PINKS POPULAR.

Stripes and graduated sombre plaids, subtly harmonized designs of the less striking variety, these are the pieces de resistance decorative for his season's sporting mode. Subdued coloring is the key-note of the mode with just enough occasional flashes of brilliance to remove any hint of monotony.

A border of lavender and rose and pink, for instance will serve as the most appropriate edge for a sports frock of pink washable silk. The accompanying hat should be of lavender and if one is very chic and rather daring she may sport a pair of pink doekin gloves.

Pink, incidentally has a present importance in the realm of color which can hardly be too much emphasized. There are blush-pink flowers for one's boutonniere and for one's hat of black milan. There are pink linings to be glimpsed with in the afternoon coat of faille or satin and facings of pink for the popular evening frock of tulle or lace or crepe. Evening gowns in crystal-bedecked pink are still fashion's favorite for the tripping of the light fantastic. Pure whites are always good but this season at least those which are a bit less pure, a bit off-color, are to be preferred.

Still one is tempted to put in a word or two in favor of the perennial whites. For the middle aged woman, particularly indulgence in pastels is a matter for very knowing discretion. There is nothing more attractive for the older woman than plain white—with that is proved year after year at Palm Beach by those of the aforementioned years who are numbered among the country's social elite.

Filled Strawberry Cake.

2 cups strawberries
2 cups whipped cream
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1-2 cup boiling water
Pinch of salt
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
Beat the sugar and yolks of eggs until light; add the boiling water and mix well; add the sifted flour, baking powder and salt, the flavoring and mix them. Add the stiffly beaten whites of eggs and fold in very carefully. Grease tube pan and sprinkle with flour. Pour in the mixture; sprinkle with powdered sugar, bake in moderate oven 45 minutes. Turn the cake out on cake cloth or rack. When cold, cut the top off the cake about 1 inch thick; with sharp knife remove the centre of cake leaving 1-2 inch all around. Fill the cavity of the cake with the strawberries which have been washed, hulled and cut in half and covered with sugar. Return the top to cake and cover with the whipped cream or marshmallow whip. Garnish with a few whole strawberries.

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE.

1 1-2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
1-2 cup milk
3 cups strawberries
1 cup sugar
Sift the flour, baking powder and salt into bowl, add the shortening and rub in very lightly; add milk enough to make a soft dough and pat evenly. Brush the top with milk and sprinkle with sugar. Put in hot oven 20 to 25 minutes. Cool, split and fill with strawberries that have been crushed and sweetened to taste. This can be served with plain or whipped cream.

U.S. SPORTSMEN HAD GOOD LUCK BEAR HUNTING

Passed Through Montreal with the Pelts of Three Bears Taken From the Tobique.

Montreal, Que., June 11—With three black bear in their bag, one tipping the scale at 500 pounds, R. E. Treman and J. R. Whitaker, well known sportsmen of Ithaca, New York passed through Montreal last night on their way home after an eight day hunting trip in New Brunswick where they had been after black bear in the neighborhood of Riley Brook under the guidance of Charles Barker, the outfitter of that territory. In addition to the black bear, the returning sportsmen had with them a very fine specimen of a lynx.

Mr. Howard's Views.

The hunting of black bear in the New Brunswick forests is not as a rule gone in for by sportsmen, according to C. K. Howard, General tourist agent of the Canadian National Railways, the impression being that the pelts of the black bear are not in a good condition in the spring. "This impression which exists in the minds of big game hunters, is entirely wrong," said Mr. Howard, in discussing the capture of Messrs. Treman and Whitaker this morning. "As a matter of fact the pelt of the black bear is at its best in the spring time, it being the months of July and August when their skins get out of condition, sprucing up again in the fall."
