LOCAL SALMON ANGLERS GIVEN PRIZES IN GOLD; PRESENTATION MADE BY HON. C. D. RICHARDS

Last evening at the Crown Land Office, Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, in the presence of a number of local disciples of Isaak Walton, presented to Mr. F. Cedric Cooper of this city the sum of ten dollars in gold, which was offered as a prize by Mr. James S. Neill of this city to the member of the York-Sunbury branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association who would be fortunate enough to take on a fly the largest salmon from the St. John river during the season of 1926. Mr. Cooper as has already been reported hooked and landed a twenty-two pound salmon at the Hartt's Island pool on September 30th the closing day of the season. A prize of five dollars in gold donated by another citizen was presented to Mr. Raymond M. Currie of this city, who caught a nineteen pound hook-bill salmon on August 16th. The recipients of the prizes responded in suitable terms.

Mr. Neill Praised.

The minister in his remarks paid a warm tribute to Mr. Neill, whom he referred to as one of Fredericton's most successful business men and esteemed citizens who had always taken a keen interest in hunting and fishing and was anxious to encourage the young men to take up with these health-giving pastimes. He regretted that the state of Mr. Neill's health made it impossible for him to be present and personally present the prize.

The Minister went on to say that during his term of office he had done all he could to encourage salmon angling on the Saint John River, being impressed with the great value of the sport as an attraction for tourists as well as for our own people. His attention had been called early in the season to the destruction wrought by the merganser duck on young salmon and had taken the matter up with the authorities at Ottawa. These birds are protected by the Migratory Birds Treaty and he found himself up against a whole lot of red tape. Finally however, he secured a number of permits to destroy the birds and distributed them to game wardens and others along the Saint John and Miramichi Rivers. He had since learned that a number of the birds had been killed prior to the termination of the close season.

A Restigouche Trip.

The Minister gave a most interesting account of a fishing trip which he made to the famed Restigouche River during the summer, and incidentally remarked that during the trip he had caught five salmon, the largest a nineteen pounder. He was quite ready to acknowledge after his experience on the Restigouche that salmon angling as a sport was in a class by itself and he could readily understand why people became enthused over it. Because of the fact that much of the country in which the Restigouche flows is unsettled, and there are miles and miles of quick water, he scarcely thought the Saint John River could ever be brought up to its standard as an angling stream. Yet he believed that the Saint John between Fredericton and the Mouth of the Tobique possessed great angling possibilities, and he would lend every assistance and encouragement to the work of development. He was pleased to know that a number of non-resident anglers had visited the pools on the Saint John last season and had met with success. It was a pleasure to him to extend thanks to Mr. Raymond Currie of Fredericton, and Mr. Roland Wheeler of Kingsclear for the splendid service they had rendered in the capacity of guides.

Mr. Neill's Letter.

Mr. Neill's letter of congratulation to Mr. Cooper was as follows:

Dear Sir,—

"As Fredericton's oldest salmon angler and one who has taken a keen interest in fishing and shooting for over fifty years, I need scarcely tell you how pleased I was to learn that on Thursday last you hooked and landed a twenty-two pound salmon at the Hartt's Island pool on the Saint John River. I understand that it was your fourteenth salmon taken at the pool this season. You certainly did well and permit me to tender you my hearty congratulations, and to express the hope that you will follow up this most manly and thrilling outdoor sport. A successful angler, as good old Isaak Walton tells us, must possess the virtue of patience, and judging by your first season's record as a salmon fisherman I presume you have that to a marked degree.

I was present when the first salmon was taken on a fly at the Hartt's Island pool, and have been much interested in the development of this sport on our noble river. I am sure as our people come to better appreciate the importance of salmon fishing with the rod, and its inestimable value as an attraction for tourists, that the Saint John River will become one of the greatest angling resorts in the world. In my younger days I thought nothing of travelling by rail to Boiestown then tramping through the woods twenty-two miles to the Dungarvon River for the privilege of angling for salmon, but today this thrilling sport is available within a few miles of Fredericton.

