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Marysville Got Bad Beating From Fredericton

Score 10 to 3 in Exhibition Game — Marysville Used Several Young Players—Wades Turned Out With Fredericton — Marysville Will Improve With Experience.

The hockey loving public turned out in large numbers on New Year's Night to see the revived Marysville team make its first appearance. The Crescents took an unmerciful trouncing from Fredericton 10 to 3 but showed signs of being able to do something. The feature of the Marysville showing was the breaking in of young players six of the ten men used being new to senior hockey. With coaching and more working up the team should come through with a win from St. Stephen unless the Border Town has something much better than in the last few years.

Soreness Over the Wades.

Marysville was minus the Wades with one exception. This distinguished hockey clan has turned out with Fredericton, three playing last night with the Green and White. The Marysville fans had expected that the Penniac players would have been with their team again. Some fancy names were hurled last night with Irving Wade drawing the most. It was reported early in the week that Marysville would be without Joe Wades and their addition to the Fredericton roster will make it possible for the local team to play foreign games without taking U. N. B. players away too often from lectures.

The Youngsters Will Come.

The youngsters on the Marysville team will come along all right. Cochrane in the net and Minue on a wing were started and seemed to have enough ability to stay with the seniors. The subs worked hard at all times. Cochrane took big chances getting down in his goal. He let some easy ones by and also stopped many hard ones. Percy Harrison at centre was one of the hardest working players on the ice and started the scoring. Dow Brewer, Clarence Wade and Lee Harrison were the other veteran players.

Game Mixed Up at Times.

Though Tart Titus penalized lightly there was much tripping Marysville doing at least their share. The Fredericton defence players whose long rushes often produce goals were stopped by that method more than once. No personal clashes occurred but the game was not of the gentle variety.

Marysville sported their new maroon and royal blue uniforms for the first time.

Fredericton Made Changes.

The Green and White sent ten men into the game but at that were minus Hickson in the net and Alan Sterling and Keenan among the forwards. The replacements were satisfactory. Tracey Carten turned in a great game in the net and if the game is any indication the U. N. B. captain should have a great intercollegiate season. Edgar Wade was used on right wing and was fast and effective. Jim Sterling and Irving Wade worked at centre and Mark Wade and Lynch on the other wing. Joe Sears also was subbed. The defence was as usual and accounted for three goals.

The Game.

Play began with Marysville digging right in the making Carten work hard. In speed the Cotton Town team lacked nothing in the early stages and they drew first blood in three minutes "Bingo" Harrison scoring. The score was tied on Edgar Wade's long shot. Mark Wade then scored with a long slow shot which went under Cochrane's pads as he crouched. Clark scored soon afterward using a long centre ice shot after stick-handling through. Minue kept Marysville in the running caging the rubber on a long wing shot. Fredericton's next came when Steen was tripped as he was about to shoot after a long rush. He was allowed the goal.

Two goals behind Marysville kept

in the game feeding the subs in often. Lynch scored for Fredericton on a long wing shot. Edgar Wade carried to the net and shot and Keene scored off the goal-tenders pads on the rebound. In a minute Dow Brewer scored for Marysville. Play was fast just then, Kato Keene scoring in thirty seconds taking a pass from Steen on one of the prettiest combinations of the match.

The last period was all Fredericton's. Marysville started to attack. They claimed a goal early in the period but it was not allowed. Carten kicked them out regularly and coolly. Keene scored on a wing shot after a single-handed rush. Joe Sears began to get going better than he had. He worked his way through and passed to Lynch who scored. The final goal was by Bud Steen after an end-to-end rush.

