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MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNMENT
SEE THE RESTIGOUCHE IN FILM

Movies Depicting Salmon Angling Shown in the Executive Council Chamber—A Wonderful Set of Pictures Which are Being Used for Publicity Purposes.

Moving pictures of the far famed Restigouche River, generally conceded to be the greatest angling proposition in the world, were shown in the executive council chamber between five and six o'clock yesterday afternoon. Those privileged to witness them were members of the Government and Board of Education, officials of the Department of Lands and Mines and representatives of the press. The five year leases of the fishing privileges of the Restigouche expire in March next, and Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, has certainly established a precedent in the pace he has set in giving the necessary publicity to this wonderful asset of the province. Early last summer he made a visit to the Restigouche, and tried his hand at the thrilling and royal sport of salmon angling. He afterwards organized a party, headed by Chief Game Warden Gagnon to make a canoeing trip on the river and arranged with the motion picture branch of the Department of the Interior to send operators to make films of the expedition. Fine weather was experienced during the trip and some excellent reels depicting the catching of the fighting Atlantic salmon by rod and fly were secured. These reels were exhibited in New York last week by Chief Game Warden Gagnon before members of the North American Fish and Game Protective Association and made a decided hit. They will be shown at the Massachusetts Sportsman's Show to be held in Boston in January.

A Beautiful River.

The reels shown yesterday depicted a canoeing trip on the Restigouche from the Mouth of the Kedgwick to

the Mouth of the Metepedia, a distance of some twenty miles. The Restigouche is not a large stream as compared with the Saint John, but its banks in most places are steep, and well wooded, and the water is quick and remarkably clear. It is the only river in the province where horses are now used for transportation purposes, they being utilized to draw supply laden boats and scows to the sporting camps on the upper stretches.

The pictures shown proved highly interesting and exciting and held the closest attention of the small but select audience. The party after embarking at Kedgwick ran into a number of American angling parties and the camera depicted them in the act of hooking, playing and landing some fine specimens of the finny tribe. The fish ranged in weight from fifteen to twenty-five pounds, and appeared to be full of fight. In some instances they were shown leaping right out of the water in their battle for freedom. In one case the guide was shown in the act of landing a big fish by the tail, but as a rule the net was made to do duty. The famous million dollar pool, held under lease to a Mr. Rogers of New York, was among those brought into view. It is beyond a doubt the greatest salmon pool in the world.

The lessees of the Restigouche employ a big force of fishery guardians, and being free from political influence they attend strictly to their duties and give every satisfaction. The movies show several of them in action in their big pirogue canoes, which they handle with great skill. Poaching on the Restigouche is not allowed and that it the chief reason why it has become a peerless angling stream.

CLAIMS THAT SENATOR GOULD
WAS EXONERATED BY THE N. B.
LEGISLATURE SIX YEARS AGO

Portland, Me., Dec. 15—United States Senator Arthur R. Gould was exonerated six years ago by an investigating committee of the New Brunswick Legislature of bribery charges, State Senator Frederick W. Hinckley said tonight after word had been received from Fredericton, N. B., that the official records of the investigation into the Saint John Valley and Quebec Railway matter involving Mr. Gould were missing from the files.

Senator Hinckley said that he had been unaware of this investigation until Monday, when he appeared as counsel for Mr. Gould before the Senate Committee to which had been referred charges that he paid a bribe of \$100,000 in 1918 to the then Premier of New Brunswick in connection with a contract for rights to build the railroad. He intimated that the Senate inquiry may go to the United States Supreme Court before it is concluded.

Strange Coincidence.

"It is a strange coincidence," said Senator Hinckley, "that while investigating these matters against Mr. Gould in New Brunswick during the recent senatorial campaign, a committee representing the Democratic party in the interests of Candidate Redman should have produced copies of a record in which Chief Justice McKeown was alleged to have made charges against Senator Gould and failed to look up the record of the case which was investigated by the New Brunswick legislature, in which Mr. Gould was completely exonerated by the decision of the committee, the committee using the words 'they were compelled to pay.'"

Copy of Decision.

"I can readily understand why those hostile to Mr. Gould would want these records to disappear, but happily we have a copy of the decision of the committee. It also seems to be a rather late hour for discovering that this record is missing.

"So far as our information about this record is concerned, neither Mr. Gould nor anyone interested in him has had occasion to look at it since the decision was written about six years ago.

