CONSERVATIVES ARE OPPOSED TO PARLIAMENT TAKING A LONG RECESS; CUSTOMS CHARGES

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—This afternoon's brief sitting of the House of Commons saw no weakening in Conservative opposition to the Government motion for adjournment of Parliament until March 15. A tired House assembled at 3 o'clock after the previous sitting which lasted until 4 o'clock this morning, but no change in the attitude of either Government or Opposition was indicated.

At the outset the Government announced that it was willing to appoint a commission to probe the Stevens charges against the customs service. The announcement was made by Hon. G.H. Boivin, Minister of Customs who said that the Government was ready to confer with Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Opposition leader, on the preparation of a motion for the appointment of such a commission. Mr. Meighen expressed willingness to confer with the Government, but made it clear that the Opposition would not agree to a long adjournment of Parliament even if the commission was granted.

Lapointe Speaks

The Stevens amendment calling for a commission to probe the charges gave Hon. Ernest Lapointe, acting Government leader, an opportunity to speak without closing the debate on the main motion for adjournment. He admitted that smuggling was being carried on between Canada and the United States. He pointed to drastic legislation for its suppression introduced by the Government last year and passed by Parliament.

"Everything possible will be done to try and check smuggling in this country," he said.

Hon. James A. Robb, Minister of Finance, also referred to the Stevens charges. During the general election he had met with strenuous opposition in his constituency from bootleggers

and smugglers. "I have reason to believe that they were financed by the Conservative organization in Montreal," he said. The Government was doing its best to suppress smuggling, which existed not only in Montreal, but also in Toronto and at other places in Canada.

Calls Cabinet Incapable

That this "ramshackle remnant of a Government" was incapable of carrying on the country's business was the opinion expressed by Hon. R. J. Manion, Conservative, Fort William. There should be no long recess of Parliament especially in view of the Stevens charges. They should be investigated at once.

Business Can be Done

Hon. R. B. Bennett (Conservative, West Calgary) pointed out business which could be done during the time which the Government proposed to adjourn the House. He said that but a fraction of the amount voted last session for repression of smuggling had been used by the Government for the purpose.

The debate was adjourned by Donald Sutherland (Conservative, South Oxford), who will have the floor tomorrow.

May Vote Tonight

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—There is little prospect of an immediate relief from the present impasse in Parliament.

It was stated in the corridors this afternoon that the debate on the Stevens' amendment to the La Pointe motion providing that when the House finally adjourned it stand adjourned until March 15 might terminate with a vote tomorrow night. When that discussion is terminated, however, the House will resume its talk on the Throne Speech and intimations from Conservative circles indicate that it is likely to occupy most of next week.

By this proclamation of the Throne Speech debate the Conservatives, it is stated, plan seriously to reduce the time before March 15 and within which the Government hopes to add to the cabinet and complete preparations of the legislative programme. On the other hand it is rumored that if that time is cut down considerably the Government may feel obliged to reintroduce its motion and extend the time to which the final adjournment is made to the end of March or possibly April 7.

THE MAYOR OF CALAIS DIES; NATIVE OF N. B.

St. Stephen, Feb. 3.—Not only the City of Calais, Me., but this whole border community mourns the death of Mayor William J. Fowler which occurred in Calais this afternoon. He had been seriously ill for the last week. He suffered a stroke this morning.

Mayor Fowler was about 70 years of age and was born in the Miramichi country. He went through college and as a young man started a law practice at Milltown. Later he moved to Calais.

He was appointed judge of the Municipal Court, at which he served more than 15 years. He has served as Mayor of Calais altogether more than 10 years and, although a staunch Republican, so well was he thought of not only personally but also by his ability that whenever he was brought out for Mayor the Democrats would not oppose him.

He was a Mason and a member of the Calais Rotary Club and an active and influential citizen. He leaves his wife, who was before her marriage Miss Addie Jenner, formerly of St. Stephen, and one son, Don, in the Western States.

Mayor Out of City.

Mayor Clark has been called out of the city on business. It is expected that on his return in a day or two he will receive the report of the City Auditor on finances of 1925.

I have not heard from any of the members that the Sheriff will not be re-appointed, and when I write the above I believe that I express the sentiments of the barristers and magistrates and nine tenths of the people.
