OTHERS TO KILL HER HUSBAND**

Chicago, Jan. 4.—In the forty-four years of their married life her sixty-five-year-old paralytic husband's one kind act was to buy her ice cream once, while John Jalton Winn, former convict loved her and waited fifteen years for him to die.

This was the defense of Mrs. Eliza Nusbaum, 58-year-old grandmother, in a confession, police say she made, of plotting with Winn and three others to kill her husband, Albert, whose battered body was found yesterday on a south side prairie.

Winn, at a pistol's point, compelled Edward Goff to kill Nusbaum with an ax, Goff said in a confession. With two pairs of ice tongs Winn and Goff hauled the body into the attic of the home of Mrs. Delilah Martin, held as an accessory. After supper she dedressed the body, loaded it into Nusbaum's sedan and carried it to the prairie, abandoning plans to burn the house or bury the body in the back yards.

Four Held for Crime.

Winn, 37, was arrested in Crown Point, Ind., and brought to Chicago early today. Held also were Goff, Mrs. Martin and Marion Stringham, whose clothes were used to garb the body.

First accusation against the grandmother came from her oldest son, Roscoe, father of eight children. His son, Lloyd, 20 was then under arrest after police found a part of the grandfather's skull and stains in an automobile Lloyd was driving.

In efforts to shield his son, Roscoe told of the love affair of fifteen years' duration between his mother and Winn. She gave Winn \$250 a

month of his father's money, Roscoe said. Once his father shot Winn through the head.

Unemotionally and without regret the police said, Mrs. Nusbaum told how she and Winn had planned for a long time to kill her husband after a stroke of paralysis had failed to be fatal.

A fragmentary diary, in which she expressed fear that her husband would kill her, was found in her purse when arrested. Several months ago, she told the police, she had persuaded her husband to put title to his property valued at about \$50,000, in joint tenancy with her, so that it would pass to her at his death.

Didn't Want to Be Present.

Detectives believe Winn was involved in a recent Stock Yards bank robbery. He had a small pistol when arrested of the type Goff described as used to threaten him. He served a penitentiary sentence in 1914 for robbery.

A letter, which the police said was written by Mrs. Nusbaum, was found on Winn when arrested. Officers prevented his efforts to destroy it. It contained what the police called references to the slaying plot, as:

"I don't want to be in the house when it happens. I'm a woman, you know."

"Play holdup, and when you get him ransack through the house and tear everything up and down. I hate to do it, but it must be either you or me or him. This will be a pretty good scheme, providing it goes off as a holdup or robbery."

**PREPARING
FOR OPENING
OF THE HOUSE**

Many Members Have
Already Arrived at
the Capital — Busy
Session Expected.

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—The Speech from the Throne, that important document with which parliament will be opened formally next Friday afternoon has been prepared.

It is now going through a process of revision. Today's cabinet meeting which brought no official announcement of any kind, is understood to have been devoted to consideration of the speech.

More Members Arrive.

Members of the new parliament are arriving in increasing numbers as the opening day approaches, and the parliament buildings are beginning to take on their sessional appearance. With the newcomers as with those who have been here for some time, there is much conjecture as to what will happen. There is, however, little to indicate the fate of the government.

So far the only members to meet in conference are a number of those forming what is known as the "Ginger Group." Caucus of the other parties will take place as soon as sufficient members reach the capital. At present a great deal of attention is being devoted to the allotment of rooms in the parliament building.

Busy Session Likely.

With such an indecisive lineup in the House of Commons party whips are looking forward to a busy session. Among the members there is some conjecture in regard to pairs. In past sessions, members desiring to get home for the week-end have usually been able to arrange for a pair with a member of the opposing party. Whether this will be continued in the present parliament remains to be seen.

'Ginger Group' Adjourns.

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—Members of the "Ginger Group," of the Progressive party met in conference this afternoon but reached no decision in regard to where they will sit in the House of Commons. This evening H. E. Spencer, member for Battle River said that there would be a further conference when all the members of the group reached Ottawa. It is expected that this conference will take place Wednesday.

Amusement Men Here.
