Provincial Chapter I. O. D. E. Elected Its Officers

Secretary's Report.

The report of the Provincial

Secretary, Mrs. Havelock Coy mentioned the fact that a total of \$18,252 had been raised by the I. O. D. E. in New Brunswick in the year for various purposes. Municipal Chapter of Saint John through its twelve primary chapters raised \$9,086 of that amount. Seventeen primary chapters exist in other parts of the Province.

In the absence of Mrs. N. C. Dougherty through illness her report on Immigration was read from the chair. The report of Mrs. John Black on Work in India was read by Mrs. G. C. VanWart.

Immigration.

Mrs. Dougherty's report states that the usual work was carried on at the port of Saint John. Other women's organizations than the I. O. D. E. took part. The arrangement for three-pound passages from Britain to Canada was expected to produce a stimulation in the arrival of new settlers although the "dole" in the Old Country had checked many people from coming. Sweden and Denmark forbid the circulation of emigration literature within their boundaries. Greater care in the selection of material for juvenile emigration from Great Britain was strongly advised. A recommendation has been made that the age of assisted emigration be not less than fourteen years. The needs of the farms and domestic service press for greater juvenile emigration from Britain. The province of Quebec is opposed to juvenile immigration into that province because unable at the present time to provide for all the native-born dependent children.

WAR MEMORIAL.

New Brunswick Chapters Make Good Showing In This Particular—Considerable Amount Collected.

Mrs. K. I. Campbell of Saint John presented a full and instructive report on the activities of the War Memorial Committee. It was as follows:—

Madam President and members of the Provincial Chapter of New Brunswick Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. As convenor of the War Memorial Committee for New Brunswick I have the honour of presenting to you the seventh annual report.

The Sacred Trust and true value of our National War Memorial can be no better expressed from year to year than by the message sent by His Majesty the King to the next of kin of those who gave their lives in the Great War—"He whom this scroll commemorates was numbered among those who at the call of King and Country, left all that was dear to them, endured hardships, faced danger and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of glory and self-sacrifice giving up their lives that others might live in freedom." "Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten."

Three Parts.

As you know our National War Memorial consists of three parts:

1. Bursaries in Canadian Universities for the sons and daughters of deceased or totally disabled soldiers and sailors.

2. Overseas Post-Graduate Scholarships in British Universities.

3. Distribution of collections of historical pictures to 1000 schools.

War Memorial Fund.

Our objective for our War Memorial Fund is \$500,000. At the last National Annual Meeting the total contribution to this fund amounted to \$487,420.11, New Brunswick's share being \$21,605.12.

Following our last Provincial Annual meeting an appeal was sent to each Chapter in our Province asking for \$6.61 to complete our self-imposed objective of twenty dollars per capita, all but three Chapters responded to this appeal.

Splendid Response.

Early in the Autumn a letter was sent to each Chapter asking them to give a certain percentage fifteen I hoped, of their earnings for the year to this Fund. Splendid response was given to this appeal. Twelve Chapters voted the fifteen per cent. and two Chapters ten per cent.

Of the fifteen Chapters which did not vote a certain percentage, fourteen gave generous contributions to the War Memorial Fund.

The result of these appeals is a contribution of \$1424.77 from March 15th, 1925, to March 15th, 1926 and \$150.00 received after March 15th; making our contributions to date \$1574.77 while considerably less than our contributions for the last four or five years, still it shows the steadfast resolve that every member of the Order has at heart to complete this tribute to the men who will not come back to us. For them there was no Quebec and no Ontario, no Middle West and no Maritime Provinces—they went to defend the beloved soil of Canada and we, who have gained so much from their sacrifice we should learn the lessons they have written for us in letters of blood.

By Chapters.

Our contributions to the War Memorial Fund this year were as follows:—

The Saint John Municipal Chapter \$794.74 this Chapter has now contributed \$11, 741.49 to this fund. Ten of the twelve Chapters comprising this Chapter have given their twenty dollars per capita amount or more and six of them are in the thousand dollar or more list. The combined contributions from the other Chapters was \$630.03.

It is interesting to note that many of the largest contributions again this year came from the Chapters which have already reached their objective which does great credit to the members of these Chapters.

Special mention may be made of the Lord Sackville Chapter which has contributed \$1073.61 to this Fund but having the largest membership of all our Chapters does not reach the twenty dollar per capita amount. This Chapter however is one of the twelve in the Province having contributed one thousand dollars or more to this Fund.

Our young Chapter the "Unknown Soldier" gave a splendid contribution as did our new Chapter the "Malibean."

Canadian Bursaries.

Since 1920 fifty sons and daughters of deceased or totally disabled soldiers have held or are now holding these Bursaries throughout Canada. Fifteen have already graduated.

There were four applicants for our New Brunswick Bursary in 1925. Your Committee of Selection awarded the Bursary to John Thomas Cook, his father John Thomas Cook of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment was killed in the battle of Neuve Chapelle in 1915. Mr. Cook graduated from the Provincial Normal School with a first class license and is taking the Arts course at the University of New Brunswick, where his advisor reports most satisfactory progress.

Our first Bursary holder Miss Gwendolyn Belyea, daughter of Major W. H. Belyea of Newcastle is teaching in the United States.

Mr. Charles McLean Jones, son of Major G. D. Jones, is taking his third year of medicine at Dalhousie University. In a recent letter his advisor, Professor George Wilson, states that "the Dean of the Medical School had nothing but high praise for Mr. Jones' work. Judging from his work at Christmas he will have no difficulty in passing the final examinations."


