AN IMPORTANT SESSION.

The session of the Legislative Assembly prorogued by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor at a late hour last night was easily one of the most important and we believe one of the most beneficial since confederation. As His Honor truly said in his closing speech "the work of the session has had intimate relation to the development of the industrial life of the province." While the number of bills passed during the session was not large when compared with some previous sessions they easily made up in quality what they lacked in quantity. First and foremost were the bills providing for the development of the water power at Grand Falls. This great work under the authority given by the House is to be carried on by the International Paper Company, the largest manufacturers of newsprint in the world and will mean an enormous investment of outside capital in the province. In addition to the development of the Falls three large pulp and paper mills will be established giving employment to thousands of men and turning out a product for which a ready market is already assured.

Legislation was also enacted providing for further water power development on the Nepisiguit River by the Bathurst Company, which will mean a large increase in the capacity of the paper mill now being operated by that concern. Naturally the enactment of such important legislation prolonged the session a few days, but there will be no complaint in regard to this as it was certainly time well spent. The Grand Falls bills, because of their great importance were given the most careful scrutiny and the most zealous care was exercised in safeguarding the interests of the province. It is going to cost a lot of money to develop Grand Falls and establish the pulp and paper mills which will be dependent on this development for the necessary power, but it will be money brought in from outside, and the cost to the taxpayers will be nil. It is the greatest scheme of development ever undertaken in New Brunswick and should and undoubtedly will prove a great stimulus to all lines of business.

The administration so ably led by Premier Baxter is certainly deserving of commendation on the splendid start it has made. There is no doubt that for some years past the province has been living beyond its means, and that the time has arrived when the brake must be applied to public expenditure. The Baxter administration is determined to do this, but it is not going to adopt a penny wise and pound foolish policy. It realizes that the various public services have got to be kept up and it is determined to do this, even though it may be necessary to employ unusual measures for augmenting the revenue. Money to pay for the various public services does not grow on trees; it has got to be provided by the people and it matters little whether they pay by means of direct or indirect taxation. The government with a courage which is commendable, has made provision to raise a portion of the necessary revenue by means of a direct tax but should the people prefer some other method they will have ample time to come forward with it between now and the fall of 1927. There is no question that additional money will be needed and there is no question as to who will have to provide it, the only difference of opinion being as to method. We do not believe that the government, having taken steps to bring about a great increase in the industrial prosperity of the province will have occasion to worry a great deal with respect to a revenue. The Baxter administration enjoys the confidence of the people to a marked degree, and will be heartily supported in the efforts it has put forth to restore the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure.

The bill to provide for a tax on gasoline was passed by the Legislature yesterday after some discussion.

A tax of three cents per gallon is to be listed and the bill provides for the licensing of dealers. The gasoline tax should be the source of considerable revenue and it will be contributed by visiting as well as resident motorists.

As was to be expected the city of St. John through its common council has registered a protest against the governments direct taxation proposals. St. John never claims to be the whole province when it comes to a question of paying taxes.

The report of the Public Accounts Committee of the Legislature was a lengthy as well as an important document. The fact should be noted that it was signed by every member of the Committee including three opponents of the government.

Hon. Mr. Veniot moved that the six months hoist be given to governments direct taxation bill in the House yesterday afternoon but the motion was defeated by a majority of 21.

The provincial government has in Premier Baxter a leader who actually leads. He certainly proved his worth during the important session of the Legislature which closed last night.

Only two members of the loyal opposition, Mr. Lordon of Gloucester and Mr. Niles of Victoria were in their places when the Lieutenant Governor prorogued the Legislature last night.

The Baxter administration certainly came through the recent session of the Legislature with flying colors.

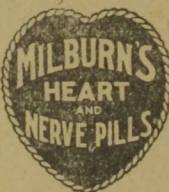

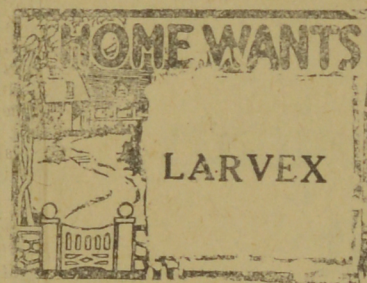
