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# Berlenbach Got Decision Over Young Stribling

**Bout Went Fifteen Rounds Full Distance at New York—Huge Crowd Present—Stribling Often Clinched—Both Finished Well.**

Yankee Stadium, New York, June 10—Paul Berlenbach, world's lightweight champion, successfully defended his title in a 15-round match with Young Stribling, of Georgia, at the Yankee Stadium tonight. The fight was uninteresting except in spots owing to Stribling's inability to stand up and fight in the open against the champion.

The fight was staged before a picturesque crowd of 56,000 spectators. Berlenbach had an advantage of three and one-half pounds in weight, entering the ring at 174½ to Stribling's 171.

Round 1—Stribling landed the first punch, a light right to the chin. Berlenbach came back with a weak left to the body. They danced around cautiously. Berlenbach ripped his left to the challenger's ribs at close quarters. Berlenbach missed a left lead and took Stribling's right to the head. They clinched and Berlenbach scored to the body with his left.

Round 2—Stribling rushed in, but Berlenbach clinched. A left to the body caused Stribling to back. Another left sent the challenger's head back but the blows were weak. The referee cautioned Stribling for holding. A right to the body and a left to chin sent the champion to the corner. A right to the face forced the champion to clinch just as the bell rang.

**Pair Punch Closely.**

Round 3—Stribling stuck his left in Berlenbach's face. At close quarters both punched to the body with no damage. Another straight left to the face forced the champion to give ground. Stribling turned the champion half way around with a sharp left. Berlenbach landed a weak left to Stribling's face, but the challenger came in close to hang on and tied him up. Berlenbach drove his left to Stribling's mid-section simultaneously with the bell.

**Puts Left to Face.**

Round 4—Stribling put over a left to the face and the usual clinch followed. They danced around. Stribling leading in an effort to find an opening. A left to the side and the head staggered the champion. A short left to the face brought blood from the challenger's mouth. Another left to the head sent Stribling to the ropes and he dove into a clinch immediately. Two lefts to the head staggered the challenger and he backed up. Another short left to the face stung Stribling, but the bell prevented the champion's follow up.

**Both Miss and Clinch.**

Round 5—Both missed heads and they clinched. A left and right to the face left Stribling wide open and the champion crashed over his driving left. Stribling landed a hard right to the body, but took Berlenbach's left to the face. Both landed lefts to the head and then clinched. The crowd hissed as Stribling came in close to hang on. A driving left square to the face forced the champion back. They were dancing at the bell.

**Challenger Weakened.**

Round 6—Stribling walked into a left to the face and then grabbed to clinch. A left to the ribs lifted Stribling off his feet. They clinched and danced as the crowd hooted for action. Two lefts to the head and one to the body weakened the challenger and he covered up. The champion was forcing the fight. A ripping left to the ribs caught Stribling open and he clinched just as the bell rang.

**Stribling Punished.**

Round 7—Stribling landed a hard right to Berlenbach's ribs, then crossed with a left to the face. Berlenbach caught Stribling coming in punishing him fiercely with his driving left to the body. Clinch followed clinch as they fought cautiously. Two more crashing lefts to the head brought fresh blood from the challenger's

mouth. The champion showered his rival with a stinging body attack as Stribling continued to hold on. The champion came out of a clinch with blood coming from his left eye just as the round ended.

**Stribling Falls.**

Round 8—Stribling sent Berlenbach's head back with a left and the usual clinch followed. Stribling tore in, missed, attempted to clinch at Berlenbach, but missed his grip and fell to the canvas. He was up immediately. Berlenbach took Stribling left on his glove and crossed with his own left to send Stribling's head back. Both landed damaging lefts to the head. In every clinch Stribling hung on. The bell found them locked tight.

**They Meet in Clinch.**

Round 9—They met in a clinch and waltzed to the ropes. The champion feigned Stribling into an opening and crashed his right to the jaw. A wild right landed on the side of the champion's head and Berlenbach paid his challenger with driving lefts to his body. Stribling ripped in a beautiful uppercut to the champion's face and then hung on. A left to the face lifted Stribling off his feet and he was grabbing to clinch as the bell rang.

