STATION, HAS
LETTER FROM KING

Ex-Soldier Selling With-
out License — Matter
Kept Out of Court —
Was Prisoner in Ger-
many.

Ex. Private G. Williamson of the 6th Cameron Highlanders who has been touring Canada selling furniture novelties was in trouble today in the local police court because he has been selling novelties without a license. However the matter has been settled out of court and Williamson has taken out a temporary license, until a license which he says the Dominion government has given him is verified. He tells the following story. During the war he was a private in the 6th Cameron High-landers, and was taken prisoner by the Germans. He suffered un-
tollable hardships and was re-
leased in 1918. On his release he re-
ceived a letter from the King
which was written in His Majesty's
own hand writing. A representative
of the press saw the letter and
there is no doubt as to its
authenticity. Although during the
war letters from His Majesty were
quite common there is no local
case on record of one being in the
hand writing of the King. The
letter follows.

"The Queen joins with me in wel-
coming you on your release from
the miseries and hardships that
you have endured with so much
patience and courage. During
these many months of trial the
early rescue of our gallant officers
and men from the cruelties of their
captivity has been uppermost in
our thoughts. We are thankful
that this day has arrived and that
back in the Old Country you will
be able to enjoy the happiness of
a home and to see good days
among those whom anxiously look
for your return."

Williamson stated that he had
been held up in Montreal for the
same reason that he was here and
had been thrown in the cells there.
When the wire came from Ottawa
he was released and paid \$5 for
every day in the cells. He is now
touring Canada in a Ford car sell-
ing novelties of his own make. His
home is in Scotland.


