## ABOUT MAKING WILLS.

Frequently old people deed away their property, all on which they have to subsist, to their grown children, or other near relatives, on consideration that those so favored will care for the old people for the remainder of their lives. The law reports are full of cases where, later, thoughtlessness, ingratitude, or the differing viewpoints of the two generations, have caused the old folk to wish to regain control of their property. Sometimes they succeed, sometimes not.

Always the law student has, in the course of his instruction, such cases to study. Always the professor tells his class it is their duty to advise any future client wishing to make such an agreement that he is very unwise, and to protest against it.

"Such agreements, as human nature is constituted, bring out the very worst elements in the recipients of the property," the professor says.

"When, in the course of their later practice, the former students are asked to draw such agreements, they, if they follow their teachings, do protest. Still, such agreements are constantly made. The old people refuse to believe that their children will ever take advantage of them. But the children, once they have the property, sometimes become dictatorial, often truly believing they are acting for their parent's interest. Then ensue heart burnings. Good advice to old people who think of making such an agreement is not to do it; to permit the children the use of the property, if they wish, but on sufferance only, and not relinquish ownership.

## HELPING THE POOR.

New plans for helping the poor are revealed from time to time by thoughtful philanthropists. A Chicago man gives a lot of money to be administered by a board of business men to relieve poverty. Few ideas about helping the poor are better than Henry Ford's. Ford says the only real way to help a man who is able-bodied and able-minded is to give him a job. If he fails in one job, don't fire him. Try him in another. All men can work—in the right place. To put money back in your own business for the sake of creating more jobs is often a highly charitable way to use it. And in the end there will be more money to give to institutions of service.

All the signs point to a strenuous week in Parliament. The close of the present session promises to be as sensational as was the opening. The customs report comes up for discussion tomorrow and almost anything might happen. Should the Progressive members vote against the government, an election may be looked for at an early date. The customs investigation disclosed a terrible mess and it has got to be cleaned up.

As the death penalty has been imposed in the case of only one woman in Canada in the last twenty-five years, it would seem that there was a fair chance for the exercise of clemency in the case of Mrs. Gallop.

Misses Anna and Margaret Doohan arrived from Montreal yesterday and are guests of their brother T. Earle Doohan, Regent street.

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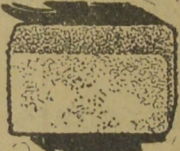
