

SEED POTATO
INSPECTORS FROM
SOUTH ARE HERE

E. J. Oswald of Snow Hill, Md., and W. O. Strong of Onley, Va., Representing the U. S.

The Southern States are after seed potatoes and fields in New Brunswick are being inspected by two men sent here by the Agricultural Departments of their respective states. They are E. J. Oswald of Snow Hill, Md., and W. O. Strong of Onley, Va. They arrived by motor last night registering at the Barker House. Today accompanied by O. C. Hicks, Secretary of the New Brunswick Seed Potato Growers' Association they left to inspect the fields of T. H. Estabrooks in Lincoln and other fields along the river.

Have Covered Maine Already.
Messrs. Strong and Oswald have covered the State of Maine before entering New Brunswick. They left Maine at Fort Kent and will reenter it at Calais. They inspected a large acreage in Maine.

Will Visit the North Shore.
In addition to the Saint John Valley and other districts where seed potatoes are grown the visitors will visit the North Shore which has become well known in recent years as a seed potato country. Mr. Hicks has furnished them with names of growers and assisted them otherwise.

Demand From the South.
There is a good demand for seed potatoes from the Southern States and if quality is satisfactory there will be a considerable movement of seed stock out of New Brunswick to Maryland and Virginia. The acreage of certified seed stock in New Brunswick is not as great as it has been in other seasons.

Visiting Halifax.
Chronicle: Sir Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, arrived in Halifax yesterday and is registered at the Queen Hotel. Sir Douglas is accompanied by Lady Hazen, and motored to the City. Interviewed last night as to his visit here, the Chief Justice said that it was merely for a short pleasure trip. He had not been in Nova Scotia for some time, and may spend several days in the Province. Further than that he said he had no further object in his visit.

Preliminary Work at Once.
Preliminary work on the Nashwaak highway work Marysville town line to Killarney Road (Old Miramichi Road) is to begin at once. The greater part of the construction will be done next summer. Entre reconstruction of the highway for a distance of 5.8 miles is to be made. Currier & Seymour of this city have the contract. The chief members of the firm are Ald. Parker H. Currier of Fredericton and Coun. Fred Seymour of Nashwaaksis. No price is announced by the Provincial Department of Public Works. This piece of road is narrow and the reconstruction will greatly improve the highway along the Nashwaak.

Addressed the Physicians.
The physicians and surgeons of Fredericton and vicinity attended a dinner at the Barker House last night and listened to very interesting lectures by Dr. W. Gallie and Dr. D. E. PROHIBITION
ENFORCEMENT
TIGHTENING

Local Checking Up and Vendors Warned—St. Stephen Without Vendors at Present—Other Activity.

Reports both local and from outside points indicate that there has been activity in prohibition circles recently which seems to indicate a tightening up in enforcement. Locally vendors have been warned to observe the law strictly and there also has been a checking up on the supplies which they are supposed to have in stock.

No Vendors at St. Stephen.
Recent enforcement activities in St. Stephen resulted in that important town being without vendors as the conviction of the holders of licenses was followed by cancellation.

The Saint Croix Courier published in St. Stephen comments as follows on the matter:—
"Last week Chief Inspector McFarlane in company with some of his lieutenants paid an unexpected visit here and after a short stay laid charges for the illegal sale of liquor against five citizens of St. Andrews, Milltown and St. Stephen. On Thursday the cases came up before Magistrate C. N. Vroom with the result that the licenses of St. Stephen's two vendors were cancelled and they were subject to a fine of \$200 each. In the case of one Milltown man, a fine of \$200 and costs was imposed for having liquor in a place other than in his private dwelling. The case of the Milltown vendor has been postponed owing to his absence from town, while the vendor in the shiretown has had his license taken away.

"It is very doubtful if the Chief Inspector would not have been satisfied and that justice would not have been served if merely the fines had been struck but apparently the local magistrate could not see it that way with the result that all vendorships are cancelled and even the doctors cannot get their lawful prescriptions filled. One doctor desiring liquor for a pneumonia patient yesterday was unable to secure it from the vendors and was forced to have it come in from distance."

In Saint John.
Activity in Saint John also is reported. The Chief Inspector, W. L. McFarlane, was asked there within the past day or two if there was truth in the report that some of the present Saint John vendors would not receive renewals of licenses. He replied that there was a lot of truth in it.

Alteration in Regulations
The one-way street regulation in effect since last spring on Saturday after 6 p. m. as far as Queen street is concerned, is no longer in effect. Until further notice the ordinary traffic regulation will be in effect. The falling off in tourist traffic and decrease in the number of outside cars at this season is assigned as the reason for the withdrawal of the one-way street rule.

ARRESTED HERE
WANTED IN SUSSEX

After Escaping From Industrial Home in May Last Committed Several Thefts in the County of Kings.


Roy Martin or Michael Roy Martin, the boy who was arrested here for the theft of \$32 from Olive Bernard, also an employ of Miss Ada M. Schleyer, florist, has a varied criminal record according to advices received from outside points. Martin escaped from the Boys' Industrial Home to which he has been returned, early in May last, and had been able to escape detection and arrest in various parts of the Province until he stole the savings of his fellow-employee here.

Warrant Held at Sussex.
The Chief of Police of Sussex by communication has stated that he has a warrant for the arrest of Martin who at various places in King's County during the summer stole money, a bicycle, a wrist watch and other articles. The thefts were from different people.

The supposition is that Martin was able to induce people to befriend him or employ him and then abused their confidence.

Recognized Other Escaped Boys.
After his arrest and after he was handed over to Supt. Parker of the Boys' Industrial Home for return to that Institution, Martin informed the Superintendent that he had seen Charles Chase and John Jones, boys who had escaped from the Home, in Fredericton. These boys were caught by the police a short time afterward and are now in York County Gaol awaiting their return to the home. Supt. Parker is to arrive by boat today for the boys.
