CRITICIZE NEW SHOES.

Shoe manufacturers report that women are complaining because certain novelty "cut-out" styles fail to keep their shape after some wear. They are arrogant enough to reply that the fault lies chiefly with stout women who try to squeeze their feet into sizes which have too scant an amount of leather to withstand the pressure. It is reported that the customs investigation which has been going on at Ottawa since January is nearing its end. 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

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
