Report on Year's Work by Women's Institute Supt.

Miss Elizabeth Nutter Submitted Her Report This Morning—Fitting Reference to Death of Mrs. C. J. Osman, President—Excellent Work Accomplished in Many Lines.

Miss Elizabeth Nutter presented a very interesting and full report this morning before the New Brunswick Women's Institutes covering the year's work. Her report was as follows:—

May 31st, 1926, marked the close of another year of history made by the Women's Institutes of New Brunswick. Some of my fondest dreams have not been realized, some of my highest ambitions have not been attained but a survey of some of the definite things that have been accomplished is most gratifying and I want to congratulate you on the splendid work you have so ably undertaken during the last year and urge you to continue in this great work "For Home and Country."

"Labor with what zeal we will
Something still remains undone,
Something uncompleted still
Waits the rising of the sun."

Death of Mrs. Osman.

Every branch of the New Brunswick Women's Institutes suffered a distinct loss in the death of our beloved President, Mrs. Laura E. Osman, on July 20th at her home Grandfiddon, Hillsborough, Albert County.

Mrs. Osman was elected President of our Advisory Board when the idea was first adopted in 1920 and was re-elected at each biennial Convention since that date.

Those of us whose good fortune it has been to know and work with Mrs. Osman, and feel the charm of her graciousness and the sincerity of her comradeship, are mourning the loss of not only a leader, but a very dear friend.

Many expressions of sympathy were received at headquarters from Branch Institutes and the Women's Institutes were officially represented at the funeral of our late President by Mrs. G. W. Fleming, Director on Advisory Board; Mrs. Harry Crocker, a former Superintendent and ex-member of the Advisory Board; and Miss Nutter, Superintendent.

"One cannot, does not think of her as dead but passing eagerly on, serene and confident, to see new beauty and to meet new experiences, such as pass man's understanding."

New Branches.

Four new branches have been organized during the year at Annapolis Kings County; Richardson, Charlotte County; Bristol, Carleton County; and Sussex Corner, Kings County, and we are corresponding with interested women in other communities re-organizing during the summer months. Representatives from our newly organized branches are present today and I have great pleasure in extending to them, as well as to all the other delegates present, a very cordial welcome and I hope that they will derive both benefit and pleasure from their visit to this city, the Capital of our fair Province.

Dominion Convention.

Realizing the benefits to be derived from Conventions the Honorable Minister of Agriculture made arrangements for your Superintendent to attend the Fourth Biennial Convention of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada held in Victoria, British Columbia, June 23, 24, 25, 26, 1925. Representatives were present from every Province in the Dominion for the first time in the history of the organization.

The Annual Convention of the British Columbia Women's Institutes was held on the same dates and joint meetings were held each afternoon at which time the reports of Conveners of Standing Committees, National and Provincial, were heard and interesting discussions followed stressing the importance and benefit derived from the appointment of Standing Committees.

A detailed account of the Biennial Convention has been compiled and four copies have been forwarded each branch Institute in the Province.

The branch reports received at the Provincial office show balanced programs were carried on during the past year and more time given to study periods. One of the outstanding undertakings of the year in many branches has been collecting data and writing the history of their respective communities. Legislation with respect to women and children is being studied by a number of branches and

many expressions of approval have been received re the forward steps taken in such legislation by the present Government at the last session of the Legislature.

A number of branches have decided to build Community Halls, some of which will be new buildings while others have purchased buildings and will renovate them.

Interprovincial Home.

The Interprovincial Home for Young Women at Coverdale is receiving considerable support and has received most generous money donations as well as many large boxes of bedding. Home Nursing Classes; Red Cross boxes to receive contributions for disabled soldiers still in Military Hospitals; The Child Welfare Council; The Armenian Relief Fund; Provincial Orphanages; Municipal Homes and Soldiers' Hospitals are some of the good objects supported by our Branch Institutes.

Ninety branches have forwarded their contribution towards the Federal allotment.

Work of Branches.

The monthly reports of meetings prove that the suggestion to look well to the needs of your own communities before considering outside appeals has been accepted and much money has been expended in improving public schools and public halls; helping families who have lost their homes by fire and aiding the poor in the community; building war memorials; improving cemeteries; donating to local hospitals; etc., etc.

We must never forget the fact that we are an Educative and Agricultural, not a money-making organization. Only as money is needed to carry on work undertaken is it raised. The best results of Women's Institute work is not found in the Treasurer's report but in greater knowledge of our work as Home-makers, united unselfish service to our communities and friendly and helpful intercourse.

