TO SPEAK HERE

Sir Alfred Pickford to Address Rotary Club and Public Meeting on Tuesday — Distinguished Men.

The Boy Scouts Association in the Fredericton District is to have on Tuesday a very distinguished visitor, one who has been prominent in the Scout movement in various parts of the British Empire. He is Sir Alfred Pickford, Bart. Overseas and Migration Commissioner of the Boy Scouts Association. Accompanying Sir Alfred is John A. Stiles of Ottawa, Assistant Chief Commissioner of the Boy Scouts Association of Canada. Mr. Stiles formerly resided in Fredericton when he was a member of the University of New Brunswick faculty. He was here last year in connection with the Gillwell Camp and is a frequent visitor to Fredericton.

To Address Rotary Club.

Sir Alfred will be the chief speaker before the Fredericton Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon of that body. Mr. Stiles also will speak. Tuesday night both are to speak at a public meeting in the Cathedral Memorial Hall.

Distinguished Career.

Sir Alfred Pickford has had a distinguished career. He was in business in India for thirty years and was formerly Chief Commissioner of the Boy Scouts Association for India. He was Sheriff of Calcutta in 1920 member of the Bengal Legislative Assembly and major in the Calcutta Light Horse. For his services to the Empire through Scouting he was made a Knight Baronet by the King.

Sir Alfred has toured extensively throughout the Empire in the interests of the Boy Scouts. He has toured Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India. He has just completed a six weeks' tour of Ontario and Western Canada. On that tour he addressed Rotary, Kiwanis, Canadian and other organizations in practically all large centres.

Indians Up to Date.

In the good old days Indians living at the different reserves along the river used the bark canoe as a means of transportation, but they do so no longer. Many of them are now the owners of motor boats, which they manipulate very handily and find them very convenient.

Bass in the River.

The annual run of sea bass in the river is now on. The fish range in weight from one to fifty pounds. A number of Indians from the Devon and Kingsclear reserves have established a camping ground on Hart's Island at Springhill and will remain there while the run of bass continues. The netting and sale of bass is illegal but occasionally one is taken in a shad net. Indians are allowed to take a few for food purposes by the spearing method.

Died After Operation.

Mrs. Charles True of Lincoln died at 5 p. m. Saturday in Victoria Hospital after an operation following an illness of diabetes and gangrene. She was aged seventy-three years. Three sons survive Frank Perley True of Saint John, Harry Brown True of New York and Clark Edward True of Lincoln. There also is a daughter Mrs. George Rideout of Moncton. The funeral took place this afternoon from the residence of Clark E. True, Lincoln, with interment in the True Cemetery.
