## NEW ENGLAND RACE CIRCUIT OPENED TODAY

Sturbridge Has Great Entry List Including Sir Roch — Subpoena Pacing Sensation of Season.

Boston, June 17.—The trotters and pacers start on their long campaign over Eastern half-mile tracks at Cedar Lake course, Sturbridge, today, opening the 13th season of the Bay State Circuit, which has grown from its modest beginning to be one of the strongest chains of the harness horse turf.

Back in the early days of the circuit, just an ordinary horse could get money and sometimes win, but not so in recent years. Now it takes a real trotter or pacer to be a contender.

When the entries were announced and the name of Sir Roch appeared in the list of free-for-all pacers, there was a little talk that perhaps the record-breaking list all along the line had been made possible by promises.

George Loomis has his wonderful little pacing gelding at Sturbridge, along with several other steeds which look to be more than fair, one being the three-year-old trotter Guy Stewart, which followers of the Grand Circuit last year counted a great colt.

The railbirds at Sturbridge last week, and there were many of them, had a chance to look over the speed sensation of the Spring training season, Subpoena, a four-year-old trotter named in the \$10,000 purses at Cherry Park and Windsor which before leaving Indiana was driven a mile by her owner, R. E. Cutsinger, of Edinburg, Ind., in 2:07½ over a twice-around course.

Devon has yet to break into the win column in the York County League, being defeated by Marysville at Marysville Wednesday evening by the score of 12 to 11.

Pitchers galore were rushed into action, five in all being used. Marysville starting McInnis, but after he weakened in the sixth inning he gave way to Estey. Bob had no "warming-up" and with four batters facing him he issued three free passes. E. McPherson had to be called upon and he forced the only batter who faced him to ground out. Each pitcher was successful in retiring only one batter in this inning.

Devon started "Nucker" Irvine, the speed skater, and let him stay there until the final inning, and he was batted hard and often. Keene who has acted the role of relief hurler for the Devon team was not himself and both batters who came to the plate in the sixth frame found him safely. The last Marysville run was made from a wild pitch by him.

### The Scoring.

McInnis held Devon scoreless for three innings. In the fourth H. Miles batted in two runs with his long drive for two bases, after Rutter got a base on balls and Burse singled. Three hits, a sacrifice and two errors were enough to give them three more runs in the fifth. The sixth was the big Devon inning, a squeeze play worked well and netted a run. Estey's wildness and four hits netted half a dozen Devon runs. E. McPherson the Marysville speed boy of some time ago took up the pitching duties after Estey and McInnis had each retired one man.

### Big Marysville Inning.

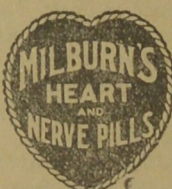

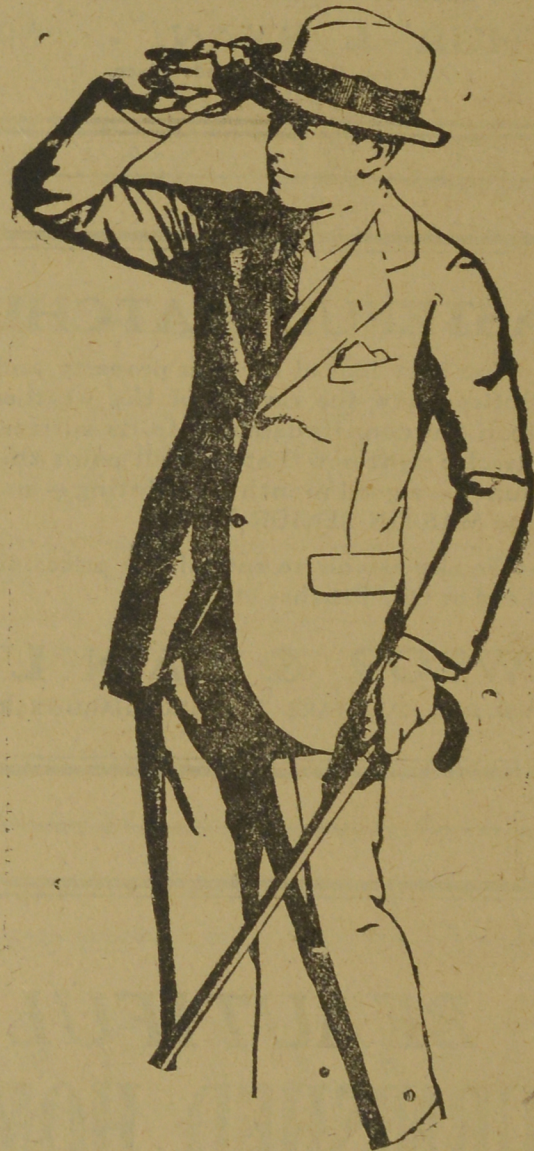
