The Fredericton Imperials defeated the Devon team last evening at Devon in a York County Amateur League fixture when they batted "Omie" Burse hard, by the score of 9 to 3. It was Fredericton's big night with the willow and they collected ten safe hits, four of which were for extra bases, Hersey leading the attack with a tripe, a double and a single in four trips to the rubber. McGinnis and Shannon also hit a double and a single each in three trips up.

Devon also batted Greg McGinnis at will having a total of eight hits. Staples and Keene each having a double and a single in three times up. Jack Watson also had a couple of singles out of three times at bat.

The field was muddy and looked more like a skinned gridiron in the fall than a baseball diamond, sawdust helped to soak up the dampness, and the infield had been dragged before the game. Despite this the game was a good one for four innings but Devon blew up in the fifth and let the Imps score five runs.

The Scoring.

Hersey hit the first ball pitched by Burse to right field for three bases. Burse's error let Clark reach second and Hersey scored. Wheeler hit and Clark scored. Wheeler was sacrificed to second and to third but Hall ended the inning by flying out to centrefield. The Imps added a couple more in the

fourth. An error, two singles and a double from the bat of Hersey, produced the runs.

After two men were out in the fifth Fredericton scored five runs when they batted around their order. Lister the first batter, walked. Coyle struck out. Shannon hit for two bases. Burse took Hall's hot smash and threw to first. Greg McGinnis was safe and Lister scored when E. Miles dropped brother Henry's throw on a missed third strike. Hersey hit and Shannon scored. Clark hit and McGinnis scored. Burse threw wild to first after he stopped Wheeler's drive and Hersey and Clark scored. Myshrahl was given a free pass and Lister batting the second time in the inning, struck out.

Devon scored in the first inning of the game. Rutter singled, went to second on a passed ball and scored on Ken Staples' safe hit.

The last two Devon runs were scored in the third. Staples opened the inning with a two base wallop. J. Watson hit, and Staples scored. Keene hit for two bases and Watson held third. Malloy reached first when Jack Watson was caught between the bases. McGinnis picked up E. Miles' grounder and threw home. Myshrahl dropped the ball and Keene was safe. This was the last Devon run of the game. Irvine was hit by McGinnis and the sacks were loaded again. Lister threw Malloy out at the plate on H. Miles' grounder. Burse hit to Hersey who picked up his grounder and touched third, forcing Irvine for the last out.

## LEAGUE TO BUCK PROPOSED NEW PRO LEAGUE

Rumors of Even Another Pro Hockey Organization — Frank Patrick Slated for the Presidency.

Montreal, Aug. 9—The Gazette in its sport columns says:

"Following the pro hockey mix-up in Detroit, caused by the tentative award of a National Hockey League franchise to the Seyburn-Townsend League interests and the refusal of a berth to the Friedberg syndicate, it appears that a definite move is under way to launch an opposition major pro hockey league to operate in Detroit, Chicago, Cleveland, Toronto and Jersey City. Frank Patrick of the former Western Canada Hockey League it is reported on reliable authority, has been offered the post of President of the proposed new circuit. Patrick was recently in Montreal and held in lengthy conferences with President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League. He left here for Detroit where he is at present.

"According to reliable information the new league will have the former Victoria, B. C., pro team in Detroit under the Friedberg interests which anticipating a franchise in the National Hockey League entered into an agreement with Patrick to buy the Cougars. Paddy Harmon unsuccessful bidder for a National Hockey League franchise for Chicago is to operate a team in the new circuit. Promoter Coulter of Jersey City is behind the pro hockey move in that city.