Work of Conveners.

Systematizing our work under local Conveners of Standing Committees has been more popular than heretofore and many branches report helpful ideas received and benefit derived from the literature and suggestions forwarded them by the Provincial Conveners and I have no doubt that the copy of "Legal Status of Women" forwarded every branch Institute by the Convenir of Legislation, Mrs. G. W. Fleming, was the direct cause of so many branches making a special study of this subject. The Provincial Conveners will report in detail the progress of their work.

Advisory Board.

Three meetings of the Advisory Board of New Brunswick Women's Institutes were held during the year—the first on September 9th at the Exhibition Buildings, Saint John, for the purpose of considering the advisability of District Organization and to outline suggestions for same. The second meeting was held March 25th and 26th in the office of the Superintendent, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton. The nature of the Women's Institute Display for the Fall Exhibitions was discussed and resulted in the following decisions.

1. Home made sheep's wool puff.
2. Fancy top sheet and pair of pillow cases to match.
3. Embroidered table runner and cushion to match.

All Institutes are privileged to compete in one, two or in all three classes. The prize money offered by the Department of Agriculture will be available again this year and will be awarded on a percentage basis.

District Organization.

District Organization was again considered and further suggestions made and a committee met the Government and presented the resolutions as passed at our 1925 Provincial Convention. A resolution opposing the proposed tax on mail order houses was passed and forwarded the Provincial Government. The program for this, the 14th Annual Convention, was also outlined at the second meeting of the Advisory Board. The third meeting was held yesterday in this City.

The Women's Institute Quarterly, "Home and Country" continues in popularity among interested Institute members and many branches have

paid their subscription fee a year in advance.

Visits to Institutes.

Your Superintendent and Assistant have visited the Institutes (68 in all) that accepted the offer of a demonstration on the making of the "Paper Dress Form". This demonstration has been enthusiastically received and practically every branch has made one or more forms since we visited them. In some instances this has been done to increase the funds of the organization while the majority have been for the practical benefit of Institute members. One branch reports the making of thirty paper dress forms. A number of other branches were visited for the purpose of giving suggestions for program and work during the winter months.

Follow-up Work.

Through the kindness of the Federal Department of Agriculture we were able to do some "follow-up" work. Miss Eveline LeBlanc, Assistant Lecturer and Demonstrator, Dairy and Cold Storage Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, who spoke so pleasingly at our last Annual Convention in both French and English on "Milk, Its Use, Food Value, etc.", spent two weeks following the Convention, visiting the French Institutes of the Province and discussing in a delightful manner this very important subject. Miss LeBlanc was accompanied by her sister, Miss Estelle LeBlanc, Assistant Superintendent of New Brunswick Women's Institutes, who took as her subject "Success in Women's Institute Work."

Dr. Hannington's paper on "The Problem of the Feeble Minded" is still in circulation and has been read before the majority of branch Institutes in the Province.

The paper on "Social Hygiene" prepared by the Canadian Social Hygiene Council is also in circulation and all available copies have been spoken for until September. If you have not already considered these papers I would advise you to do so, as they contain much valuable information and were specially prepared for the use of Women's Organizations.

At Exhibitions.

Our Women's Institute Display consisting of attractively designed, beautifully embroidered bedspreads and aprons was exhibited at the Saint John and Fredericton Exhibitions and showed marked progress over previous displays in both color and workmanship.

The register for recording names of Institute members visiting the booth proved very popular. Women's Institute posters were given a prominent place at the Chatham Exhibition and literature was distributed at all three Fairs.

The success of the 1924 Women's Institute Exhibit at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, was so marked that the Directors offered space for a similar exhibit last year. The New Brunswick Women's Institutes were particularly fortunate in securing the services of Miss Louise Wetmore, Clifton, who gathered the exhibit and took complete charge of it during the entire exhibition. Miss Wetmore has kindly consented to give a detailed account of the exhibit and we will have the privilege of listening to her address tomorrow afternoon.

Miss LeBlanc and I judged the work of the Domestic Science pupils at the Saint John exhibition, assisted in judging the cooking and canning at the Fredericton exhibition and judged all the Women's work at the Chatham, Edmundston, St. Joseph, Collina, Moosepath, Bathurst and Caraguet Fairs. Judges were also sent by the Women's Institute Division to all other Fairs requesting a judge for Women's Work.