**Stribling Warned.**

Round 10—The referee warned Stribling again for holding as the men met in a clinch. Stribling ripped his right to Berlenbach's ribs, and almost toppled the champion from the ring. Stribling came in fast but Berlenbach held him off, with a straight left to the face. The crowd hooted as Stribling continued to hang on. Stribling clung to Berlenbach's body every time they came to close quarters. The champion sent over a crashing left to the head and Stribling saved himself from going down by grabbing the champion at his waist. They were waltzing at the bell.

**Berlenbach Beats Him.**

Round 11—Stribling slugged Berlenbach with a straight right to the head and then backed up. Stribling attempted to hang on, but the champion's sweaty body caused him to lose his grip and Berlenbach beat him badly about the body. Berlenbach ripped over two hard lefts to the ribs and then held his challenger off with his left arm extended. The referee had trouble parting the pair just before the bell sounded.

**Champ Sent to Heels.**

Round 12—Stribling sent the champion back on his heels with a left to the face and then hung on. Stribling landed a weak right to the head but Berlenbach countered with savage lefts to the ribs. Berlenbach jarred Stribling with a right to the teeth, then punished him to the body as Stribling came in to hang on, another slight left to the face brought fresh blood from the challenger's mouth. Stribling was not landing a blow as he tried to evade Berlenbach's onslaught at close quarters. Stribling was hanging on as usual at the bell.

**Stribling Dances in.**

Round 13—Stribling danced in and jarred the champion with a left to the face. Stribling lifted Berlenbach off the floor as the challenger ducked and grabbed to the body in an effort to dodge the champion's right. The champion drove Stribling to a corner and showered him with lefts to the body and head. Stribling continued to hang on. Five times Berlenbach scored to the body. The bell found them dancing around.

**Clinches Hard to Break.**

Round 14—Stribling drove a savage right to the body, then jabbed to the face with his left. Stribling landed another good right to the body, but Berlenbach punished him about the body. Stribling's next rush drove Berlenbach through the ropes, but he was back in the ring without a count. Every charge resulted in a clinch in which the referee had difficulty in

## JOHN C. MILES FAILED TO GET PROVINCIAL JOB

**Massachusetts Athletic Club is Hotfoot After Cape Breton Marathon — He is Likely to Go.**

Halifax, N. S., June 10—John C. Miles, 20-year-old Marathon king, is going to make his future home Greater Boston. Confirmations of rumors to the effect that the Miles family would remove from their present home at Sydney Mines, Cape Breton, to the United States, was given tonight by John W. Miles, father and trainer of the young runner, whose sensational victory in the Boston Marathon made him the most talked-of athlete in America.

It is understood that several clubs in Greater Boston have, for some weeks, been angling to have Miles go to Boston to reside and run under their colors. Efforts were made in certain quarters in Nova Scotia to have Johnny given a position with the Provincial Government, in the hope that this sterling athlete would be kept in the Province.

However, the politicians and others have failed to come through with a position for Miles and his departure for the United States is being received everywhere throughout the Province with genuine sorrow and sincere regret.

## RICKARD NOT TO USE DUMMY

New York, June 10—"No dummies allowed." The New York Boxing Commission issued this edict to Tex Rickard Tuesday.

The wily promoter had attempted to appoint one of the head ushers of Madison Square Garden as match-maker at the Rickard sporting club, which is nothing more or less than Yankee Stadium, where Tex will hold his outdoor fights.

The Boxing Board insisted that Rickard himself act as match-maker, and so appointed him.

**Both Dancing at Bell.**

Round 15—They shook hands. Two clinches followed. Berlenbach poured both gloves to the challenger's body as Stribling came in to hang on. Berlenbach tried desperately to land decisively, but the challenger hung on to save himself from the champion's driving punches. They were dancing at the bell.

