A GREAT OPPORTUNITY.

In the course of his speech at the Government Convention in the Odd-fellows' Hall last Friday evening Premier Veniot referred to the advantages which would accrue to the City of Fredericton and vicinity from the development of hydro power at the Grand Falls. He stated that people living in this district would be among the first in the Province to benefit by the undertaking, not only in cheap light, heat and power but also in the increase of industrial activity. It is proposed to build in this city a power station to distribute power from the main transmission line to the surrounding country. The carrying out of this project necessarily involves the expenditure of a large amount of capital and a demand for skilled and unskilled labor, which cannot fail to be permanently reflected in the improved prosperity of all sections of the community. Furthermore the International Paper Company has expressed the intention of constructing somewhere along the valley of the St. John an extensive plant to manufacture pulp and paper on a large scale. Its location has not been definitely determined, but, as the Premier put it, Fredericton with its excellent distributing facilities is undoubtedly the natural place for such an undertaking.

It is, therefore, sufficiently plain that when the electors of Fredericton, Devon and Marysville mark their ballots on Aug. 10 there are infinitely greater issues at stake than the ordinary commonplace of party politics. They have to choose between a Government that has prospered and embazoned on its banner and holds aloft the torch of progress and an Opposition that has nothing better to offer than a timid appeal for delay in order to create needless expense by a further senseless enquiry into the findings of the leading engineers in the country, who, after two years of the most painstaking investigation, have pronounced the Grand Falls power project an entirely feasible commercial possibility. There is no doubt that if Leader Baxter has his way not months but years will pass before anything further is done in the matter and finally he would have to be thrown out of office to allow Premier Veniot or some other live man to finish his work.

There is positively nothing to be gained by delaying a scheme which should have been in operation years ago and is indispensable to the very life of the Province. Wherever people look they find all the important countries in the world either preparing plans to harness their waterpowers or else to increase the generating capacity of existing plants. Italy provides one example, among many, where hydro energy has brought renewed vigor to industrial expansion. The competition of Italy's textile industries which is causing Great Britain grave concern has been made possible by the substitution of hydro for coal.

It is quite obvious that construction work of all kinds costs more than before the war, but we are living in the present and must prepare for the future. Experience shows that industry irresistibly gravitates to the centres which can offer it the cheapest power. Prosperity means nothing else than providing opportunities to supply the wants of an increasing population. Can New Brunswick afford to neglect its opportunities while other countries are eagerly grasping every chance to turn their economic possibilities into actual realities? Every vote for Premier Veniot is a step towards a brighter and better era in the history of the Province. Let Fredericton, Marysville and Devon show their appreciation by electing Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., by an emphatic majority!

Leader Baxter is angling for the support of the lumber interests by promising a reduction in the stump-

age rate. It is perhaps well to point out however, that during the session of 1920 he and his followers voted in the House to increase the rate from \$5 to \$7. The members for Albert voted against the motion, but it was heartily supported by several jack-knife lumbermen sitting on the opposition bench.

Ewart Gladstone Atkinson and his aide de camp, W. W. Hubbard, ex-secretary of agriculture and ex-superintendent of the Experimental Station and a whole lot of other x's are handling the opposition campaign in Sunbury and are in for the surprise of their lives when the votes are counted.

For the information of the electors of Sunbury it might be well to point out that the running mate of Mr. Ewart Gladstone Atkinson is a gentleman by the name of Taylor, a mine manager living at Minto. Mr. Atkinson has thus far not been keen to acquaint the electors with this information.

The ladies who take an active interest in politics should make an effort to inform themselves on the issues at stake. If they did this a certain lady worker of the Opposition faith would not be going about the city urging her friends to vote the "whole ticket" in York.

The advent of the Ku Klux Klan in New Brunswick seems to be synchronized with Mr. Baxter's elevation to the leadership of the Opposition party. Mr. Baxter has delivered a lot of speeches of late but so far he has not expressed an opinion on the merits or demerits of the invisible empire.

The Veniot Government has started something which is bound to bring increased prosperity to New Brunswick. The business men and others of Fredericton, Marysville and Devon who are inclined to complain of hard times, should make a note of this fact.

BERLIN CLINGS TO ITS CHOICE WORKS OF ART

\$1,022 HYDRO DAMAGES FOR MONCTON FIRM

Moncton, July 22—The New Brunswick Gas and Oil Fields, Limited, was awarded \$1,022.21 as compensation for damages suffered as the result of the passage across its property of the transmission lines of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission. The award was made here today by Mr. Justice LeBlanc. The company sought \$7,088.10 and the commission had offered \$1,600. Judgment in the case of the Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company of Saint John, which is seeking \$840,000 for damages to lands in the vicinity of Musquash was deferred until July 27.
