An Editor in Trouble.

Mr. James A. Fraser, the veteran editor of the New Glasgow Chronicle in commenting in his paper on the nomination of Col. Cantley as the Conservative candidate in Pictou a short time ago had this to say: "But, oh goodness! What will happen an ordinary man if the Liberals put up one such? The doughty Colonel with his broadsword will cut him into mincemeat. Whoever the poor devil will be, he will be to be pitied when the Colonel's warlike axe falls upon him. He knows what is likely to happen when the Colonel's warlike axe falls and is naturally not overly anxious to bring trouble upon himself. The acceptance of the Liberal nomination by Editor Fraser under the circumstances and we understand he has accepted it, will prove conclusively that the old gentleman is not lacking in courage.


