ASSAULT CHARGE

Court of King's Bench
Sits with Mr. Justice
LeBlanc Presiding —
Two Civil Cases on the
Docket.

The Court of King's Bench, Mr. Justice LeBlanc presiding opened here in York Sittings, this morning.

Two criminal cases are on the docket, Chesley Estey of Durham Bridge being charged with assault and commission of bodily harm on Simon and Perley Chase in the Parish of Saint Mary's September 8th.

A true bill was brought in against Estey in the first case and he was put on his trial.

The Chases are brothers and Estey in his preliminary examination stated that he had warned one of them to failed to do so. The assault followed. stay away from his wife and he had

Illegal Fishing.

There has been a heavy run of salmon on the Southwest Miramichi during the past ten days and poachers and fish bootleggers have been doing a land office business. Hundreds of fish have been illegally caught and peddled about the country at a low price. On Saturday last a Miramichi man was at a Regent street hotel with a Chevolret car loaded with salmon weighing from ten to fifteen pounds which he disposed to farmers at \$1 each. The same man was also in the city last Wednesday with a load and has promised to return this week. The fishery authorities seem powerless to stop illegal fishing on the Miramichi.

POTATO CROP
HARVESTED IN
GOOD CONDITION

Little Late Blight and
Yield Good — Grain
Harvest Delayed —
Oats and Buckwheat
Good.

The potato yield in New Brunswick is good according to the report issued by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture. Late Blight has caused little damage. Digging of late potatoes will be general by October and the digging of early potatoes is well advanced.

The report is as follows:—

The first half of this month was dull and considerable rain fell.

The gathering of late hay has been protracted. Only on the Sackville marshes some remains to be cut.

Grain Still Uncut.

The harvesting of grain is in progress, but a large acreage remains to be cut. Some threshing has been done and the out-turn of oats and buckwheat is good. The acreage of wheat is less than last year and the yield is below the average.

Potato Yield.

The digging of early potatoes began two weeks ago in Carleton County and is now general at all points. The digging of the late crop will be general by the first of October. Very little injury by late blight has occurred. The foliage remained green generally until affected by frost. The yield is quite equal to that of last year. Some fields of Green Mountains have given one hundred barrels to the acre.

In Poor Health.

Mr. Gordon C. Grant, M. L. A., for York, has been confined to his home at Shogomoc for some days by illness. His numerous friends hope to hear of his early recovery.

NEW BRUNSWICK
LOCATION FOR
MOVIE FILMS

Jack O'Brien in Personal
Appearances Here
Giving Country "Once
Over" — Scenery
Impresses Him.

The Province of New Brunswick contains great possibilities for outdoor motion pictures according to Jack O'Brien the movie star who is making a personal appearance at the Capitol Theatre. Mr. O'Brien although handicapped by a severe cold spoke from the stage of the Capitol on Monday and also today. He answered queries concerning Hollywood and the motion picture industry in general. Incidentally he said that he had become accustomed to the New Brunswick salutation, "Good Night".

Impressed by the Country.

Mr. O'Brien who has played with Norma Shearer and many other prominent motion picture people and who took the part of "Dinny" in The Iron Horse shown here some time ago was in Saint John some time before coming here. He entered New Brunswick by motor and passed through Fredericton on a run down the Saint John Valley. He was most favorably impressed by the scenery of the country and noted at once that it would be excellent for many film stories of different kinds. The river scenery itself was good and the backgrounds which would be furnished by hills and woods also were recognized by Mr. O'Brien as of the best. The contention that there is not sufficiently good light in New Brunswick for pictures he says is not correct. Near the coast fogs often would interfere but in the interior he says there would be little trouble with good cameras.

Intends to be Here in Winter.

It is his intention to travel over New Brunswick in the winter-time and get first-hand information of conditions. He believes that pictures with winter scenes could be taken in this country (Continued on Page Five.)

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
