FORWARD, NEW BRUNSWICK.

Premier Baxter in an interview yesterday declared that New Brunswick was on the threshold of the greatest industrial expansion in its history. He made the statement following an announcement that the representatives of the International Paper Company, Limited, and the Fraser Companies Limited, had reached an agreement relative to the development of the great water power at Grand Falls. This is a matter of vital importance to people of this province and is certain to give a great impetus to all lines of business. The development of Grand Falls, under legislative authority to be granted during the present session will be commenced next month and will be completed in the year 1928. Under the terms of the agreement entered into the Fraser Companies are to have 20,000 horse power reserved for their use and will utilize the same in the operation of a mammoth paper mill to be erected at Campbellton. The company is to be given authority to construct a transmission line from Grand Falls to Campbellton and this will be done without cost to the province.

The International Paper Company besides developing Grand Falls, will construct a large pulp and paper mill at some point near the centre of the province. A pleasing feature of the arrangement entered into by the company is that they have agreed to refund to the province money spent in connection with surveys made at Grand Falls.

In addition to Grand Falls development there is to be something doing on the North Shore, the Bathurst Company having secured the necessary legislation authorizing them to proceed with extensive developing work on the Nepisiguit River. The company intends to expend \$5,000,000 and provide employment for 1200 additional men.

Premier Baxter estimates that the expenditure which will result from proposed development of water powers in this province will run from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000 and that the tremendous effect this will have on the industrial life of the province cannot be estimated. Certainly it does look as if this good old province, which has been marking time for some years, was in for the greatest development and prosperity in its history, and the people will not hesitate to give every credit to Premier Baxter and his colleagues for the very important part which they have played in bringing about such a condition of affairs. It only goes to show that the late Sir Charles Tupper one of the greatest statesmen of his time, was not far from right when he declared some years ago, "that if governments were good for anything they should be able to increase the prosperity of a country." The Baxter administration by the splendid arrangements which they have made for the development of the water powers of the province without cost to the people, have certainly proved their faith in the heritage by more than the word of mouth.

## AN EXCELLENT SPEECH.

Hon. Mr. Reilly, member of the government without portfolio, spoke on the budget in the Legislature yesterday and incidentally handed out some valuable information on the important subject of water power development, past and prospective. As chairman of the Hydro Commission Hon. Mr. Reilly has

all the facts in his possession and he presented them to the House and Country in a very interesting way. His statements will clear the air in regard to the development of Musquash and incidentally dispose of numerous fairy tales which have been related in regard to that enterprise. His statement setting forth the governments plans with respect to Grand Falls was clear cut and to the point. A report of Hon. Mr. Reilly speech appearing elsewhere in this issue will repay a careful perusal.

It is very pleasing to note that the Provincial Government and Hydro Commission have succeeded in reaching an agreement with Mr. A. R. Granstein president of the International Paper Company and Mr. Archibald Fraser president of the Fraser Companies Limited, for the development of Grand Falls. A bill embodying the terms of the agreement will be introduced in the House in the course of a few days and its passage is assured. The present week has been a very strenuous one for Premier Baxter and Hon. E. A. Reilly, the chairman of the Hydro Commission.

The long drawn out debate on the budget in the Legislature, which began before the Easter holidays will be brought to a close this afternoon. Premier Baxter is to be the last speaker and it is safe to predict that he will waste neither his own time nor the time of the House but will talk straight business.

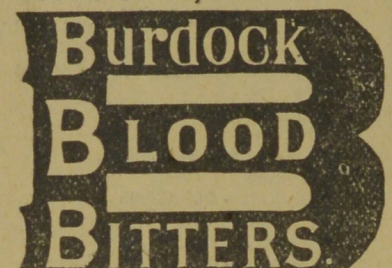

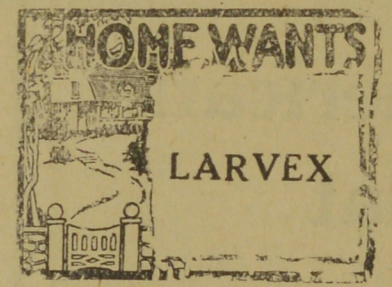
