## PIRATES AND CARDINALS IN EVEN BREAK

Cincinnati Presses Closely — New York Yankees Still Have a Good Lead in American.

New York, Aug. 30.—The Pittsburgh Pirates retained first place in the close National League pennant race by dividing a double header today with the Cardinals at St. Louis. The Pirates won the first game, 3 to 0, and the Cards took the second, 5 to 3.

The relative positions of the three leaders were unchanged, Cincinnati keeping hold of second place by a 3 to 2 victory over the Chicago Cubs who had previously won eight straight. In the first game at St. Louis, Krimmer held the Cards to two hits, while his mates were garnering eight off the delivery of Flint Rhem, the home ace. The Cards made three errors against the Pirates' one. In the second game this was reversed, the Pirates making three and St. Louis one. Despite the fact that they lost the second game, the champions outthrew the Cardinals 7 to 6. It was a pitching duel between Bush and Haines.

The Giants walloped four Brooklyn twirlers at Ebbets and left the field with an 8 to 2 victory. McQuillan held the Robins to five hits. Philadelphia shut out Boston in Quaker Town, 5 to 0.

### American League.

Chicago and Washington was victors in the only American League games played today. The Senators were at the stadium and defeated the Yanks 12 to 6. Walter Johnson was the winning pitcher in the game, which was loosely played. The Yanks used Jones, Braxton, Beal and McQuaid, in an effort to stop the visitors. Joe Judge helped the Senatorial cause with a homer with the bases full in the first inning.

The Tigers could not solve Ted Lyons and the White Sox won 5 to 2 at Detroit. Detroit made five double plays but their efforts went for naught as Gibson was extremely wild, walking 16 men.

## HALF MILE RUN CANADIAN MARK WAS BETTERED

Montreal, Aug. 30.—Crites, of M. A. A. A., flashed across the finish line on the half mile event at the M. A. A. A. fall handicap meeting and clipped the mark set at the Dominion championships at Port Arthur. Crites' time was one minute 59 seconds. The finish of that race was the most thrilling affair, Wilson and Doherty following the winner across the finish line in close succession, so close that there was not two yards difference between first and third.

Another genuine thriller was the exhibition century dash between H. Hester, the American flash from the University of Michigan and J. M. McKeecheneay, of M. A. A. A. The Winged Wheeler was beaten out by a mere hair's breadth at the tape, the winning time being 10 seconds flat.

As a result of his half mile victory, Crites will run for Montreal in the inter-city relay race at Toronto against Rochester, Buffalo, and Toronto, a week Saturday. McKeecheneay and Bain will run the 220 yards courses, while Montabone and Crites will do the half mile distances.

## WAITING TILL AFTER CUP GAMES

Philadelphia, Aug. 30.—The traveling tennis circus which will accompany Suzanne Lenglen on her tour of North America will be named by C. C. Pyle next month. The promoter has announced that by September 15, he expects to have seven or eight stars under contract.

Pyle said he was withholding announcement of his new players until after the Davis Cup matches, which gave rise to the misleading impression that he intended to intimate that he had signed one or more of the American "big four," Tilden, Richards, Johnston or Williams.

## Marysville Given Bad Trimming by the Imps. In Monday's Game

After Bailey Their Catcher Retired Hurt, Marysville Organization Blew Up—Score 12 to 1—Fredericton Batted Visiting Pitchers Hard—Uncertainty Concerning Future Games.

The Fredericton Imperials hammered their way to victory when they bagged eleven safe hits and an even dozen runs off Earle Macpherson last evening at Queen's Square in the last scheduled game of the York County Amateur Baseball League. Harry White started to pitch for the visitors but before the first inning had finished, Bailey the Marysville backstop was hurt when the ball after hitting Coyle, the batter, hit Bailey on the leg and forced him to retire. White had to take up catching and the pitching role went to Earle Macpherson, who evidently was not in form. "Tot" Wheeler was in great form and held the Marysville team to three hits. An agreement between the team managers was to the effect that if darkness ended the game before five innings could be played it was to stand as a full game. Had the Marysville player not been hurt five innings might have been played easily. As it happened the game had gone but three and a half innings when it was called on account of darkness.

### The Scoring.

Marysville scored their only run in the first session. Amos Macpherson was hit by Wheeler. Hodgson was safe at first when Paynter threw out A. Macpherson at second. Hodgson was thrown out at second by Hersey when E. Macpherson reached first. Earle stole second and scored on Bailey's single. H. White ended the inning by taking the count on strikes.

The Imps started in to win the ball game in their half of the inning. Hersey drew a free pass and Clark and Shannon hit safely in that order and with Myshrahl's sacrifice hit two runs came in. Coyle was hit by H. White and Wheeler ended the inning by hitting into a double-play, short to second to first. Bailey was hurt in this inning and E. Macpherson pitched to Wheeler with Harry White on the receiving end.

Marysville went out in order in the second, but the Imps thought it was time to do something for the batting average's sake, when they more than batted around their order collecting eight safe hits one from Hersey's bat good for three bases and one from the bat of Hall for two-bases. Three errors and a base on balls helped the Imps to score ten runs and lay the game away for sure.

The standing of the league up to the present gives Marysville a lead of forty-five points with tied games to be replayed. The Marysville management claim they are all through for this year, but the Fredericton officials feeling confident they yet have a chance to come through are going to try to force the replaying of the tied games. The Imps pitching staff is now at almost full strength and with Wheeler, Williams and Garvie in fine form would like to get into the championship series.

## JOE JOHNSON LEADING DRIVER ON THE CIRCUIT

Was Seriously Injured at Bangor Last Week — Total of \$5,970 — Toole is Second.

Joe Johnson, the Portland reinsman who was critically injured at the Bangor Fair races, last week, is the leading driver of the Maine and New Brunswick harness racing circuit for 1926.

Statistical records compiled at the headquarters of the circuit and including all the season's racing, up to the commencement of the fall fairs section with the fairs at Houlton, Caribou and St. Stephen this week, show that Johnson leads all the drivers in the number of races won, with an even dozen to his credit, and that he far outdistanced the field in the amount of his purse-winnings.

Winnings Total \$5,970.

Johnson's winnings at the eight meetings totalled the respectable sum of \$5,970, which amount was just exactly twice the total win by his closest competitor in the list of winning drivers, Leon Toole, of Amherst, Mass., who until recently was reinsman for the Woodstock Driving Club and Gallagher & Hammond, of Woodstock.

Toole's winnings were \$2,985, just a shade more than "Red" Hanafin picked up with the stable of A. J. Willis, of Lawrence, Mass., and a flock of "catch" mounts he had during a busy summer.

John Willard, who fell behind through vainly trying to get John R. Braden (2.02 1/4) to show his old form, is in fourth place with \$2,245, while Will Utton, of Barton, Vt., with his Roaring Brook Stables string headed by Lambert Todd (2.02 1/4) was also over the \$2,000 mark with \$2,200.
