

CRIMINAL
CASES FOR COURTS
IN JANUARY

Charges Ranging From
Theft to Manslaugh-
ter—Both County and
Circuit Courts Avail-
able for Trials.

York County and the City of Fred-
ericton between them have produced
an imposing array of criminal busi-
ness for trial before the courts meet-
ing in this city in January. Both the
York County Court meeting on the
second Tuesday and the Court of
King's Bench meeting on the third
Tuesday are available for these cases
but the time which will elapse is
hardly sufficient to get all the cases
ready for the County Court which it
can try. Consequently the Court of
King's Bench must try some of them.

Wide Range of Charges.

There is a wide range of charges.
The most serious is that of man-
slaughter. Two cases are of theft,
liquor being taken in each case. There
also is a charge of indecent assault on
a little girl and the possibility of a
like charge in connection with a little
boy. In addition there is an appeal
from a conviction of operating a motor
vehicle while under the influence of
liquor.

The Various Cases.

James McGillivuddy of Newmarket
now out on bail will face the charge
of manslaughter for the death of
Rose Miller, a little girl living at Cen-
tral Kingsclear, who died after being
struck by the car operated by him.

William Langley of Fredericton is
now in goal, will be tried for indecent
assault on a little girl.

Seymour Chase of this city will face
trial for burglary at the Quality Phar-
macy where liquor and other goods
were stolen.

Norman Fletcher and William Fair-
ley of McGivney Junction will face
trial for the theft of twenty-two cases
of liquor while in transit on the C. N.
R. having been committed for trial
today.

The appeal from conviction of oper-
ating a motor vehicle while under the
influence of liquor is made by a man
named Sprey of Blackville.

The charge against Clovis J. Bac-
harache of Shediac in which prelimi-
nary examination is to begin next Tues-
day, may result in still another charge
of assault on a little boy.

"reek"Harvey highway and per-
formed his duties in a most efficient
manner. His death is deeply re-
gretted and there is much sympathy
for the widow and family. The funeral
took place on Sunday and was
largely attended.

V. Fenton, was entertained by
about thirty of his friends last
evening at the Birches. A splendid

at a late hour. The party made the

FLETCHER AND
FAIRLEY SENT
UP FOR TRIAL

Counsel for the Defence
Contended No Theft
Proven — Three Wit-
nesses Examined This
Morning.

Police Magistrate Walter Limerick
this morning sent up for trial on a
charge of theft, Norman Fletcher and
William Fairley, both of McGivney
Junction. The men are half-brothers.
They are charged with having stolen
twenty-two cases of liquor in transit
by C. N. R. to the New Brunswick
Liquor Commission here, on or about
December 12th. The liquor was Cana-
dian rye whiskey and cocktails.

J. B. Dickson who appeared as coun-
sel for the accused applied for their
discharge on the ground that the theft
had not been proven. P. J. Hughes, K.
C., for the prosecution asked for their
commitment and the Magistrate decid-
ed that the evidence was sufficient to
send the men up to a higher court for
trial. The two previously had decided
for trial by jury.

Evidence Taken This Morning.

Witnesses examined this morning
were three in number Conductor Al-
bert J. Jessault of Moncton, John
Ward of Taymouth and Lorne Fairley
brother of William Fairley one of the
accused.

Conductor Jessault told of the move-
ments of the car in which the liquor
was transported and from which it
was taken.

John Ward was an employe of
Thomas McLaggan in the lumber-
woods. He told of the two accused
coming to the camp the morning after
the alleged theft. He was examined
particularly on the point of one of
the accused having particularly large
shoepacks and said that he noticed
them.

Lorne Fairley, half-brother of
Fletcher and brother of William Fair-
ley also was examined.

POSTMASTER

Is Leaving Tonight for
Saint John—Political

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster Gen-
eral, paid his first visit to Fredericton
since elevation to the Federal Cab-
inet, Monday night. The Postmaster
General arrived by the late C. N. R.
train and went at once to the Queen
Hotel.

Today he has been a centre of at-
traction for many and his entire time
has been taken up chiefly by confer-
ences on political matters. For much
of the time he has been in private
conference in his room.

Hon. Mr. Veniot is being interview-
ed not only by members of his party
in Fredericton and vicinity but also
by a number from more distant por-
tions of the Province.

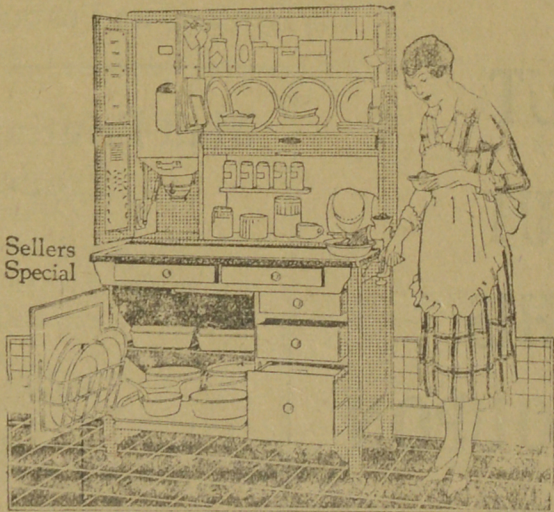

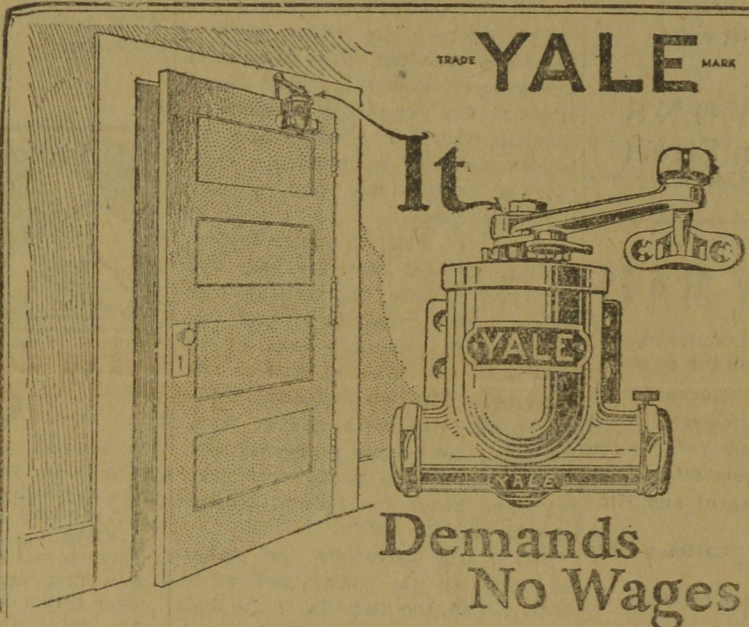
