## HON. MR. PATENAUE ISSUES A STATEMENT IN APPROVAL OF THE CONSERVATIVE POLICY

Montreal, June 10—"I am happy to hail with favor the declaration of Mr. Meighen and to align myself with him in his work for our country."

In these terms the Hon. Esiof Patenaude in a statement today, definitely closed what was regarded as a wide breach separating him from the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, federal leader of the Liberal-Conservative Party, and indicated that the differences which rent the oppositionists in Quebec throughout the course of the last election campaign have now been composed.

Hon. Mr. Patenaude's statement is as follows:

"I have read with much interest the speech delivered by Mr. Meighen at his meeting at the Forum. The important declarations made by the chief of the Liberal-Conservative party on those political questions which were the main subject of discussion during the past federal campaign attracted the attention of both the press and the public and have created everywhere a profound impression."

#### Favors Party Rule.

"During those years of turmoil that two recently experienced two great political parties of Canada had sallied forth from behind their respective boundaries and had shattered the equilibrium necessary to the ordinary conduct of business. I am of those who think that public affairs should be administered through intermediary of definite political party."

"The experience which I have been able to acquire has convinced me that the well known main principles and doctrines of that party known as the Liberal-Conservative party applied in good faith and with understanding are the only ones which make for the prosperity and the peace of this country."

One can affirm that Canada as she is today is the product—the result—of the application of these principles and this doctrine. It is

therefore elemental that the best interests of the country demand that the Conservative party be united and that its ranks be straightened out again."

#### Liberals Blamed.

"This necessity becomes evident if one but looks as the Government at present in power that so-called Liberal Government which riding on the brink of a crisis, submits itself to the mastery of outsiders in order to weather the storm. It gives from day to day thanks to a blood transfusion which the Progressive party feeds it in small doses exacting in return heavy compensations to the detriment of the prosperity of the country."

"The declarations which we have just heard coming from the mouth of our party chief on the question of autonomy, be it of Canada or of its provinces, of the rights of the minorities, of the French language and its influence throughout the country, brings the Conservative party back to its ancient traditions and vindicates our campaign of last autumn. We preached then what we believed to be the true Conservative doctrine and we are happy to find that doctrine again on the lips of the present chief of the Conservative party."

#### Meighen For Unity.

"Remembering the past and inspired by the thoughts and aspirations of the fathers of Confederation, Mr. Meighen is endeavoring to gain both unity within his own party and unity within the Dominion of Canada. Speaking in my own name, I desire to associate myself with these sentiments and I have confidence that all true Conservatives will do the same."

"It has happened that I have differed in opinion from my chiefs and I have at the time expressed my reasons for so doing without hesitation but with regret for the necessity of doing so. I am happy today to hail with favor the declarations of Mr. Meighen and to align myself with him in his work for our country."

## LETTER THIEF GETS A TERM IN THE PEN

Kentville, June 10—Floyd Cogswell, mail carrier between Canning and West Glenmount, charged with stealing a letter, the property of Stanley Brewster, was found guilty by Judge Martell in County Court this morning, and sentenced to three years in Dorchester. On another charge of forgery, in connection with the same matter, Cogswell, an advice of counsel pleaded guilty, and for this offence was also sentenced to three years. The sentences are to run concurrently.

On Tuesday, Cogswell was acquitted of stealing a registered letter, addressed to Mrs. Bethune, at West Glenmount, the property of the Post Master General of Canada. G. C. Nowlan, M. P. P., Crown Prosecutor appeared for the prosecution and B. W. Roscoe, K. C., for the defence.

## THE CUSTOMS ENQUIRY IS NEARING END

Ottawa, June 10—Expectation is that the investigation into the administration of the Department of Customs and Excise by parliamentary committee will conclude tomorrow.

This afternoon brief sitting was devoted to the receipts of auditors reports and examination of a few witnesses on points raised by those reports.

