## ALLAN CUP HOLDERS WILL AGAIN BE STRONG

**New Amateur Hockey League in Ontario and Manitoba — Port Arthur Gets New Men.**

Port Arthur, June 13—Winnipeg, Port Arthur, Fort William and Kenora will be represented in a new senior hockey league, which will function in this section of Canada next season. At present it looks like a four-team group, although there is a bare possibility of a second team being entered from Winnipeg to make it a five-club circuit. Arrangements whereby the four clubs named above will be playing together in the next Allan Cup campaign were completed at a conference here this afternoon and the agreement was so definite as to make it a finality rather than a possibility.

The name of the circuit will be settled after conference with the authorities of the Thunder Bay and Manitoba Associations which are members of the C. A. H. A. Port Arthur, Fort William and Kenora are in the Thunder Bay jurisdiction.

Port Arthur and Fort William will again have first-class teams, as strong as the two which last winter played a series which was only surpassed by the record breaking Allan Cup contests between Port Arthur and University of Toronto. Despite all the predictions that have been made in the East that the Port Arthur Allan Cup team will be wrecked there is not the slightest chance of the champions disintegrating. Every member of the team is still in the city, with the exception of Bill Brydges, and a candidate for his position at right defense will be no less a person than Martin Burke of Stratford who has been here since early in May. Another candidate will be Andy Mulligan, a youngster from Winnipeg who is said to be a real comer.

Fort William has lost only Howard of last year's team and has for new materials Ingram and Pettinger of Regina who should add strength to the attack where the team was a trifle weak last winter.

Kenora last year had one of the fastest travelling teams ever seen at the Head of the Lakes and with added experience and some new material will no doubt be a factor from the start.

Winnipeg is expected to trot out a team that will make a bid for the Allan Cup and the right to represent Canada in the next Olympic games. The organization of the new circuit means the return of Winnipeg to the C. A. H. A. after an absence of a year.

## SWEETSER TO TAKE A REST

New York, June 13—Jess Sweetser returned to the United States today with the British amateur golf crown as out of championship play for the remainder of the year. This was made known tonight by his physician, Dr. G. M. Dear, when Sweetser had been taken to the Lawrence Park Hospital. Dr. Dear said that he had ordered a long rest from the after effects of influenza and nervous strain that Sweetser had experienced while abroad.

## Rothsay Collegiate Cleaned up Interschool Track Meet on Saturday

**Total of 43 Points for Blue and White—Fredericton and Saint John High Tied With 23 Each—Four Records Broken.**

Saint John, June 14—Four records were broken at the annual inter-scholastic track and field meet held on the Rothsay Collegiate School grounds Saturday afternoon. Rothsay took the first place with 43 points, the Saint John and Fredericton High Schools tied for secondary honors with 23 points each, and St. Vincent's brought up the rear with one point.

Rivers 16-year-old Saint John High School flash, smashed the records in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and forced McCurdy speedy Rothsay cinder man, to be content with second place in both events. The new record for the century is 10 and one-fifth seconds. McCurdy has negotiated the distance in this time more than once while in training for the meet but Rivers got away to a perfect start in both races and was never headed. The new time for the 220 yrd dash is 2:2 seconds flat.

### The Pole Vault.

McAvity, of Rothsay, romped home with the bacon in the pole vault, another event which furnished the crowds of spectators with good competition. McAvity soared to a height of 10 feet six and three-quarter inches, surpassing the former record by four inches. McDougall, Rothsay and Dugan, Fredericton tied for premier honors in the high jump by climbing to five feet four and three quarter inches. This was the fourth event in which the record was bested.

The mile run was won by McDougall, Rothsay. No local runners placed in this event. Fredericton took both second and third places. McDougall ran a heady race and breasted the tape with a pretty

## WORLD'S RECORD FOR GAMES WON IS THE CLAIM

## ADVANCED LEGISLATION FOR ANGLING

The State of Connecticut has put into effect the most advanced methods in America for the propagation and protection of its brook trout. The State Fisheries Commission has been given an initial appropriation of \$50,000 with which to carry out the plan. One hundred miles of brook trout waters on seven of the best streams of the State have been leased by the Commission. The stocking is being done solely with fish from six to nine inches in length planting approximately 500 to the mile. All leased streams are patrolled by the State and the regulations governing fishing on such streams protect the interests of the property owners. Stiles are being built over all fences anglers are required to keep within ten feet of the stream bank, posters mark the location of trails and no fires are permitted except with the express consent of the land owners. Leased streams are kept closed until April 15, though the legal season opens April 1.

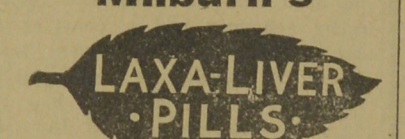
## ISLAND HORSEMAN PASSED AWAY

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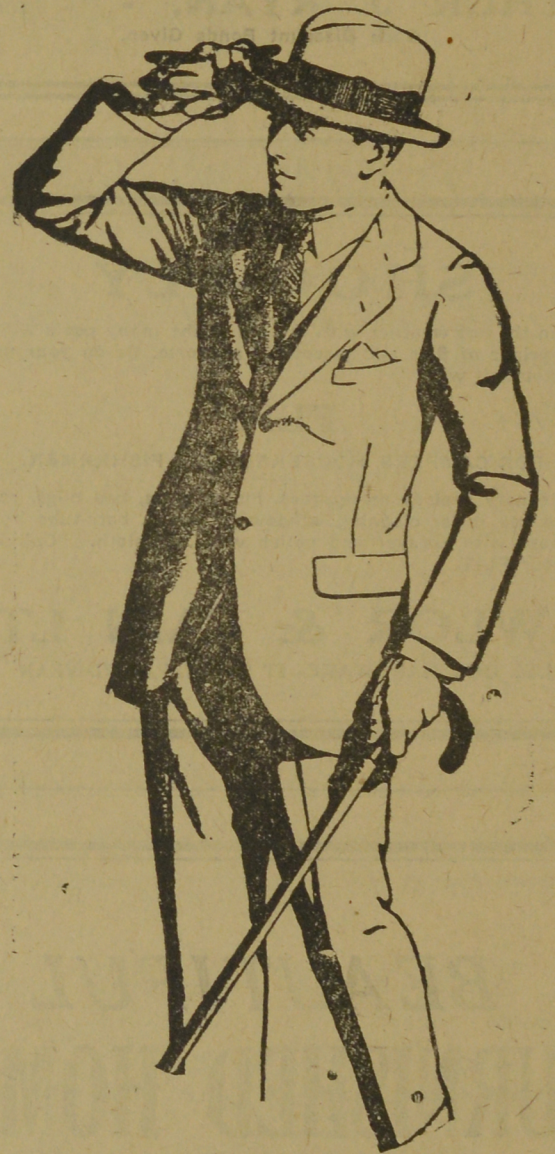
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
