The executive of the Board of Trade was in session Thursday night and completed organization for the year as well as transacting other business. Standing Committees were named for the year. Other business of importance also was transacted.

Supt. Crookshank of the C. N. R. reported that a Merchants' Exchange had been established at the C. N. R. Station. The exchange will afford protection to goods sent to the station to be called for by the purchasers who may be leaving on trains. Parcels sent to the station on certain occasions have been stolen.


