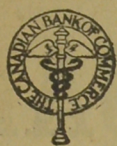

STREET PEOPLE
OPPOSE SIDEWALKD. Earle Doohan Ap-
pears Before Council
and Petition Present-
ed—Work Will Go On.

Opposition to the laying of concrete sidewalk on the northern side of Aberdeen Street between Regent and Saint John Streets which is being done as the result of a petition presented some time ago, has developed. It is alleged that the majority of the property-owners are opposed on the ground that the block is not sufficiently built up. No action on the protest was taken on account of the work having been begun already.

D. Earle Doohan Appeared.

D. Earle Doohan appeared before the city council Tuesday night and objected to the laying of concrete sidewalks on the northern side of Aberdeen Street between Regent and Saint John Streets. He said the petition for the sidewalk represented a minority of the property owners.

The majority did not want the sidewalk until more houses were erected making the burden lighter. At present but one third of the street was built up. The work done already had cost only forty dollars.

Ald. Mitchell read a telegram from M. E. Doohan, Montreal, protesting against the laying of the sidewalk, also a petition opposing the sidewalk.

Ald. Currier, Chairman of the Roads and Streets, made an explanation of the matter. He did not approve of the manner in which the petition for the sidewalk had been circulated. He had understood that the opposition had been withdrawn and the work had been continued. He could not see what could be done but continue the work and complete it. Mayor Clark and Ald. Davidson both took the same view.

Take the matter of the straight line gown. Each and every one of us willingly subscribed to the straight line gown. Each and every one of us willingly subscribed to the straight line creed. It was so obviously best for the majority. Now we are learning to admire broken lines and are affecting costumes which break the waist-line by blousing it and which have a cape perhaps a peplum or jumper to cut us perhaps not in half, but to make some sort of a great divide by introducing color or trimming.

The midsummer openings have done much to reconcile us to the sorry fate of relinquishing the accurately straight line. The haute couture was able to demonstrate that broken lines could be flattering ones, with the proviso, of course, that one kept slender the only possible way one may be smart. The consensus is that street and sports and afternoon dresses will remain short with an inch or so added for good measure for evening.

CHEESE FONDU.

- 1 cup breadcrumbs
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 1 cup boiling milk
 - 1 cup grated or chopped cheese
 - 3 eggs
 - 1 level teaspoon salt
 - Dash paprika
 - Little parsley
- Put crumbs butter or margarine and cheese into bowl; cover with boiling milk; when cold, add seasoning and well-beaten yolks of eggs. Mix well, then beat the whites of eggs until light and fold in lightly. Brush bake-dish, put in mixture, cover with a little of the grated cheese; place in moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes. Serve at once.

CHEESE SOUFFLE.

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - 1 cup milk
 - 1 cup grated cheese
 - 4 eggs
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 1-8 teaspoon paprika
 - Dash white pepper.
- Put the butter into saucepan over fire; when melted add the flour, mix until smooth; cook 3 minutes; remove from fire; add the grated cheese and stir until melted. Separate the eggs, beat the yolks until well mixed, add to the cooled mixture; beat the whites until dry and fold in lightly. Brush earthen dish with butter; pour in the mixture and bake 25 to 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve at once.

CHEESE PUDDING.

- 2 cups (1-2 pound) grated sharp cheese
 - 2 cups milk
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 1-4 teaspoon paprika
 - 6 slices of bread
- Butter the bread and put three slices in casserole; sprinkle with half the cheese and dust with salt and pepper. Put in the other three slices of bread, the remainder of the cheese and salt and paprika; pour over the milk. Place in a moderate oven and bake 30 minutes. The slices of bread must be cut 5 inches long, 4 inches wide and a half inch thick. There must be just enough bread to absorb the milk.

REGISTERED
NURSES' FIRST
SESSION

Dr. Helen MacMurchy of Ottawa Addressed Association—438 Registered Nurses in New Brunswick.

The Registered Nurses' Association of New Brunswick after a business session Tuesday afternoon enjoyed a motor drive about Fredericton and its environs. Tonight a bridge was held at the Nurses' Home of Victoria Public Hospital which was attended by visiting delegates and others.

Dr. Helen MacMurchy.

The program was followed at the afternoon session with the exception that Dr. Helen MacMurchy of Ottawa, Chief of the Child Welfare Division, Federal Department of Public Health, was heard Miss Charlotte Whitten who had been in the program not arriving.

Dr. MacMurchy took as her subject Public Health and discussed the relationship of the registered nurse to it. She strongly advised that there be a greater measure of co-operation between the two.

Dr. C. F. Wherrett.

Dr. C. F. Wherrett, Travelling Tuberculosis Diagnostician of the Provincial Department of Public Health, also delivered an address. His subject was The Value of Education in Combatting Tuberculosis. The formal address of welcome was given by His Worship Mayor Clark to which Miss O. J. MacMasters Superintendent of the Moncton Hospital replied on behalf of the Association.

Reports Received.

Miss Murdoch of Saint John, president, delivered an address in which she covered the progress during the past year.

Miss Maud Retallick reported as secretary, treasurer, registrar and also for the board of examiners.

Reports showed that thirty-three graduate nurses were engaged in Public Health Work in New Brunswick. The number of registered nurses in the Province is 438.

Miss H. S. Dykeman, Supt. of Public Health Nursing in New Brunswick reported for the Public Health Section, Miss Myrtle Kay of Moncton for the Private Duty Section and Miss Bliss of Campbellton for the Nursing Education Section.

On the Private Duty report there was a discussion on the question of fees. No change was decided upon.

Miss Bliss advocated higher standards for the admission of students, standardization of textbooks and uniform records of nursing progress.
