AUTHORITY SAYS UMPIRE WAS WRONG

J. B. Foster of American Sports Publishing Co., Gives Decision on Point of 11th Inst.

J. B. Foster, baseball expert of the American Sports Publishing Company, 45 Rose street, New York, has decided that Umpire Lee Harrison was wrong in declaring a run scored at Queen's Square the evening of the 11th when Imperials defeated Devon. Mr. Foster prepares the Spalding Baseball Guide and is recognized as an authority. The point was referred to him by the Daily Mail as many fans disagreed with Umpire Lee Harrison at the time and it was desired that the matter be settled.

Mr. Foster is plain and blunt in his statement on the point. His letter contains the following:—

"The run did not count. The umpire was wrong. The third hand out was cut before reaching first base and the run could not count."

Facts of Case.

The incident of the Imperial-Devon game was stated to Mr. Foster as follows:—E. Miles of Devon was on third as a base-runner. Irvine of Devon was at bat. Miles started to steal. Practically simultaneously with his reaching the plate the batter hit the ball and was fielded out on the resulting fly ball.

Umpire Harrison held that the run was scored by Miles who he claimed had scored before the play which resulted in Irvine being put out was completed.

The statement of Mr. Foster is that the putout on the batter prevented the scoring of the run.

Marysville won its fourth straight game of the York County Amateur League last evening when they defeated the Devon team at the Devon diamond by the score of eight to one. "Johnson" Keene pitched the entire game for Devon and had he had the proper support at critical moments the score would have been different. Keene pitched a good game and although eight hits were made off his delivery he had nine strike-outs to his credit.

"Bob" Estey was Marysville's choice for mound duty, and he pitched good ball, allowing the Devon team but three hits and striking out eight batters. He was inclined to be a bit wild and hit two Devon men.

The Scoring.

Marysville went into the run column in the first inning. Two hits, an error by H. Miles and a wild pitch gave them two runs.

The lone Devon tally came in their half of the inning. Watson reached first when E. MacPherson muffed his rifle, he went to third on Keene's single and scored on Bailey's error. Keene stole second and went to third on the play at the plate. Miles reached first on Bailey's error which let Watson score. Ratter fled out to L. White. Staples struck out. Rice was hit by Estey and filled the bases. Brown came to bat with two out and bunted a slow roller to Estey who forced Keene out at home. That ended Devon's chances of scoring for the inning. Devon also got men on second and third in later innings but could not hit Estey safely.

Marysville added five runs in the third when a brace of errors, a sacrifice hit by Page, a base on balls, a three base hit by Bailey, and singles by L. MacPherson and Minue brought their total to seven. Nothing was done until the seventh frame when Earle MacPherson stepped into one of Keene's fast ones for a circuit walllop 1st was all over but the cheering when Estey struck out two of the three batters which faced him in the last half of the seventh frame. Rice the Devon catcher got his fingers hurt at last night's game by a foul ball. He was replaced by Smith. The latter was replaced by L. Miles in the last inning. Devon also has two

other catchers in H. Miles the third baseman and Dunphy who played the last inning in centre field. The box score and summary follow:—

DEADLOCK ON QUESTION OF SEPARATING

**Opposition to Formation
of N. B. A.A.A. is
Strong Enough to
Block the Saint John
Move.**

Saint John, June 22—Twenty-three New Brunswick amateur clubs were represented at a general meeting held in the Board of Trade rooms last night with W. E. Sterling vice-president of the Maritime Provinces branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, presiding, and Ralph Isaacs acting as secretary.

The chairman explained to a gathering of about 50 that he had received word that the Halifax Wanderers and other Nova Scotia clubs were desirous of breaking clear of the Maritime branch and forming a branch for Nova Scotia as it was believed that the work for the province could be handled in a much quicker manner.

Mr. Stirling said that he had been approached by members of different clubs in New Brunswick to call the meeting for the purpose of finding out if the New Brunswick clubs were willing to recommend to the annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C. to be held in September, that they wished to form an N. B. branch. The vice-president spoke of the great assistance that had been given to him by the clubs during his term of office and thought that if all the clubs in New Brunswick would get behind the amateur movement everything would work out well. At the present time with the Maritime branch it cost \$100 in fees and the one branch only had nine votes, but with three branches it would cost \$300 dues for the three and would give the Maritimes 27 votes at the annual meeting of the Canadian body.

Opinions Expressed.

After an expression of opinion by a number of delegates, the matter was put to a vote, which resulted in a deadlock, 22 votes for a New Brunswick branch and a similar number voting to remain in the Maritime branch. As Chairman Stirling did not vote, the matter was dropped and the next time it will be heard will be at the annual meeting.

The result of the voting by clubs and the number of votes entitled to each club follows:

In favor of a separate branch—St. Rose's 2, Water Department 2, Martellos 1, Y. M. C. I. 3, Wanderers 2, East Saint John 2, Trojans 2, Saint Johns 2, St. Peter's 2, Y. M. H. A. 1, U. N. B. (Fredericton) 1, Woodstock 1, St. Stephen 1.

Against—M. A. A. A. Moncton, 2; C. C. J. A. Moncton, 3; C. N. R. Moncton, 3; Atlantics, Moncton, 3; South End, Saint John, 2; Saint John the Baptist, Saint John, 2; Saint John Hockey Club 2, St. Peter's 1, Devon 1, Sackville 3.


