

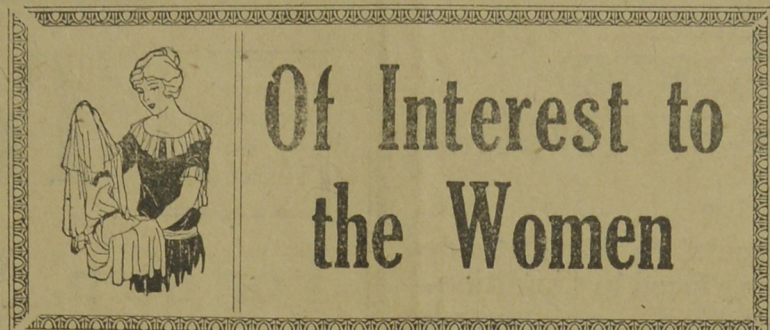

BAKED CABBAGE.

Wash and quarter a small cabbage and put it into the oven with only the water left on the leaves from rinsing. Do not cover it. When it has finished cooking, chop fine, put with it a tablespoonful of butter, a half cupful of milk into which has been stirred a beaten egg, a teaspoonful of salt and a little pepper. 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HIGHWAYS IN SIBERIA OFTEN PATROLLED BY HUNGRY WOLVES; NEW METHOD OF CATCHING BEARS

(Chicago News.)

Chamal, Siberia.—This being the eve of our start back on the lonesome 104-mile drive to Bisk the yamshek came in as I was attacking the last outlet, seated himself on the far side of the room and gave a dissertation on the pleasures and prejudices of the wolves and bears who frequent the road. Having driven over that road summer and winter since he was 6 years old according to his count he claims an extensive acquaintance with the four footed residents. His observations differ considerably from those of other scientists who have written natural history.

His data on wolves was extensive, they being more numerous. Bears he considered somewhat of a joke. The approved formula for maintaining amicable relations with wolves was:

If a rope is dragged behind the sleigh the wolves will run along looking at it but will not pass it.

Hunger Breaks Down Rules.

However, if they are very hungry which they usually are, they don't observe the rules but run ahead of the sleigh and rag down the horses.

In summer not more than two wolves are seen together and they usually avoid human beings, living on rabbits, other small game or dead animals which they find in the woods.

After they mate, during the Christmas holidays they become gregarious and in January which is the

worst moth, run in packs of from ten to twenty.

The packs patrol the roads in the hope of finding a dead horse or cow or waiting for travelers.

When a pack is seen sitting along the road in the snow if it does not lope away at the sound of the bells the traveler should quietly turn around and go in the other direction. If he does not the horses will do so anyway, as they are deathly afraid of wolves.

Wolves Recent Being Targets.

If the traveler shoots at them the wolves will be annoyed and chase him last winter a policeman shot at a pack the horses ran away the yamshek and his team escaped but the policeman tumbled out. The wolves disrespectful of law, ate the policeman.

Wolves leave bears and pigs alone. They do not eat horses, cattle or sheep or each other, unless very hungry, merely drinking the blood. A single wolf will kill ten sheep, if the shepherd is not around, and not eat one of them. A wolf with cubs, however—they always have to—kills a sheep and throws it over her back to carry home to the little ones and give them both lunch and a lesson in sheep killing.

In winter the packs jump the fences into the pasture land around the villages and dash through the latter, climbing fences into peasants' yards and killing live stock and people. When a pack raids a village it sounds like a Chinese battle.

Bears are chiefly interested in stealing honey. There are two ways for catching bears.

If the bear is asleep, sneak up on him and give him a swift kick. Then make a big noise and the bear will run 100 yards and drop scared to death. However if he is awake, it is best not to kick him as he may not be surprised.

Another way is to wait until the bear climbs after him, poking him with the sharp point. The bear will be scared and keep on climbing straight up, too foolish to know that the tree is getting smaller until it breaks and he falls. This is the best method as he may not be dead, only have the wind knocked out and can be tied up and sold to a gypsy bear trainer.

"Will we see any of your wolves tomorrow?" I asked.

"Probably, because the shepherds say they are already killing sheep and the peasants have seen them hanging around the villages. They're hungry this year, but they won't be in packs and are afraid when alone. We'll scare them off."

When I suggested that we stop along the road the first night, build a good fire and sleep there, the yamshek went out to grease the wooden axles of his kerabok. He was not taking any chances of stopping outside of a village.

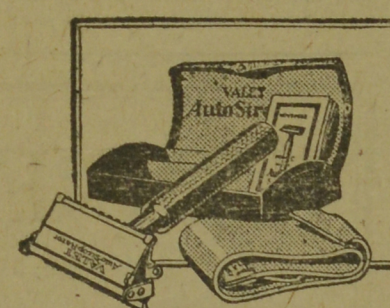
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
