## WINNIPEG SELECTED AS THE NEXT PLACE OF MEETING OF NATIONAL CHAPTER, I. O. D. E.

St. John, June 12—Winnipeg was decided upon as the next place of meeting today at the concluding session of the National Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. The meeting adopted several resolutions, thanking the Lieutenant Governor, the Mayor of Saint John, the citizens, primary chapters and the press for the hospitality which had been extended since the convention was opened last Monday. The National Chapter adjourned at noon on Saturday.

At Saturday's session most of the old board of officers were re-elected. Mrs. R. M. Church, of Toronto, was unanimously chosen president, and Joan Arnoldi, also of Toronto, first vice-president.

The other officers were elected as follows: Second vice president, Mrs. W. R. Jackson, Toronto; third, Mrs. E. F. B. Fetherstonhaugh, Toronto; secretary, Mrs. R. M. Nicholson, Toronto; treasurer, Mrs. J. U. Power, Toronto; educational secretary, Miss W. Gordon, Kingston; Echoes secretary, Mrs. J. H. Spence, Toronto; organizing secretary, Mrs. R. M. Brotherhood, Elkhorn, Man.; standard bearer, Mrs. R. FitzRandolph, Fredericton.

Was Busy Week.

The National Chapter began its sessions at the Admiral Beatty hotel on

last Monday night and since that time an immense amount of business has been disposed of. During the next year the organization will endeavor to raise \$55,000 to complete the half million dollar war memorial fund which the I. O. D. E. proposes to establish as a Dominion jubilee celebration next year being the sixtieth year of the confederation of the original provinces.

Among the resolutions which have been adopted by the convention are several having for their object the furthering of educational work; to maintain and increase loyalty to Canadian and British ideals and institutions; the discouraging and Communist propaganda; the banning of pernicious and otherwise undesirable publications printed in the United States; the greater use of British-made films in motion picture houses; restoring the former Canadian military status by popularizing, enlisting and drilling by young men; better care of disabled soldiers; a campaign by churches against a United States association which is carrying on propaganda work against religion; the reform of the grouping system among immigrants in the west in order that new Canadians may be in closer touch with Canadian life and customs.

ton Sub-district Board of Health. The improvements suggested are along the line of those suggested before.

Previous Movement.

The previous movement for improvement in the sanitary condition of the cells did not produce results beyond the securing of estimates of cost of installing new cells.

No New Building.

The movement for a new police station or the alteration of the building in Carleton street formerly used as the city street lighting power house was suppressed in the interest of economy although plans were prepared on a more or less ambitious scale. Later the proposal was made for the installation of lattice steel cells in the police station with more space being provided at the expense of the city market. This proposal was considered rather favorably but no action resulted, the agitation subsiding.

The present movement no doubt will receive attention of some kind from the City Council.

## EGG SHIPMENTS HEAVY IN P. E. I.

Moncton, June 13—Shipments of eggs from Prince Edward Island to Montreal markets within the last three days have been quite heavy, almost a million eggs having been shipped by freight, according to the records at Canadian National Railways headquarters here. This consignment represents a return of approximately \$33,000.

Besides the heavy egg movement at this season there is also being considerable shipments of Island potatoes for Montreal markets.

For Home of Good Shepherd.

An Indian girl from Devon who has caused the authorities of the town some trouble in the past, is held in the Fredericton police cells for safe keeping for Town Marshal Hayes. The girl is sixteen years old. Although classed as an Indian she does not live on the St. Mary's Reserve. It is probable that she will be sent to the Home of the Good Shepherd, Saint John, for a term.

Discharging Cargo of Coal.

The sight of the tern schooner Roseway discharging a cargo of American anthracite coal for R. T. Baird below the Court House slip is a reminder of old times when all the hard coal for Fredericton came in by schooner and a considerable number discharged each year loading return cargoes of lumber. It is five years since a schooner has discharged coal here. Before the war they often made runs from American ports to Fredericton.

Dr. Morehouse stated that salmon in large numbers ascended the Keswick in the fall and were caught by residents with pitch forks and salted away for the winter. The department has arrived at the conclusion that these fish are deserving of some protection in future.

On Tuesday five good sized fish were taken from the pool, yesterday none, and today one was landed by Mr. Smith, an English sportsman, at Echo Lodge.

Ber: Frayle, of Westfield, a local fisherman, landed a twenty-two pound fish the other day, and raised and hooked a number of others. He designs, names and manufactures his own flies and has considerable success with them.

On Tuesday a sportsman spent the day fishing, without success. No blame attached to the fly, which was of approved variety, nor to the guide, who had spared no effort to win the pair of fine sporting boots which had been promised him in the event of a fish landed. At the point when hope had been abandoned, Frayle pushed his boat out into the stream and handed over one of his original "buck-tails," which had proved quite effective. At the second casting a twelve pound salmon was hooked and subsequently landed. The grateful sport, whose taste in gifts runs to footwear promised the fly expert a pair of slippers.

To Mark Cobbett's Well.  
Saint John Globe: "Jenny's spring" or as it is known in the North End "Cobbett's well" on Fort Howe, will be cleared of debris and marked for tourist inspection, it was reported today. This well, forgotten and levelled with waste, figures prominently in one of the most interesting love stories ever written having to do with real life. William Cobbett non-commissioned officer in the British Army was stationed at Fort Howe about 136 years ago. He was a soldier later a publisher and became a famous writer. (Cobbett was battalion Sergeant-major of the 54th Regiment and also was stationed in Fredericton.)

## PROVINCIAL RIGHTS FAVORED BY T. L. CHURCH

Ottawa, June 9—T. L. Church, Toronto Conservative, is holding over his Alberta resources resolution until the return of his Leader, Right Hon. Arthur Meighen. To The Globe tonight Mr. Church said he would move it next week, or before the end of the session.

"I had the consent of the Speaker to introduce my Alberta motion Tuesday after Mr. Guthrie's motion," said Mr. Church today. "I agreed after speaking to our leader here, to lay my motion over until the return of my Right Honorable Leader, Mr. Meighen, from Winnipeg. But I will move it next week, or before the session closes.

I am in favor of Alberta getting her resources as announced in the Speech from the Throne. Matters of Provincial jurisdiction were all settled once and for all by the Autonomy Bill of 1905, and to open it all up now would be a mistake.

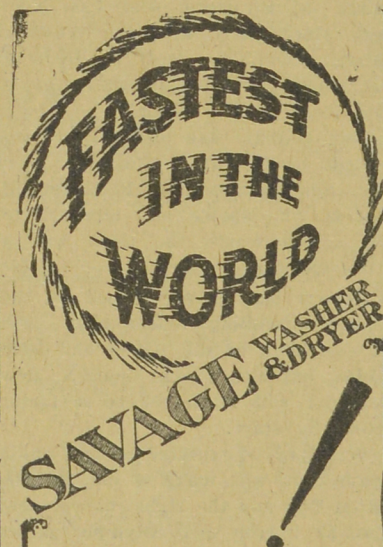
"No one is questioning the validity of the Alberta act; so why refer it to the Supreme Court? Whoever lost would appeal to the Privy Council and it would be two years before Alberta got her resources. I am for Provincial rights and Provincial autonomy. The resources question has nothing to do with Section 17 of the Alberta Act."
