MR. DOUCET ISSUES STATEMENT IN REGARD TO HIS CHARGES; HIS COUNSEL ALSO SPEAKS

Toronto, Aug. 6—The Star today
published under date of Notre Dame,
N. B., a statement by A. J. Doucet,
ex-M. P., in regard to the Royal Com-
mission's inquiry at Quebec into the
cruise of the customs cutter Margaret.

The statement is as follows:

"I have no withdrawal to make. The
statements which I made during Mr.
Meighen's tour of the Maritimes I am
prepared to substantiate; in fact they
are pretty well substantiated by the
evidence that has been given by Mr.
Lapointe," continued Mr. Doucet. "I
haven't seen an official report of the
proceedings, nor have I seen the news-
paper reports as yet. All I know about
it, except what you have read to me, is
that I received a telegram from my
counsel, Hon. L. G. Belley, from Que-
bec, telling me not to come, that the
inquiry was finished and the judge
would not hear me as a witness. I
had previously had telegraphic com-
munication with Mr. Calder and also
with Mr. Lapointe and had expressed
the desire to be allowed to give under
oath the correct version of just what
I had said. That privilege has been
denied me by the judge.

What He Said in Tour.

"What I did say in the speeches I
made during Mr. Meighen's tour of
the Maritimes was that the Margaret
had been taken off its regular patrol
duty on Bay Chaleur and had been
taken to Three Rivers, where Mr. Bur-
eau and party were taken on and that
it then went to Quebec, where Mr. La-
pointe and party were taken on. Later
on Anticosti, Magdalen Islands, etc.,
were visited, and Mr. Lapointe has
admitted in his evidence at Quebec
that he was actually on the Margaret.
I said that the Margaret had been
taken off her regular patrol work for a
pleasure trip and I repeat it and say
that the evidence has proven it to be
true. So far as anything about any
joy cruise, or carousal goes, that
seems to have resulted from a lot of
opposition; it was freely talked about
around Ottawa and apparently origi-
nated there, but I made no mention of
that in my speeches while with Mr.
Meighen on his tour of the Maritimes.
There, I have nothing to withdraw."

Statement by Counsel.

Quebec, Aug. 6—The Chronicle-Tele-
graph today was in receipt of a signed
statement by Hon. L. G. Belley, K.
C., as legal representative of A. J.
Doucet, with regard to the investiga-
tion held at the court house here yester-
day morning as a sequel of the
charges made against two former fed-
eral ministers by Mr. Doucet, who al-
leged from the platform that they
had participated in a prolonged "pleas-
ure trip" aboard the Dominion govern-
ment steamer Margaret.

The text of Mr. Belley's statement
is as follows:

"I feel it to be my duty to protest—
having been unable to represent Mr.
Doucet at the investigation, because I
was refused the right to do—against
the declaration made by R. L. Calder,
K. C., who affirmed that there was
nothing in the least reprehensible in
the conduct of a certain federal min-
ister, who is now a senator.

"Mr. Doucet affirmed that a pleas-
ure trip was made in 1923 by Hon. Ja-
ques Bureau on board the Margaret.
He told the truth, although Mr. Bur-
eau calls it an inspection trip. Mr.
Doucet might have added that Mr.
Bureau made the other one in 1924 and
the other in 1925.

"Mr. Doucet has affirmed that Mr.
Bureau was accompanied by a party.
It is the truth. He had with him his
wife, his daughter, his son-in-law, two
of his cousins and his two young sons.

All these trips were made at the ex-
pense of the government, lasted for
weeks and weeks and were on a ves-
sel assigned to patrol duty against
smugglers on the Atlantic coast.

"I am unable to understand how it
is that Mr. Calder, representing the
customs department, can find nothing
reprehensible in those promenades of
a minister on a vessel that has been
taken off her assigned course.

"Public opinion will condemn Mr.
Calder, and it has already condemned
the minister."

