisdom for the Prime Minister would be to recognize that on his own appeal he lost the confidence of the country and resign. By such a course he will satisfy the country and his own party as well. By seeking to hang on he will only invite a severe rebuff and within a short time."

## CHARLOTTE CO. PEN WON THE EGG CONTEST

His Pen Produced 2221 Eggs in a Year — Mr. Steven of Hoyt Was a Good Second.

The hens taking part in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest produced only 261 eggs during the closing week. The Barred Rocks of A. T. Reid of Rollinsdam, winner of the contest 'ed' with 28, with those of Fred H. Ferguson of this city in second place with 23. The scores of the remaining pens ranged from 2 to 15.

As previously announced the contest was won by the Barred Rock pen of A. T. Reid of Rollinsdam, who takes the silver cup donated by W. H. Thorne & Co. Limited of St. John. This cup was won last year by Harry Patterson of Hoyt Station. Mr. M. McD. Steven of Hoyt Station was second with 2176 eggs and had the two highest birds in the contest with 280 and 281 eggs respectively. Fred H. Ferguson of this city finished sixth with a total of 1961 eggs.

The above includes the return of E. J. Garland, Progressive, in Bow River Alberta, and of G. Spence, Liberal, in Maple Creek, Sask., returns tonight indicating their election. This removes two seats from the doubtful column and leaves Queens, P. E. I.; Peace River, Alberta, and Kindersly, Sask., yet to be decided.

## Here and There

This year's receipts from motor vehicles licenses in New Brunswick already amount to \$422,000. This amount is larger than the total for any year, except last year when the gross receipts for the whole twelve months were \$452,489. The estimate for the present year is half a million.

The mines and quarries of the Province of Quebec produced to the value of \$18,952,896 during 1924, according to the final report issued by the Provincial Department of Mines. Building materials account for \$11,380,977; other non-metallic minerals \$7,191, and metallic minerals \$380,804.

"In the Cascades and falls of the Canadian Rockies there is enough hydro-electric power to supply the American west with all the electric energy it will need for ages to come," declared W. Paxton Little, treasurer of the Niagara Falls Power Company, who recently visited Banff with a party of distinguished American electrical magnates.

That the Province of Quebec abounds in historic and romantic material for the construction of popular novels, is the judgment of two popular writers—James Oliver Curwood, author of scores of best sellers, and Edwin Balmer, well-known short story writer—who have recently toured the province and Western Canada in quest of "local color."

There has been an unusual distinction conferred upon Prof. Camille Couture, a Montreal musician, who, besides being a violinist is also a maker of violins. He has been honored with a medal and diploma from the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley for a magnificent violin of his make, which he exhibited there.

In order to dispel the existing impression in England regarding the coldness of the Canadian climate, five thousand peony blooms are being distributed at the Canadian Pacific Railway Pavilion at the British Empire Exhibition. These plants were produced by W. Ormiston Roy, of Montreal, who states that peonies are the best landscape flower and can be grown in all parts of Canada, irrespective of climatic conditions.

Paris, France, Oct. 31.—That the Greco-Bulgar dispute will not endanger Europe's peace is the sentiment expressed today at the French foreign office. On the strength of Bulgaria's appeal for intervention by the league of nations Aristide Briand French foreign minister who is president of the league council has summoned it to meet in Paris next week to attempt a settlement of the Greco-Bulgarian dispute.

The Bulgarian government is withdrawing its troops from the border. Public opinion in Paris and official opinion are agreed in blaming Gen. Pangalos the Greek premier for the incident which it is believed is designed to serve his selfish interests. According to information from Athens the political situation in Greece has been going from bad to worse for weeks. The Greek people are tired of changes in the government, most of which are dictated by personal interests of the political and military leaders.

Recently a strong royalist movement began in Greece and in order to thwart it Gen. Pangalos decided to distract public opinion by a conflict with a disarmed neighbor.
