

## SCIENTISTS' PROGRAM UNITES JAZZ WITH TUT'S COSMETICS

London, Aug. 6—Even the British Association for the Advancement of Science has been affected by the jazz spirit. The schedule of entertainments for the annual meeting at Oxford Wednesday included dancing for the first time. Varied subjects are announced which include "The Hairlessness of Man," "The Origin of the Scottish Race," "Intelligence in Rats," "Mass Production in Motor Cars," "Cosmetics Found in Tut-ankh-amen's Tomb," "Consumptive Vegetables," "Advertisements" and "The Psychology of Patriotism."

The meeting will open with the presidential address of the Prince of Wales at the Sheldonian Theatre. To accommodate the rush of applicants two other halls have been taken and loud speakers installed. Visitors will

be lodged in the colleges, where they are expected to live the ordinary life of undergraduates, returning to their rooms not later than midnight. The Prince will occupy the rooms in Magdalen, where he once was a student. Representatives are expected from the United States, Russia, Japan and, for the first time since the war, Germany.

The university will confer honorary degrees on distinguished Britishers and foreigners, including Professor Henry Fairfield Osborn, of the Museum of Natural History, New York. It will be a crowded week calculated to exhaust the conscientious scientist. In addition to the lectures there will be concerts, receptions, expeditions on land and water and a display by the Royal Air Force.

## WOMAN THE MOTORCYCLE TEST CHAMP

London, Aug. 9—Miss Nancy Debenham has proved the champion motorcycle test rider of England.

Against a field of some 40 men competitors, Miss Debenham, still in her teens, won her race with a good lead, and was awarded the gold cup for the best performance in a 200-mile reliability trial conducted by the London Motor Cycling Club. She achieved the distinction on a 2½ horsepower machine, which was the lightest one taking part in the contest.

## BEANS SUNK A FREIGHTER

Hankow, China, Aug. 9—The power of the humble bean has been forcibly illustrated on the Yangtze river, China's great water highway.

The Hamburg Amerika motorship Rhineland, filled with beans, collided with the Japanese steamer Mitsuki about forty miles below Hankow.

The Rhineland sprang a leak, the beans began to swell, decks to bulge and seams to open. Salvage craft came to the rescue, but the beans had all the best of it.

The Rhineland was an almost total loss.

## BIRD AGAIN IN THE FIELD

Swan River, Man., Aug. 6—At a Progressive-Liberal convention here T. W. Bird, former Progressive member of Parliament emerged as the only opposition candidate to Joseph Myers, Conservative for Nelson constituency.

Five names were placed in nomination—three Progressives and two Liberals. The latter two were ruled out and two Progressives withdrew leaving Mr. Bird the unanimous choice.

## N. B. DOG SHOW AT SAINT JOHN

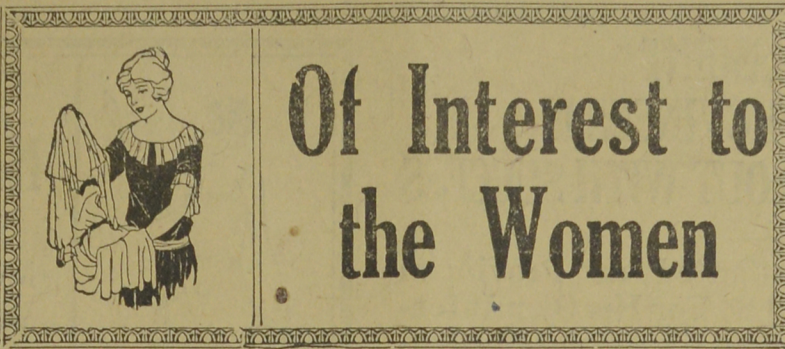

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### OSTRICH FEATHERS

NEWEST STYLE VOGUE.

Ostrich has come into style and is being used by both the coutouriers and milliners in some of their finest designs. These feathers are dyed in many enchanting tints and appear most graceful in the "willow" form. Ostrich is particularly good for a collar and trimming on evening wraps worn over sheer frocks, taking the place of summer furs, which are less fashionable than they have been for several seasons.

### THIS AND THAT.

How often many of us would add hot biscuits to our evening meal were it not for the trouble of making them at the last minute and when we are most probably wearing a dress which we dislike to risk near such a task. But just as many other parts of our dinner may be prepared during the forenoon, so can the biscuits. They can be mixed, cut arranged for baking and set inside the refrigerator until dinner time and when baked will be just as perfect as if they were directly from the board to the oven.

Another biscuit secret is this—if an aluminum or tin sheet is used instead of the usual baking pan, the biscuits will be much lighter and bake more quickly.

When preparing one's baggage for a trip, if two tags (one for going and one for coming home) are written no small amount of annoyance may be done away with when the return trip is to be made. If the tags are to be tacked onto a trunk, the one with the return address should be placed beneath the one with going away address and both tacked on together. When the traveler is ready for the return trip the top one may be turned off, leaving the other in its proper place. If the tags are to be inserted in a leather holder the same method can be used.

Many women are awake to the pleasure and profit of planning their summer sewing so that much of it may be done on the porch. But fewer are aware of the fact that where there is a yard in the rear much of the kitchen work may likewise be carried out into the open with equal success. A bench or seat of some kind near the kitchen door, under a tree or in the shade of a wall, is often not difficult to arrange. Here one may prepare vegetables, look over berries, seed cherries and even polish silver or beat up a cake. In fact once the habit is formed, one will constantly find things which may just as well be done outdoors with the blue sky overhead and the beauty of nature all about.

### HAWAIIAN HIGHBALL.

Two cups crushed pineapple, 2 cups grapefruit, ¼ cup sugar, 1½ quarts water, sprigs of mint. Pour grapefruit and pineapple through fine sieve and press pulp to extract juices. Add to sugar and water and blend well. Serve with floating sprigs of mint.

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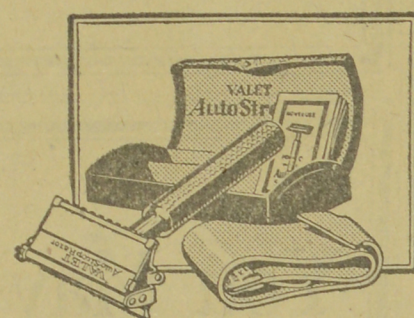
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