"Personally I was not aware that there had been any such investigation until Senator Walsh referred to it before the Senate committee Monday and said he was waiting for a copy of its records. I then found a copy of the decision in the hands of Mr.

Gould's former attorneys and yesterday instructed Mr. Winslow, Mr. Gould's Fredericton attorney, who was with us in New York, to get a complete transcript of the evidence.

"Mr. Winslow has not as yet returned from New Brunswick.

"Many copies of the decision undoubtedly could be found."

SPUD PRICES
IN AROOSTOOK
DOWN TO \$3

Caribou, Me., Dec. 14—Aroostook potatoes have dropped to a new level, some of the growers taking \$3 a barrel although the market price is generally quoted at \$3.25. The shipments are not large and below the average required to move out the crop before spring. Growers who sold at \$4 appear to be satisfied that they called the turn right on the top of the market. Others believe that the market will not go below \$3 which will net a good profit.

BACHELOR TAX
WORRIES ITALY

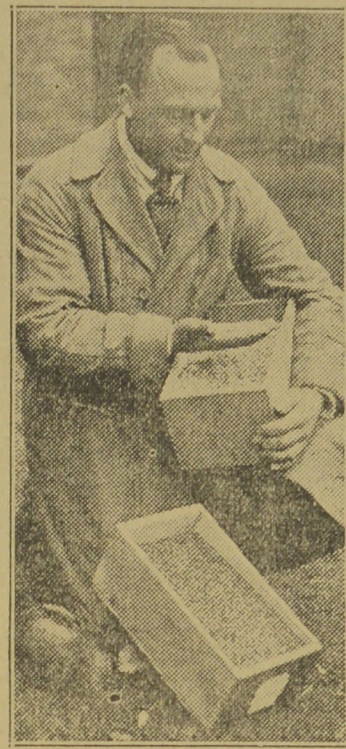
Rome, Dec. 18—Inability to support a wife will be just cause for exemption from the newly decreed tax on bachelors. This assurance is given by Il Tevere, which adds that the government is finding unusual difficulties in drafting rules applying the law to Italy's 3,000,000 unmarried men.

Others to be exempted are priests, prelates, army officers, paupers and persons with inheritable diseases. Difficulty is expected in testing some claims for exemption.

The tax will be graduated, increasing from the ages of 25 to 45 and decreasing from 45 to 65.

AN EGYPTIAN
INCUBATOR
TO BE SHOWN

Ottawa, Dec. 16—Mohammed Askar Bey of Cairo, Egypt, has notified the Secretary of the World's Poultry Congress that the Egyptian department of agriculture has decided to be represented at the congress to be held here next July.

It is the intention of the Egyptian government to stage at the congress exhibition one of the original Egyptian incubator ovens. Plans of the oven have been sent to Ottawa by Mohammed Bey. The oven is constructed of mud brick and is operated from the inside. There are no doors in the machine and those in charge have to crawl into the incubator through holes provided for that purpose. It is anticipated that two Egyptian boys will be sent to Ottawa by the Egyptian Government some time before the congress in order that the oven may be filled with eggs and the chicks be hatching out during the congress. This will form one of the most interesting exhibits and will demonstrate to breeders and those on this Continent the fact that Egypt was the first country to adopt artificial incubation.

THINK SALARY
IS BIG ENOUGH

New York, Dec. 15—A proposed salary increase of \$10,000 for Baseball Commissioner Landis was received without enthusiasm by National League club owners. Landis's salary is now \$50,000 per year.

Although the magnates unanimously favor re-election of Landis to another term of seven years, they indicated, on the eve of their annual meeting, that the circuit will oppose a move to boost his salary to \$60,000 annually. Furthermore, they feel that the Commissioner should increase the usefulness of his Advisory Council which includes the National League Vice-President, league spokesmen said.

BAN JOHNSON
AGAIN IN POWER

Chicago, Dec. 15—The American League today restored President Ban Johnson to the full power and authority which the club owners took from him two years ago at the bequest of Commissioner K. M. Landis.

Seven of the eight club owners elected Johnson to the major league advisory board which both the big leagues are prepared to insist upon reviving.

Connie Mack issued one of the only two definite announcements heard on the ivory market so far, that he had not signed Eddie Collins. Bucky Harris issued the other, that Walter Johnson would pitch for the Senators next year instead of entering the insurance business.