In answer to a question by B. Donaghy, M. P., member of the committee, the auditors stated that the books of four Toronto firms which they had examined were found to be perfectly satisfactory. These firms were Stapells-Fletcher, Ltd., Silks, Limited, Doherty Mfg. Co., Ltd., and Prince Mfg. Company. The remaining firm, A. E. Rea and Company, it was reported, had not been engaged in business for a great many years.

Witnesses this afternoon answered a number of questions put by R. L. Calder, K. C., committee counsel, on the business of the European Silk Company, at Toronto, and The Clever Dress Company of Montreal. In the case of both these firms the auditors reported that they were unable to locate all books and records required.

## WARNS WOMEN AGAINST EVILS OF SMOKING

Montreal, June 10—Excessive smoking and drinking and the use of cosmetics by women were condemned yesterday by Dr. Wolfi Freudenthal, of New York City at a gathering of ear throat and nose specialists.

Excessive smoking is bad for men and women, he said but especially for women, because the linings of the throat and nose of women are so much more delicate than those of men. Cosmetics Dr. Freudenthal stated, also affect the nose and throat, irritating the membranes and sometimes causing asthma.

Alcohol in excess, the speaker said, is bad for the throat and breathing apparatus but when used properly is valuable as a medicine, particularly in such diseases as tuberculosis and diabetes. Dr. Freudenthal criticized prohibition saying that he morals of young girls of the United States are being spoiled through it.

"Formerly a young girl never touched whisky" he said "and now she drinks with the boys."

## TRIAL OF MRS GALLOP IS NOW GOING ON

Roberval, June 10—The murder charge laid against Mrs. Emily Sprague Gallop, who is accused of having poisoned her husband, Abraham Gallop, a New Brunswick, on Aug. 5, 1925, was aired in the criminal assize court here today, with Mr. Justice Gibson presiding.

It was not until after 2 o'clock this afternoon that the first witness was called and this was Edward Taylor, who had exhumed the body of the deceased under authorization of the police, following the burial of Gallop in New Brunswick. Mr. Taylor's evidence was on his duties in that connection.

He was followed by Dr. W. Abrahamson, who has been responsible for conveying the viscera of the dead man to Dr. Wilfrid Derome, provincial autopsist.

Following the testimony of these witnesses the case was adjourned until tomorrow.

#### Asks Jury Dismissed.

Earlier in the day an animated hour was passed in court when the counsel for the defense Maitres Allyn Tascheran, K. C., and Antoine Rivard, demanded that the jury should be dismissed, inasmuch as a number of witnesses would be summoned who would be unable to talk French.

This was opposed by Maitre Valmore Bienvenue, who claimed that the circumstances did not justify this step. Mr. Justice Gibson took the motion on deliberation, but later M. Tascheran and M. Rivard withdrew it and the incident closed.

The sheriff had assigned only French-Canadians as jurors, and it was pointed out that should the motion be accorded the case would have to be set back to the next session of the criminal court.

## SUNDAY EGGS FOR THE CHURCH

Tifton, Ga., June 11—A novel plan for solving the financial problems of rural churches has been started by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Marchant. For the last two years the Marchants have been giving the proceeds of sales of all their "Sunday eggs" to the Oak Grove Baptist church. In addition they have planted half an acre in corn which also will be devoted exclusively to the church.

From Easter Sunday 1924 to Easter of 1925, the Marchants contributed 1,140 "Sunday eggs" which brought \$28.50 into the church plate. From the half acre of corn \$18.50 has been turned over.

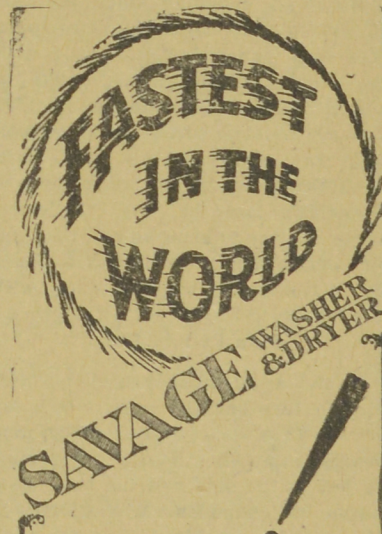
