Ottawa June 14—An interim supply estimate in connection with the bill for \$15,534,000 was put through all stages in the House of Commons this afternoon. CAMPBELLTON TAX-RATE \$3.10

Campbellton, June 14—Campbellton's assessment for 1926 has been set at \$157,000 and the tax rate will be \$3.10. Last year the appropriations for the various departments amounted to \$151,000 while the rate was \$2.75. It is understood that property valuation here will be cut down about \$200,000 this year. Of this year's assessment over \$139,000 is made up of items which are absolutely unavoidable such as school assessment amounting to \$60,000 bond interest, and sinking fund in connection with capital expenditure already made and \$2,500 in grants to hospital and Red Cross work.

ventions have become more popular during the year. Two districts organized in 1924 held conventions again this year, the Lower Millstream and Havelock Institutes acting as hostesses.

The Institutes of Victoria County met in Andover and consummated a district organization and the Institutes of Carleton County met in Hartland for the same purpose. Enquiries have been received at headquarters from other districts who plan to complete district organization this summer.

Short Course.

The Third Annual Women's Institute Short Course held February 3rd to March 3rd in the Agricultural School, Experimental Station, Fredericton, was again filled to capacity and many applicants were refused admission.

The pupils, 24 in number including 3 of our 1924 pupils, represented all sections of the Province and proved to be an especially bright, keen group of women.

The Institutes at Baker Lake, Nerepis, Codys, Parent, Paquetville, Hamp-

ton, Hoyt Station, Tracadie and Devon, took advantage of the suggestion of the Superintendent and sent a delegate who acted as a community leader on her return home, and many interesting reports have been received of the splendid lectures and demonstrations given by the representatives of Institutes from the places afore-said.

The subjects studied included Cooking; House-Decorating; Millinery; Emergency Nursing and Public Health; The Use and Care of Dairy Products; Poultry Raising and Bee-Keeping; and through the kindness of Mr. Bailey, Superintendent of the Experimental station, the pupils were taken on tours of inspection of its various departments.

The Federal Department of Agriculture sent Miss Helen Campbell, of the Dairy Branch, to take charge of the ten days' course on "The Use and Care of Dairy Products", and the Provincial Department of Health co-operated by sending Miss Huilota Dykeman, R. N., Acting Director of Public Health Nursing Service, for the ten lectures on "Emergency Nursing and Public Health."

Entertainment was not overlooked and many "special evenings" were arranged for the pupils' enjoyment while dancing, basketball and other games were enjoyed every night.

Five applications have already been received for the 1927 Women's Institute Short Course.
