**THE THIRD DAY OF SCOPES TRIAL  
FINISHED AMID STORMY SCENES;  
MOTION TO QUASH INDICTMENT**

Dayton, Tenn., July 14—The third day of the Scopes' evolution trial ended amid stormy scenes here late this afternoon without the jury who will try the young school teacher having been sworn in and before Judge John T. Raulston had announced his decision on the defence motion to quash the indictment.

"It was a stormy day," the judge remarked as he left the bench. The storm occurred at the end of a long hot day of waiting to learn what the court would do in response to the defense's attempt to end the trial by establishing the unsoundness of the indictment and the unconstitutionality of the Tennessee statute which says that public school instructors shall teach no theory of evolution which denies the Biblical story of man's creation.

**Defense Objects.**

When the judge at length entered the court room, after a recess of hours which he employed in writing his decision, he was met before he could make any announcement by the filing of a defense motion asking that the court's practice of opening the morning session of court with prayer be discontinued.

In addition, the motion asked and supported its request with a signed petition from church men outside Rhea county, that if the prayer opening should be continued the court would permit some minister of beliefs other than those of fundamentalists to lead in the devout appeal.

The court announced he would refer the petition to the Dayton Ministerial Association with the request that this body choose the clergymen who should lead the daily prayer. The crowd applauded.

The court then announced that he would not publish his decision on the quashing motion until tomorrow.

The issue over the opening of court with prayer appeared at the beginning of today's session when Judge Raulston invited the Rev. A. C. Stribbling, pastor of the Dayton Cumberland Presbyterian church, to offer prayer from the bench.

**Fear Prejudice.**

As the crowd rose, Clarence Darrow held up an objecting finger and addressed the court. He told Judge Raulston that the defense wished to protest against the public court prayer because it might prejudice the case of John T. Scopes in the minds of the jury and the court.

"I object to turning this court into a meeting house," Darrow declared. Attorney-General Stewart asserted that it was the custom of the Rhea County Court to open with a prayer; 'the people around this section are a God-fearing people,' he said, and insisted that the practice be uninterrupted.

**Objection Overruled.**

Judge Raulston declared that he wished to be "reasonable" to all parties. He believed in prayer and practiced it himself, he said. He overruled the objection of the defense and Mr. Stribbling led the prayer.

**TRIPLE ALLIANCE  
AGAINST THE REDS**

Paris, July 14—Britain's efforts to form a holy triple alliance with France and Belgium against Bolshevism are bearing fruit and Vanderelde's and Briand's conversations in Paris have led to a general understanding as to the attitude to be adopted toward the Red menace.

Closer Franco-Belgian cooperation already is seen in the arrest of a French Communist in Antwerp. His papers revealed a plan for the removal from Berlin of the intelligence service spying in behalf of the French fighting wing of the communists and its installation in a Belgium town close to the French frontier. Belgium informed France that she would not tolerate for a minute the presence of such an organization on her soil.

In view of the rapidly increasing Bolshevik activity and the success of their tactics in China and Africa, the suggestion is made that existing exchanges of information regarding suspects should be supplemented by the creation of an interpolice board by the Western powers to concert common action, thus obviating the ridiculous farce such as occurred after the invasion of the Chinese Embassy in Paris, after which scores of Chinese Reds were flung over the Belgian frontier by the French police, to be immediately flung back by the Belgians, so that the French finally had to smuggle the undesirable into Germany which in turn exported them to Austria.

**Government Convention**

A Convention of friends and supporters of the Provincial Government in the constituency of Fredericton-Devon-Marysville will be held at the ODDFELLOWS' HALL, Campbell Building, Queen Street, on FRIDAY, EVENING, JULY 17TH., at eight o'clock, for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest the constituency in the coming election and for organization purposes.

**FRANCE AND  
SPAIN AGREE  
TO COOPERATE**

Madrid, July 12—The all-important agreement on political collaboration between Spain and France with regard to Morocco was signed here yesterday on receipt of approval of the accord by the French Government. All the agreements negotiated at the Franco-Spanish conference have now been approved by both Governments. The other two deal with land and naval blockades.

**Tangier Problem.**

The conference is confronted with still another important question, dealing with the Tangier problem, which concerns not only France and Spain, but also all the signatories of the so-called Tangier statute, covering the neutrality of that zone.

**THOUSANDS OF  
HARVESTERS  
WILL BE NEEDED****Wheat Crop of the West  
May Total 375,000,000  
Bushels.**

Montreal, July 14.—Early preparations are being made this year to cope with the situation in the west so far as the harvesting of the wheat crop is concerned. From early spring it has been realized that the 1925 crop would be considerably in excess of that harvested last year and now while no definite estimates can be made it is expected that the crop will approximately 375,000,000 bushels. If anything approaching this figure is reached it is apparent that it will be necessary to import a large number of harvest workers into the west to help handle it. Much of course still depends upon continued favorable weather conditions but regardless of what is transpiring in the meantime the Canadian railways are proceeding with their arrangements for the operation of harvesters excursion on the assumption that there is to be a bumper crop. Already several preliminary meetings have been held between railway officials and government representatives with the result that it is now estimated that between 45,000 and 50,000 harvesters will be needed in the prairie provinces in addition to those available locally. In fact the total estimate of help required in the west is 50,000 but several provinces figure that they can meet a part of the requirements by men available in the west. A meeting will be held at Winnipeg July 24 attended by officials of various governments of the western provinces and representatives of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific at which more definite figures will be arrived at and this meeting will be followed by the formulating of plans for obtaining and transporting the harvesters required. The arrangements for handling harvesters will be practically the same as in former years except on larger scale, every available car of the coast type will be pressed into use by both roads and the usual arrangements will be made to look after the comforts of the excursionists.

**Open Season for Partridge**

The Royal Gazette today contains two announcements of importance in connection with hunting and fishing. One is the proclamation of an open season for partridge from October 20th to November 10th, inclusive of both dates, no person to kill more than six partridge in a day or more than twenty in a season. The other is proclamation of a fly-fishing license for non-residents for a period of three days and at a fee of five dollars.

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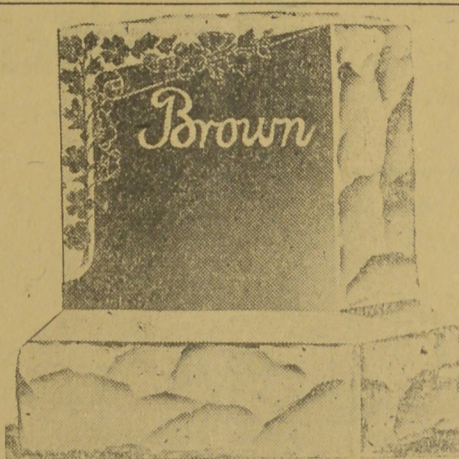
