

INVESTIGATION
OF PAPER-THEFT
IS CONTINUED

Several Candidates are
Questioned—Some In-
formation Secured—
Board of Education
Will be Informed.

The theft of examination papers from the Provincial Normal School Tuesday night which caused cancellation of examinations, the rearrangement of the program and printing and dictating of new papers, is under investigation. As might be expected there are numerous stories current including one to the effect that a detective has been employed to solve the mystery. This story is denied on authority today.

Several Candidates Questioned.

However there is an investigation on foot and several candidates who wrote the papers the first day and some since have appeared before those in authority in the Department of Education and have been asked to disclose their knowledge of the theft of the papers. Several young men have been questioned and one young lady also. The impression exists that Wednesday morning there was quite a widespread knowledge among the candidates that the examination papers had been taken the night before. Efforts are being directed toward tracing this knowledge back to its source. Warnings that license to teach will be issued unless knowledge is disclosed have been given. Candidates also have been required to account for their whereabouts Tuesday night.

Before Board Today.

The Board of Education will have the matter before it this afternoon on a report from Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Supt. of Education, and determination upon further action will be reached then it is believed. In the meantime the investigation by departmental officials will be continued. The offense is of such a nature that criminal prosecution can be employed against the guilty parties. The educational authorities believe that they are approaching something definite in the matter.

Another Story.

Another story which is told is that on Saturday last a painter employed in renovation at the Education Office was accosted in the afternoon by a young man and woman unknown to him, who asked to be allowed to go through the building. He told them there was nothing to be seen and that the staff was away for the afternoon. They entered and later he found them rummaging through papers in one of the offices and ordered them out of the building.

A valuable English setter dog belonging to Mr. George W. Hodge was poisoned yesterday afternoon. It is thought that the animal picked up a piece of poisoned meat while following the delivery team about the city. The symptoms pointed to strychnine poisoning.
