## POISON BEST WAY TO GET RID OF RATS

Washington, June 16—Rats increase in number with almost unbelievable rapidity and the problem of how to get rid of them should be tackled before the pests have entrenched themselves in a home or barn. Uncle Sam advises the country through the Agriculture Department.

Poisoning is the most efficient means known for destroying rats. Powdered barium carbonate is the best mixture as it is odorless and tasteless, Uncle Sam says. The poison should be placed on Hamburg steak, sausage, fish liver, bacon, cheese, some vegetable or fruit.

### Ald. Goodspeed's Report.

Ald. Goodspeed for the special committee reported that the amount of \$4,510.57 was claimed from the county by the city. Without prejudice the county had offered \$2,474.31 on overcharges on Buildings Account. In addition to that amount which was acknowledged by the county there was \$1,000 claimed in Record Office fees and \$1,082.73 in jury fees paid to the county by the Province.

Ald. Goodspeed said that the City Solicitor had given the opinion that both items had been paid and also had advised no payment of the amount claimed by the county until the matter were settled.

## RUM RUNNERS WERE CAPTURED NEAR HARTLAND

Hartland, N. B., June 15—Customs excise officials succeeded in capturing an automobile containing from 60 to 70 gallons of liquor, just beyond Florenceville, this evening, but a second automobile, which was accompanying the first, made good its escape, going north. The two men in the captured car endeavored to elude capture but were finally run down and have been taken to the county jail at Woodstock. The driver is named Rosignol and hails from St. Hilaire, and his companion, whose name was not known, is believed to belong to Buctouche. The capture of the first car was effected by means of a barricade across the road but the second car managed to break through the obstruction. Officials in the north of the province were notified immediately and it was thought probable that the second car might be captured before midnight.

### Confirmation Tuesday

Tuesday night His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton confirmed a class of fifty-one members at St. Margaret's Chapel-of-Ease in this city. Fifteen adults were in the class which was composed of nineteen males and thirty-two females. Rev. A. F. Bate, rector of Fredericton, presented the candidates for confirmation. The Parish Choir was present.

## PARLIAMENT MAY PROROGUE ON SATURDAY

Ottawa, June 14—Strenuous efforts will be made to conclude the work of Parliament on Saturday of this week, but it is quite possible that it will be the middle of the following week before His Excellency the Governor-General prorogues Parliament.

The most uncertain feature of the week's programme is the report of the customs committee. The current rumor here is that the committee will bring in certain unanimous recommendations respecting the reorganization of the customs and excise department and particularly the preventive service. Thus any contentious matter will be left for the House of Commons itself to debate.

The House of Commons order paper is now practically clear of Government bills. Two bills are in the committee stage, namely the bill to provide for a loan of \$12,000,000 to the Montreal Harbor Commission, and an Act to authorize advances to settlers on Crown lands. Regarding the only other measure of importance—that of the reorganization of the finances of certain Canadian National Railway subsidiaries—there is some doubt as to whether or not it will be proceeded with. These measures should not take long to dispose of, but the larger part of the work still remaining is in estimates for various departments for the fiscal year ending March, 1927.

## DESCRIBED AS A RELIC OF ANTIQUITY

Ottawa, June 14—Adopting a motion which, in the words of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, was a "relic of antiquity," the House of Commons gave authority today to search journals of the Senate to see what action, if any, had been taken by the Upper House on the old age pensions bill.

The Senate defeated the bill on second reading by 46 to 21.

A. W. Neill, Independent, of Comox-Alberni, who made the motion, referred to Conservatives in the Senate as "henchmen" of Conservatives in the House. Conservative senators, he said, should have passed the measure, but did not. Liberal senators might have tried to pass it but did not. It was therefore a partisan decision. He could only ascribe it to some stupefying influence that seemed to paralyze any desire for progress.

Mr. Meighen emphatically denied that the action of the Senate had been due to any influence brought to bear by Conservatives in the Commons. He described Mr. Neill's criticism of the Senate as "reeking with insult from the first word to the last." He added that, although he had not much respect for the Government's old age pension bill, he would have preferred if the Senate had taken the other course.
