

SUCCESS OF PREMIER POINCARE OF FRANCE IS REMARKABLE; FIVE BIG MEASURES PASSED

Paris, France, Aug. 18—Now that the legislature has adjourned it is possible to make a new estimate of the financial situation of France.

Premier Poincare has obtained a remarkable political success. He has completely mastered the unruly party groups and obliged them to vote the measures he desired. In addition he has obtained success in the foreign exchange market where he has forced the franc up from the rate of fifty to the dollar to thirty-three to the dollar.

Much remains, however, to be done. The franc is again falling, though gently. Inflation has not really been stopped. On the contrary it has been specifically authorized for certain purposes. Stabilization of the currency has been postponed indefinitely. The British and American debt agreements have not been ratified. Therefore, foreign credits are not available and the treasury remains exposed to the first new panicky crisis that may be caused by holders of short term bonds who run to the banks for reimbursement.

All these may well be grave considerations.

What Poincare Has Accomplished.

Exactly what has the Poincare government accomplished? It has forced five measures through the French legislature. Those five measures are:

1. Tax increases have been voted amounting to 3,000,000,000 francs (\$90,000,000) in the rest of this year and 7,000,000,000 francs (\$210,000,000) next year. These taxes not only insure the balancing of the budget but will give a surplus estimated at 3,000,000,000 francs.

2. A sinking fund for payment of the floating debt has been formed. This fund amounts under constitutional guaranty to 3,000,000,000 francs.

francs a year, furnished from the profits of the tobacco monopoly and the tax on real estate transfers or from the budget itself should there be a deficit in those sources. At the same time the monopoly will be placed on a more efficient basis and tobacco shares to a capital value of about 25,000,000,000 francs (\$750,000,000) may eventually be issued to the public. In this connection it is necessary to recall that the floating debt reimbursable with one year is 60,000,000,000 francs (\$1,800,000,000).

Banking Laws Amended.

3. The Bank of France has been authorized to buy gold and silver and foreign currency at market rates with bank notes which may be issued without limit for that purpose. But the bank notes thus issued must be destroyed if the gold and the foreign currency thus acquired are resold. The purposes of this measure are to tempt peasants to turn in the gold which they are hoarding and to form funds for intervention on the exchange market in favor of the franc and to assist in the repatriation of French capital which has been sent abroad.

4. The discount rate has been raised from 6 per cent to 7½ per cent. The aim in this case is to restrict the volume of business and force down prices without at the same time provoking large reimbursements of short-term bonds.

5. The government has been authorized to effect administrative economies by decrease.

"Confidence" Is the Corner Stone.

All these measures were features of the so-called experts' plan, but notification of the foreign debt agreements as a preliminary to obtaining foreign credits was the corner stone of the experts' plan, and that has been omitted.

The truth is that the entire Poincare plan is based almost entirely on the psychological factor of confidence. As long as confidence continues, all may go well. If confidence wavers, the entire plan may collapse. Then something different must be tried.

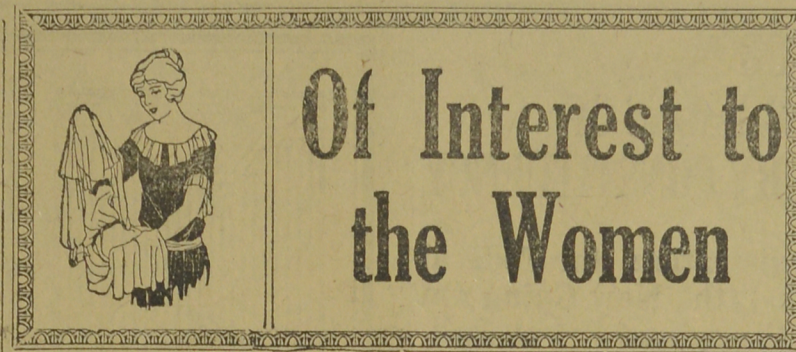

Of Interest to the Women

BEEF AND ONION RELISH.

2 cups chopped and pickled beets
1 cup onions, cut into slices
2 tablespoons salad dressing
Separate the thinly sliced onions to form rings; mix with the chopped beets and salad dressing of choice.

When persons do not like raw onions, use a cup of finely shredded cabbage instead.

VEGETABLE LOAF.

3 cups grated fresh corn
3 cups mashed potatoes
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
1 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper or seasoning to taste
2 eggs
1 teaspoon grated onion or a little grated nutmeg

To the hot mashed potatoes add the grated corn, butter, seasoning. Beat the eggs until light, keeping 1 teaspoon to brush the top of loaf add to the mixture and mix lightly. Brush baked loaf with butter or margarine; put in the mixture; smooth the top and brush with the egg. Place in moderate oven and bake 30 minutes or until a nice brown. Serve with tomato sauce made as usual.

A GOOD HOT WEATHER DISH— EGGS STANLEY.

4 eggs
1 tablespoon bacon drippings or butter
4 tablespoons milk
1 tablespoon chopped parsley or green pepper
4 tablespoons breadcrumbs
4 slices of toast
½ teaspoon salt
Pepper to taste
Beat the eggs and milk until light. Put the drippings in pan; when hot pour in the eggs very slowly, stirring constantly; add the breadcrumbs. This mixture must be very fluffy. Serve on squares of toast and sprinkle with chopped parsley or green pepper.

ANOTHER GOOD HOT WEATHER DISH.

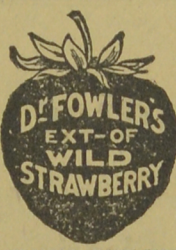
4 hard boiled eggs
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1½ cups milk
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon grated onion
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Put the butter or margarine, onion and green pepper into fry pan; fry a few moments, but do not brown; add the flour; mix well and add the cold milk slowly, boil 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Cut the eggs in half and separate. Rub the yolks through coarse strainer and add to the sauce. Cut a thin slice from the end of the whites so they will set firmly on a round piece of toast, then pour the thick sauce in and cover the whites. Dust with paprika and garnish with parsley.

BOILED SALAD DRESSING.

(By Request)

1 egg
2 tablespoons of vinegar
2 tablespoons of water
2 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons mustard
2 teaspoons salt
A dash of pepper
Mix all together, then cook over hot water, stirring constantly until it is of the consistency of cream.

FRENCH DRESSING.

½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons oil
2 tablespoons vinegar
Put all the ingredients into a clean bottle and shake well. This may be used with lettuce or it may be used to season other salads.

COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD.

1 pound cottage cheese
2 tablespoons finely cut chives
2 tablespoons peppers or parsley
1 teaspoon salt
5 stuffed olives
1-2 cup dressing
4 cups shredded lettuce
Mix the cheese, chives, peppers and salt together. If too dry add cream. Mash until smooth. Line a bowl with the lettuce and pile the cheese in centre. Add the olives cut into rings, and sprinkle with parsley and paprika.

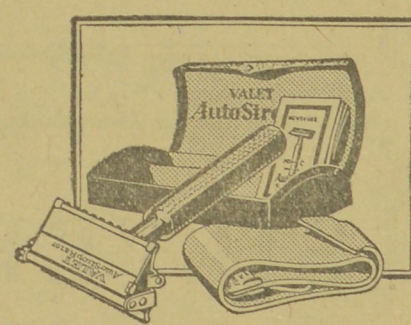
