Waiting to See What Hornsby Does Next Season in League.

St. Louis, Dec. 27-Sam Breadon, the trade of Manager Rogers Hornsby be subsiding.

Three irate fans leaped on the runbile last Tuesday night and shouted reproaches at her until a policeman appeared.

"Aside from that incident and the fact that someone tied crepe on my office door and several dozen have written me anonymous letters, we have not been troubled," Breadon said. "As opinion is a fickle thing. You know I've even heard them razz Hornsby.'