## USE OF RESIN APPROVED BY THE NATIONAL

**Trades Must be Completed Within One Week — Record Attendance So Far This Season.**

New York, June 10—National League club owners abolished "irregular" batting practice before games, announced approval of the new ball, and received reports indicating record prosperity as a result of one of the closest races in years.

Accidents resulting from balls hit into the stands at many parks developed action to limit all hitting before games to the regulation practice, with the batting cage in position behind the plate.

For years, it was pointed out, groups of players have gathered on the sidelines to hunt and bat fungoes before and after the regular practice sessions. It was the opinion of owners that this custom has produced too much activity on the field for spectators to be adequately protected.

**Resin Approved.**

The new ball and use of resin by pitchers has generally improved the game this year, in the estimation of the magnates, who indicated at the close of the meeting that no change in the sphere will be made for some time to come.

**Talk of Trades.**

With only one more week within which to make player deals for the current season, trade talk buzzed, but representatives of the eight clubs adjourned announcing that they had been unable to "do business" and that their lineups would not be radically altered during the remainder of the campaign.

In announcing that the attendance thus far this year has surpassed all records, Pres. Heydler congratulated the magnates on excellent deportment by players throughout the league. He saw indications of cleaner baseball by a high type of players in the fact that few reports of discord had been received and scarcely any fines imposed.

## SOCIAL RANK WILL COUNT IN THIS JAIL

Bedford N. Y., June 11—A separate cell which will be reserved for the use of prisoners of social prestige is included in the plans of the \$100,000 town hall and jail soon to be built here. Supervisor Edward P. Barrett revealed today.

Mr. Barrett said that plans for the special cell were developed at the suggestion of the State Prison Commission believed that Bedford might be called upon to house a prisoner from the millionaire colony of the community who would not care to associate with others in the general cell tier.

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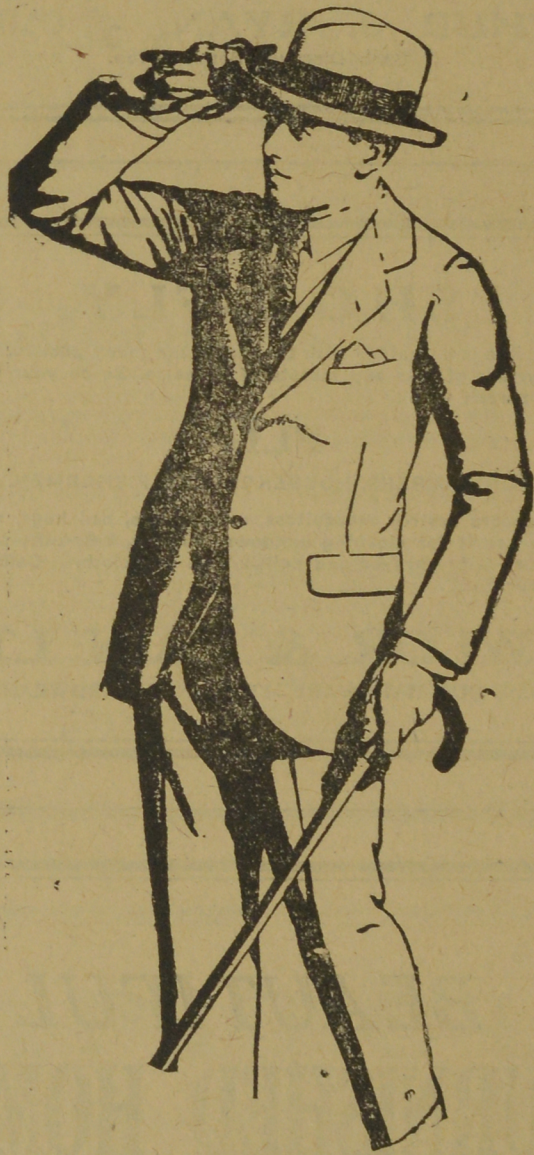
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
