OF INTEREST TO THE WOMEN

FUR POPULAR ON WINTER APPAREL.

Paris—All the little furry creatures will be kept busy this winter supplying trimming for winter wear. Fashionable garments are not using any discretion or economy in the matter of fur this season.

Fur is no longer a mere protection against the cold. It is a thing of beauty and has been converted into beautiful shapes and intricate patterns.

There are veritable mosaics arranged in a geometric or cubist design. The last word in elegance calls for the reproduction in the colored silk lining of the pattern on the coat. Some evening capes bear flowers composed of fur in different tones and others have little birds or animals.

For many seasons women have contented themselves with great round collars of fur but this year it is being made to run up and down the sides of the coat fronts, both on the interior and the outside as well as forming the usual collars.

Last season's bands have spread into great godets of fur with bands frequently set between. Fur patches squares, rectangular and irregular, are trimming nearly every coat and many dresses make conservative use of fur in sufficient quantity to add to its importance as a smart trimming. A very chic coat from Germain Leteconte's comes in velvet with a form of fur patches. The fur shawl collar is of silver fox and the square patches of the same.

Another long, irregular patch of fur is placed at the bottom of the back flare. A full scarf of red fox and box bands trim another coat of maroon brocade.

Every kind of color of fur is being used. As a matter of fact it is not so much the quality or kind of fur that makes its value these days. It is the combination of design and workmanship that makes one forget whether it is the humble rabbit or the snobbish mink in question.

PASTRY THAT JUST "TOPS IT OFF."

Pastry—One and a half cups flour half cup shortening one teaspoon salt three to four tablespoons cold water. Sift together flour and salt. Cut in shortening add cold water to make a stiff dough. Bake in a very hot oven (500 degrees).

Apple Pie.

One mixture of pastry, two cups sliced apples, one tablespoon butter three quarter cup sugar, One teaspoon nutmeg. Line pie plate with pastry. Fill with apples which have been pared cored and sliced the long way of the apple. Add sugar, spice and dot with butter. The pan should be rounding full. Cover with top crust which has a slit in it. Press edges well together. Bake for ten minutes in over 450 degrees then reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake for forty minutes longer.

COMMUNISTS ARE WATCHED IN WINNIPEG

Ottawa, Nov. 16—Activities of Communists in Western Canada are being closely watched from Ottawa.

The Communist publications in Winnipeg, referred to in a Winnipeg newspaper Saturday, are being scrutinized and action will no doubt be taken where the law is traversed by such publications.

The chief interest of the Dominion government in Communist activity hitherto has laid in the efforts made to penetrate organized labor and these efforts have not so far met with any great success, it is pointed out here.

The education of young children in the tenets of Sovietism is undoubtedly going on it is stated. The recent deportation of a whole family from Winnipeg back to England resulted from the seditious speech made by a young boy at a May Day demonstration.

This action was taken by the Immigration Department, which along with the Labor Department and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, is interested in the Communistic movement in Canada.

Molasses Pie.


One quarter cup butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cups black molasses, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup walnut meats chopped. Melt butter, add flour, stir until smooth. Add sugar and molasses. Let cook for three minutes. Cool. Add beaten eggs and nuts. Pour into pie pan lined with crust. Bake for ten minutes in oven heated to 450 degrees then reduce heat to 375 degrees and bake thirty to thirty-five minutes longer.
