## CAMPBELLTON GAVE CHATHAM GOOD BEATING

Score Was 4 to 2 in Fast Game — Game Was Tied Up in Third.

Campbellton, Feb. 1—In one of the most thrilling games ever witnessed in the Campbellton Arena here tonight the Campbellton sextette won from Chatham by a score of 4 to 2.

The visitors put up a good game and it was a game for either team until the middle of the third period when the locals took a two score lead.

The first period was one of the fastest, exhibitions of hockey seen in this rink both teams being in good trim.

The second period started with lots of pep and after only 43 seconds Howard on a pass from Sharpe showed Carvell that the locals were not entirely unfamiliar with the visitors goal, this giving the locals a one-score lead. The brand of hockey exhibited here tonight was one that the hockey fans will not forget for quite a while. With speed, clever stick handling and marvelous net minding the fans sure got their money's worth.

### Third Period.

The third period set the 1,200 frenzied fans on their toes and when after five minutes and 13 seconds, Kerr for the visitors, notched the tying score, the roof nearly rose off the rink with the cheering. Five minutes later Howard mosed through the entire Chatham squad and sank the third score for the locals.

One minute and 30 seconds later Wilkins, on a pass from McLean sank another into the opponent's net. This finished the scoring.

## Intercollegiate Hockey Season to Open Here Next Thursday U. N. B. vs. Acadia

Red and Black Playing Without Preliminary Game—New Material With Squad, Also Several Old Players—Little Known of Acadia Here — Mt. Allison in Bad with Moncton.

The intercollegiate hockey season will open here on Thursday when Acadia University will meet the University of New Brunswick in the first game of the Western Section. The Acadia team is an unknown quantity here but is believed to contain much of the material of 1925. The U. N. B. team also will contain some of last year's material but also will have new players. It has not been possible for the Red and Black to secure a match in preparation for the first college game.

### The Prospective Material.

The University of N. B. team probably will be selected from the following players:—Goalkeeper, Carlen (capt.) and Hickson; Defence, Doddridge, Fraser and Steen; Forwards, Keene, Keenan, Lynch, Chalmers, Gagnon. Several of the college players have figured on the Fredericton team in the Northern N. B. League.

### Mount A. Bawled Out By Moncton.

The Mt. Allison University team which is coached by Fred McLean of this city, cancelled a game arranged for Friday last at Moncton with Moncton Atlantics of the Southern N. B. League. The Moncton Transcript gives the Mount A. team U. N. B. is to play on the 11th at Sackville, a great bawling out for the cancelled game and intimates that Coach McLean was afraid to send his team against Moncton.

### The Transcript has the following:

### Mount Allison's Decision.

The decision of the Mount Allison team to cancel the game scheduled for last night with the Atlantics, has certainly not boosted the stock of the collegians, among sport followers of the provinces. No team can become popular with the fans if they disappoint them.

### Not The First Time.

This is not the first time that local sport followers have been disappointed by a Mount Allison team and their stand will probably mean their finish as far as drawing ability in this city is concerned. Nobody is going to plan to take in a game in which a team is to play that has cancelled games at the last minute.

### Cancelled Football Game.

Local sport followers will remember the cancellation of the Moncton-Mt. Allison football game last fall. Last night's game was also cancelled at the last minute and as a result the locals were left without a game. Had Mount Allison been reasonable and given some notice another team could have been brought in.

### Coaches Responsible.

In both cases the coaches of the teams were responsible for the last minute withdrawals. Coach McCarthy of the football team stated that Moncton could not provide sufficient opposition yet when the game was played at the end of the season the college team only beat the locals, who had only 14 men, 3 to 0, and were forced to touch for safety 3 times in the first half.

### Larry McLean's Reason.

Coach Larry McLean of the hockey team stated that he did not wish his team to pay the locals owing to the fact that it would hurt his reputation as a coach. That statement was made over the phone to the management of the local team. One thing is certain, however, that the Mount Allison team will have great difficulty in arranging a game in Moncton for some time.

## MONTREAL CHARGED WITH EXCEEDING LIMIT

Toronto, Feb. 1—The Star in its sporting columns today says:

"There is trouble brewing in the N. H. L. over the salaries limit of \$35,000 adopted by the league at the annual meeting. St. Patrick's, Canadiens and Ottawa have requested President Frank Calder to call a meeting here February 14 to discuss this and other important questions. There is a feeling abroad that certain teams, particularly the Montreal Hockey Club, is not living up to the \$35,000 salary limit, especially since they have signed Frank Carson of Stratford at \$6,000 a year. The bonus system will also be taken up. Some of the clubs figure that the bonus system is a smart method of beating the spirit of the salary limit rule.

"It just leaked out here today that St. Patrick's offered \$7,500 for Lionel Conacher in a three-cornered deal which involved the transfer of Sprague Cleghorn, of Boston and Jack Adams, of Toronto to Pittsburgh."

## PENDULUM OF FASHIONS SWING BACK

St. Louis, Mo. Feb. 2—Return of the popularity of suspenders and a turning away from extreme baggy trousers are liable to be the principal changes in men's fashions in 1926. The general style and character of clothes will not be changed to any extent.

This was the report of the committee on fashions to the National Association of Merchant Tailors at the closing session of its annual convention here yesterday.

Colored shirts with collars to match will continue to be in vogue for town and business wear, but color should harmonize with clothes worn.

Unfinished worsteds will be used to as great an extent as ever. Flannels in shades of grays, blues, of bright colors and of lighter tones of browns in plain, also striped and overplaid effects, will be popular. Capri blue, the new shade for flannels and worsteds will be much favored.

Coats will reflect the appearance of comfort, with chests full and well rounded and shoulders broad. The single breasted no-collar waistcoat is to be the popular style. Two or three button sack coats will be proper, but the two button models are the most generally favored. Both peaked and notched collar styles will be worn. The double breasted sack is now regarded as coming into permanent popularity.

Miss McKane defeated Miss Helen Wills, the United States champion in the finals of the Wimbledon tournament in 1924, but lost to the California star when they met in the finals of the United States national championships at Forest Hills last year.

In 1923 and 1925 Miss McKane won her way to the finals at Wimbledon, only to lose to Suzanne Lenglen. Mr. Godfree has been a member of the British Davis Cup team for the past three years.
