JACK DELANEY IS LIKELY TO BE HEARD FROM

Canadian as the Light-Heavy-weight Champion is in Line for Challenge to Gene Tunney.

We may now expect to hear that Jack Delaney (Ovila Chapdelaine) of St. Francis, Que., has challenged Gene Tunney for the world's heavy-weight championship. The Canadian recently acquired the world's light-heavyweight champion and is unquestionably the hardest hitting, cleverest and most spectacular boxer now before the public. His decisive defeat of the formidable Paul Berlenbach stamped him as a boxer of great possibilities and he intimidated at that time that his goal was the heavy-weight title. Delaney now in his twenty-sixth year, rapidly outgrew the welter and middle divisions. The Canuck is within half an inch of six feet in height and his speed a prominent factor in his climb to the world's title. His challenges to Dempsey and Tunney were not seriously regarded after his defeat of "Punching Paul." The managers of Risko, who battled Tunney to a standstill at Cleveland; Loughran, Wills and Berlenbach are also likely to challenge the new champion, but Delaney would seem to be his logical opponent. Dempsey apparently made the mistake of underestimating Tunney and since the beaten man was far from the Dempsey of old when he got into the ring for the Tunney battle, others may become imbued with the idea that Gene is not a representative champion. Delaney's terrific hitting and speed, qualifications that apparently are not Tunney's might enable the light-heavyweight titleholder to "take" the new wearer of the heavy-weight crown.

FIRPO INTENDS TO COME BACK

Buenos Aires, Sept. 27—Luis Fripo the Argentine heavyweight, seems decided to try again to win the heavy-weight championship of the world. He made an announcement last night saying that he was sending a cable message to Jimmy de Forest, his former trainer in answer to a communication stating that he intends to start serious training in the hope of regaining his 1923 form. He does not intend to sail from Buenos Aires before next March and that he will try to arrange some fights in Canada and then go to the United States to take on heavyweights there.

COUNTY MAYO DELIGHTED WITH TUNNEY'S WIN

Belfast, Ire., Sept. 27—County Mayo, on the west coast of Ireland is delighted over Gene Tunney's success. It claims both the father and mother of the new champion as natives and Gene still has relatives there. His father the late Henry Tunney, lived near Westport.

YALE ABANDONS HOCKEY FOR THE PRESENT SEASON

University of Toronto, McGill, Queen's and other teams who have been included in the Yale hockey schedule in recent years will soon be advised that there will be no hockey at Old Eli next winter. The Blue will not play any hockey at home or abroad, a decision prompted by the tardiness of the construction company in building the new arena at New Haven. Delay in the work followed the death of the President of the company, and the estate has been unable to carry on, but will do so when possible and the arena will be ready for the season of 1927-28.

Tunney Has Scored K. O. Thirty Times Within Period of Thirty Years

Started Ring Career in 1919, the Year Dempsey Won His Title—Harry Greb the Only Fighter Who Beat Him.

Gene Tunney, who began his professional ring career in 1919, the year that Jack Dempsey won the heavy-weight championship, has registered thirty knockouts in sixty-two battles he has fought over a seven-year period. Tunney has tasted defeat but once in his career losing a fifteen round decision to Harry Greb at Madison Square Garden in 1922 and with it the American light heavy-weight championship. Gene more than squared this account, however by regaining the title from Greb the next year and beating him again with the championship at stake. Tunney's complete record follows: 1919—Bob Pierce, K. SAINT JOHN FORFEITS GAME TO NEWCASTLE

Another Mixup in Play-off — Unless Saint John Water Dept. Plays Will be Declared Out.

Another crisis in the conduct of amateur baseball in New Brunswick has arisen through the awarding yesterday of a game to Newcastle through the failure of the Water Department to play Newcastle the first of a series of three games for the New Brunswick title as ordered for yesterday afternoon by W. E. Stirling, New Brunswick vice-president of the M. P. B.

Mr. Stirling said last evening that in case the Watermen did not play at Newcastle on Wednesday afternoon, the Watermen will forfeit any right to the New Brunswick title and Newcastle then will play off for the Maritime title in the N. S. P. E. I. series, which starts today.

Conflicting Statements. Conflicting statements on the matter are given by Mr. Stirling and James McLeod, manager of the Watermen. A statement also was received from Newcastle.

This game originally was set for Saturday but the Newcastle team did not come, the reason being there was a sudden death in the congregation of the captain of the team, Rev. Mr. Gimmer, that required his presence and a substitute could not be secured through illness of other players.

In a statement Mr. Stirling says that he kept in touch with Newcastle in order to clean up the New Brunswick situation as soon as possible and finally received word on Sunday that Newcastle was coming for Monday. He telephoned at 6.30 o'clock on Sunday to Manager McLeod's home and left word there that the game must be played Monday afternoon. The situation demanded, he said, prompt action, and he felt that this was a reasonable time to arrange for players.

SAINT JOHN HAS THREE TEAM RUGBY LEAGUE

Saint John, Sept. 28—The Trojans were left out of the Senior Football League (English Rugby) at a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. last night, and only three-club circuit was formed, according to Secretary G. W. Green.

The omission of the Trojans from the league was due to the fact that this team has six dates set aside to play college teams.

The league will include the Nationals, Canucks and Wanderers. The first game was set for Oct. 9 on the Allison grounds between the Nationals and Canucks, who played four straight ties last year before the Canucks won.

At a meeting slated for early next week the rest of the league schedule will be arranged.

WOMAN EVEN DRESSED AS MAN DOES NOT UNCOVER

Hartford, Conn, Sept. 27—A woman even though masquerading as a man need not remove her cap in court, Judge Francis A. Pallotti decreed in Police Court when Mrs. Mary Murphy of New Haven was arraigned for. When her case was called, Mrs. Murphy, arrested early today, strode to the stand in her male attire. The clerk suggested that her cap be removed. Judge Pallotti, however said: "She's a woman, and has a right to wear a cap, if she wants to."

The woman was given a sentence of 15 days in jail which the judge suspended when she agreed to return to New Haven and to her husband, whom she said she had left after an argument.

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