VISITORS ARE WELCOME AT THE FOX RANCH

A Local Industry Which
is Hapidly Developing
—Fine Stock Kept by
the F'ton Silver Black
Fox Co.

Citizens of Fredericton when show-
ing strangers about the city and sub-
urbs should not overlook the ranch of
the Fredericton Silver Black Fox and
Fur Company, Limited, on the old
road above town just opposite the
golf links. This ranch, established four
years ago, has developed into one of
the largest and best conducted in the
province. There are now close to two
hundred foxes housed there and they
certainly make a very interesting sight.

Near Golf Links.

The ranch is located on the farm of
Mr. Alphonzo Kelly, who is also the
ranch manager. He old foxes are not
in the best of condition at this time of
year, but the youngsters about one
hundred in all, are remarkably well
developed and very lively giving evi-
dence of the splendid care which they
receive. Their fur is of the highest
quality, the silver being plainly dis-
cernible on all parts of the body. In
several cases the litters run as high as
six, which shows that the stock hand-
led by the company is very prolific.

Fox ranching is becoming a very
important branch of agriculture in this
section and promises to become more
so as time goes on. Among the suc-
cessful private ranches in the locality
which might be mentioned are those
of Mr. Hazen Everett of Kingsclear,
Mrs. Helen Carlisle and Mr. Havelock
Gordon of Keswick and Richard Sloat
of Nashwaak and Percy Gerow of this
city. It costs very little to feed the
animals and they develop very rapidly
being fully matured when less than
one year old.

There is one thing which can be
said in reference to raising fur in
captivity which does not apply to
wild stock. The animals can be killed
and the pelts disposed of when in the
pink of condition, whereas in the case
of fur bearing animals taken in traps
there is no choice, the trapper being
compelled to take whatever comes
along.

Mr. Kelly the managed of the Fred-
erickton Silver Black Fox and Fur Com-
pany's ranch is always pleased to
welcome visitors and show them over
the ranch. Farmers who may be in-
terested in fur raising are especially
invited to inspect the ranch.

UNCLE HENRY BREAKS INTO THE MOVIES

Veteran Guide of This
City was Filmed in a
Canoe at Hartts Is-
land Salmon Pool.

Uncle Henry Braithwaite, veteran
big game hunter and trapper of this
city, has broken into the movies. Yester-
day this old master of woodcraft
was taken by auto to the Hartt's Is-
land salmon pool, where he was film-
ed by Messrs. F. Badgley and S. Hol-
lebone of the Canadian Government
Motion Picture Branch. These gentle-
men have been delegated to take mo-
tion pictures of the wonderful scenic
attractions of the Saint John River,
and at the request of Premier Baxter
they will on Tuesday next film the
demonstration to be held at Grand
Falls in connection with the begin-
ning of the development of the great
water power at that place. Messrs.
Badgley and Hollebone arrived here
yesterday, and arranged with Mr. G.
H. Prince, Deputy Minister of Lands
and Mines, to take movies of the sal-
mon pool at Hartt's Island. Mr. Ray-
mond Currie and several other local
anglers were willingly called into ser-
vice and had no difficulty in prevailing
upon Uncle Henry to join the party. A
splendid film was taken of the party in
the act of fishing from canoes, and a
special film was taken of Mr. Braith-
waite and Mr. Raymond Currie while
they were in the act of piloting a
canoe through a stretch of quick
water. Uncle Henry handled the stern
paddle and it is scarcely necessary to
say that he was right at home on the
job despite his eighty-six years. The
old gentleman enjoyed the fun im-
mensely and afterwards declared that
it brought back to him the good old
days and made him feel about ten
years younger. Mr. Braithwaite has to
his credit seventy years experience of
woodcraft, and is regarded as the best
authority on native wild animals in
the Dominion. Noted big game hun-

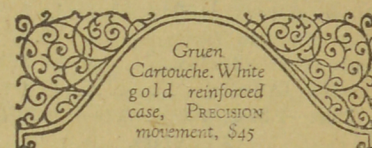
