STANDARD OF VALUES.

To one of us it may be worth one hundred dollars, to another one thousand dollars and to another twenty-five dollars. Don't let anyone scare you out of buying a picture for which you are asked to pay one hundred dollars or one thousand dollars. You, and nobody else, can be the judge of values. And so with dogs and automobiles and tennis racquets, as well as pictures, you and you alone can fix the value.

Don't let anybody else make up your mind for you.

FAKE AUTHORSHIP.

An Associated Press dispatch from White Plains, N. Y., conveys the interesting information that Frances "Peaches" Browning never wrote a word of the articles which appeared in certain newspapers bearing her name as author and describing her life with Edward W. Browning. Her attorney so stated at a hearing in connection with her suit for alimony; and he added that she seldom read any of the articles either before they were printed or afterwards. She received \$1000 for the use of her name.

The disclosure about the counterfeit story of "Peaches" should serve to open the eyes of the public to this sort of faking, and to put readers on their guard against assuming that sensational articles signed by this or that person, surrounded with momentary notoriety, are authentic.

Saturday was nomination day for the Ontario provincial elections, which take place on December 1st. There are in all 243 candidates in the field for 112 seats. Two Conservatives, one of whom is Hon. Charles McCrea, the Minister of Mines, were returned by acclamation. The Conservatives have 111 candidates in the field, the Liberals 52, Progressives 21, Prohibitionists 29, Liberal Progressives 10, Independent Liberals 8, Independent Conservatives 8, and Independent 1. Five of the Liberal candidates favor Premier Ferguson's policy of government control of the liquor traffic.

Dr. F. R. Taylor, a Saint John lawyer, who carries on farming and stock raising as a side line scored a remarkable victory with his dual purpose Shorthorns at the Royal Winter Fair. He captured in all seventeen prizes including grand male championship, the senior male championship, the reserve female champion, reserve grand female champion and reserve first for graded herd. The doctor is certainly to be congratulated on his success as an agriculturist.

Man, somehow, somewhere, rises to meet his own needs. The American Petroleum Institute announces that experiments will be made to produce oil chemically. John D. Rockefeller has given a half million dollars to further the experiments. Geological conditions which produce oil will be reproduced artificially. When the oil plays out, we will make oil. Dr. Baxter said that he had received a copy of the two resolutions passed by the St. Stephen-Milltown Conservative executive, criticising the manner in which the prohibitory law, and also the work of the Chief Inspector, and he stated that the resolutions would be placed before the next meeting of the government. 