Early in the season I promised a prize to the member of the York-Sunbury Branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association catching the largest salmon on a fly from the Saint John River during 1926, and I have much pleasure in forwarding to Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, the sum of ten dollars in gold which I have asked him to present to you with my compliments.

In presenting the gold prize to Mr. Cooper the Minister warmly complimented him on his skill and success with rod and fly.

Mr. Cooper acknowledged the gift in suitable terms and requested the minister to convey his thanks to Mr. Neill for his generosity and keen interest in salmon angling.

Prize For Mr. Currie.

The Minister also presented five dollars in gold to Mr. Raymond Currie, which he said was a prize for having landed the second largest salmon and an appreciation of his courtesy and assistance to both resident and non-resident anglers.

Mr. Currie in reply thanked the Minister for his kind words, and stated he had greatly enjoyed the trips which he had made with visiting anglers during the season. He said that he had found the riparian owners of pools along the Saint John River very courteous and apparently anxious to encourage fly fishing. In this connection he mentioned the names of Mr. George Lockhart of the Barony, Mr. Harvey Mills of Central Kingsclear and Mr. Havelock Wheeler of Kingsclear, whose farm borders on the Hartt's Island pool. Mr. Wheeler he said had taken up his net on August 15th and both he and his son found profitable employment as guides for some days afterwards.

Hon. Mr. Richards stated that during his visit to the Restigouche he had been greatly impressed with the alertness and efficiency of the guardians employed by the lessees of that stream.

After a general discussion in which the need of greater protection for salmon on the Saint John and Miramichi Rivers was brought to the attention of the Minister the pleasant gathering broke up.

COMMISSION WILL PROBE N. B. LUMBER TRADE

Provincial Government Names Judge Grimmer and Mr. F. C. Beatey.

St. John, Oct. 8.—Appointment of Mr. Justice Grimmer, of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, and F. C. Beatey, Saint John, as a commission to investigate the lumbering industry in the province, was announced here this morning by Premier J. B. M. Baxter. Decision on this matter was reached at the meeting of the Government which concluded here yesterday. The Commission will start work at once and the Premier is confident its work can be completed in a reasonably short time. Complaints from North Shore saw mill operators and the general unsatisfactory state of affairs in the lumber industry has moved the Government to take this step, it was stated. The premier also revealed that an expert accountant has been on this work for some time.

Premier Baxter's statement is as follows:

Lumbermen Protest

"Since fixing the rate of stumpage at \$3.50, the Government has received repeated protests from saw mill operators along the North shore of the province, claiming they will be unable to carry on, as conditions have not improved over last year, when an emergency rate of \$2.50 was instituted. In other parts, notably in the New Brunswick Railway Company section, private owners receive a higher rate and the claim is made that operators there can carry on at some profit. In consequence of representations made at a meeting in Saint John, the Minister of Public Works was authorized to employ the services of an expert accountant to examine costs and various other features connected with the lumber industry. A member of the accounting firm of P. S. Rose & Son has been at work on this matter for some time now.

Commission Named

"Yesterday, the Government appointed a commission, consisting of Mr. Justice Grimmer, of the Supreme Court, and F. C. Beatey, of St. John, to enquire into the various conditions affecting the lumber industry, including the cost of operations, market conditions, and in brief, all factors pertaining to the industry in New Brunswick. This commission will have authority to examine witnesses under oath and will have the assistance of the expert accountant. Hon. Mr. Grimmer has had extended experience with this industry, as during his tenure of the cabinet position of Surveyor-General he produced many practical results. Mr. Beatey has spent a lifetime in the lumber business, in which he ceased to have an active interest when Stetson, Cutler & Co. sold out their holdings.

"The Government expects to obtain useful results from this investigation which will be carried on by a non-partisan tribunal of men who are eminently qualified by experience to go at the very root of the matter. It is expected that this inquiry can be concluded in reasonably short time."

BURROWS FOR GOVERNOR

Winnipeg Oct. 7.—Theodore A. Burrows, pioneer of Manitoba who came west from Ottawa in 1875 is to be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, succeeding Sir James Aikens according to a report received from Ottawa today. He is a former member of Parliament having represented the constituency of Dauphin in the Federal house. He is a brother-in-law of Sir Clifford Sifton.
