### MOSES IN ARCADIA

No dresses shall be worn to school which are shorter than six inches below the knee.

Use or possession of lipstick and rouge on the school grounds is prohibited.

No "slang" phrases or immodest language shall be employed.

Wearing of belts by boys is prohibited, their use to be supplanted by suspenders.

Boys are ordered to wear overalls, unionalls or knee pants suspended from the shoulders.

The author of the rules is supported by the woman member of the board. They are a majority. The minority howled as becometh a minority, but his wail availed him naught against the "thou shalt not" of the Moses, come to Arcadia.

What virtue there may be in a few of the inhibitions is overbalanced by the absurdity of the greater number. Naturally the mothers of the community resent the imputation that their daughters are not just about all right. But Moses says: "Girls of today, by their abbreviated skirts, are causing general demoralization of the community."

Not only must the daughters be true to the tape when they start for school, but the boys' suspender buttons will have to be given close maternal inspection every day. It will not do, in Arcadia, Kan., to let civilization hang by a few thin threads.

## MINISTERS ARE NOT LIKELY TO BE OPPOSED

Ottawa, Oct. 7—Conservative political observers expressed the opinion tonight that there probably will be no opposition by their party to the re-election of any of the Liberal Ministers at the coming by-elections on Nov. 9, made necessary by the formation of the King Cabinet.

While no official announcement has been made it is intimated, however, that the final decision is a matter to be dealt with by the Conservative executives in the various constituencies affected.

The belief that Liberal Ministers will be returned without opposition in so far as Conservative headquarters here is concerned is partly based upon an official statement issued recently from former Premier Meighen's office that the presence of Premier W. L. Mackenzie King at the Imperial Conference will be facilitated as far as possible.

There are rumors though of possible opposition by local Conservatives to Col. J. L. Ralston in Nova Scotia in the event of his appointment to the portfolio of Minister of National Defense.

Stunts Required of the Freshmen and Freshettes at the Baptist University.

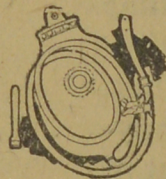
