

U.S. POULTRYMEN TO PAY VISIT TO FREDERICTON

Party to Tour Maritimes While En Route to the World's Poultry Congress at Ottawa.

Prof. F. C. Elford, Dominion poultry husbandman of Ottawa was in the city for a short time yesterday and paid a visit to the Experimental Station. Prof. Elford has just completed a tour of Canada in company with Prof. W. A. Brown of London, England, president of the World's Poultry Congress which is to meet at Ottawa in July 1927. He is naturally very enthusiastic in regard to the outlook for the congress, and declares it will be the greatest gathering of scientific poultry men in world's history. There will be delegates present from thirty foreign countries and when the congress is over it is planned to take them on a sight seeing tour of the country. Two hundred or so of handpicked delegates representing many different countries will be brought to the Maritime provinces, and upon their return to Ottawa a large party will be taken on a trip to the west.

U. S. Delegates Coming.

A large number of New England poultry-fanciers have signified their intention of making the trip to Ottawa by automobile and readily fell in with a suggestion that the Maritime provinces be included in their itinerary. It is planned to have them motor to St. John leave their cars in that city and cross the bay to Digby. They will then tour the mainland of Nova Scotia and cross to Prince Edward Island by way of Pictou. After visiting the chief points on the Island they will recross to Cape Tormentine, return to St. John, board their autos and set out for Ottawa by way of the St. John Valley. Of course they will stop at Fredericton and proceed to the Experimental Station where they will be entertained to luncheon. They will likely remain here over night and continue up river the following morning, stopping at Woodstock, Hartland, Grand Falls and Edmundston.

The Provincial government and authorities of the different towns to be visited are expected to cooperate heartily in entertaining the visitors during their stay in the province.

TEACHING EXAMINATIONS BEGAN TODAY

Forty-Six are Writing Grammar School Papers — Record Number — Maritime Universities Represented.

The examinations for Teaching Licenses conducted by the Department of Education of New Brunswick began this morning. In Fredericton the examinations are conducted in the Provincial Normal School with R. B. Wallace supervising and members of the Normal School staff assisting.

Forty-six candidates were enrolled as taking the Grammar School examinations and one as taking Superior. Other candidates for Superior are included in the Class I list. The number of Grammar School candidates is the largest on record. Some are not university graduates or undergraduates but the majority are. The University of New Brunswick furnishes the majority of candidates but there also are candidates from Acadia, Mc. Allison and Dalhousie Universities.

Premier Baxter Now in Ottawa — Tenders for Provincial Bond Issue Close Thursday Afternoon.

The Provincial Government is to meet here Thursday night in the regular June session. The Government also will sit on Friday. Hon. D. A. Stewart Minister of Public Works, is expected to arrive early in the week for the purpose of attending to departmental business.

Premier Baxter is at present in Ottawa attending the conference of Provincial Premiers. The conference is expected to be finished in time to permit him to reach Fredericton by Thursday.

The Board of Education has a considerable amount of routine business which has collected since the last meeting it having been impossible to arrange a meeting in May. The Board is likely to sit during the session of the Government.

The tenders for the Provincial bond issue recently decided upon by the Government are to close at three o'clock on Thursday. The Government will be able to consider that matter at the meeting.