SAYS FOOTBALL NOT TO LAST AS PRO GAME

Tommy Rice, veteran writer of The Brooklyn Eagle, who has been watching the trend of various kinds of rouphard of thirty years, does not think that pro. baseball "will get very far." Mr. Rice is of a studious analytical turn of mind, and one of the best authorities on football and baseball in America. He is a great admirer of British sport, and visits England, Ireland and Scotland quite frequently. His opinion of pro. football is set forth in the following paragraph:

Having survived the bicycle craze, recurrent roller-skating crazes, the professional marathon craze, the tiddlywinks craze and mah jong, we may modestly claim to have had considerable experience with fleeting fads, and unless vastly mistaken, professional American football is but another. Its inherent defect is that in order to be a financial success on the grand scale teams must play more than one game per week against reasonably capable opposition and that cannot be kept up if the men are to furnish football commensurate with the high salaries advertised or press-agented. To bring home the bacon a football team in a profitable league must play more than once a week. Perhaps one or two of the most powerful teams might get away with it, but what about the lighter teams that had been battered, say, twice

GORMAN WON THREE OUT OF FOUR SKATING EVENTS

Newburgh, N. Y., Jan. 1.—Charles Gorman, of Saint John, won the Middle Atlantic speed skating championship for Canada here today, when he finished first in three of the four events in the competition, losing only the mile event in the titular program. Valentine Bialis won the mile event.

Clas Thunberg, Olympic speed skating champion, failed in his efforts to set a new record for two miles here today. The Finnish marvel skated the two miles in 6 minutes 3 2/5 seconds. The record for the distance held by Olaf Rudd is 5 minutes 42 4/5 seconds. At the one and one half mile mark the champion was timed in 4:39 which is said to be put one second slower than the record for the distance. A crowd estimated at 20,000 people witnessed the event.

The point score follows: Gorman 110; Bialis, of Lake Placid, 70; Morris, 20.

Lelia Brooks, of Toronto, bowed to the champion, Elsie Mueller, of New York, in the women's events. Miss Mueller scored a clean sweep of 90 points, having her own way after Miss Brooks fell in the 440-yard event which opened the competition.

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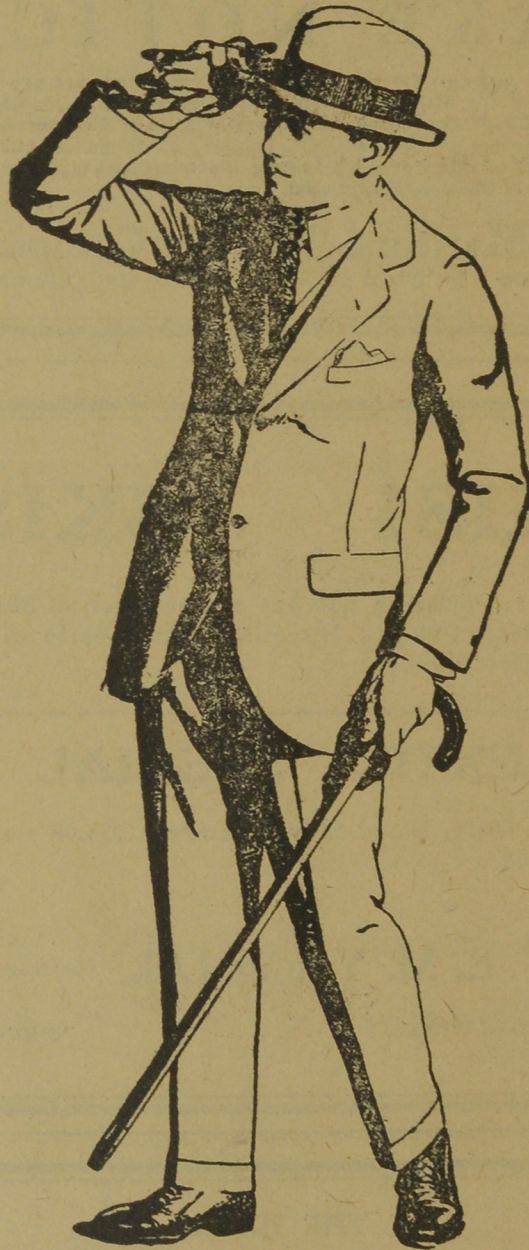
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
