### OPTIMISTIC REPORT ON CROP CONDITIONS

Grasslands Excellent — Oats Well Up in Some Sections — Potatoes Showing — Conditions Vary With Districts.

The fortnightly crop report of the Provincial Department of Agriculture issued this week is most optimistic in its tone forecasting heavy hay-crop and good pastures. Apples and small fruits promise well being heavily bloomed and potatoes and oats are showing above the ground although conditions vary considerably.

The text of the report is as follows:—

During the first two weeks of June the weather conditions for crop growth have been ideal. Frequent local showers have fallen and more particularly during the past few days. (Continued on page 5.)

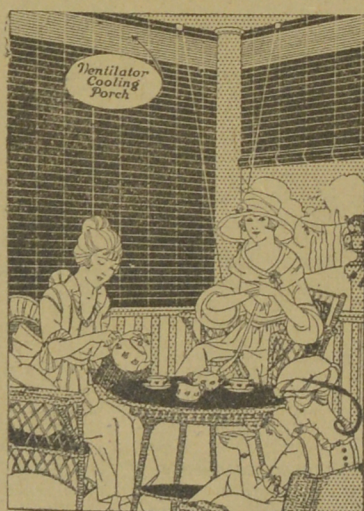
