DEVELOPMENT OF CHIVALRY ON THE SEA A HAPPY SIGN

(Toronto Globe.)

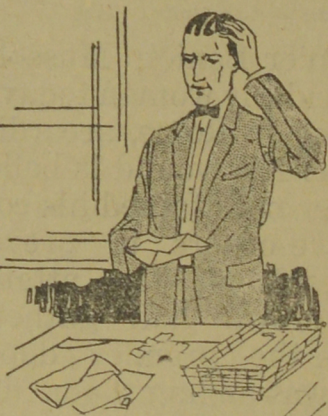
A new chivalry of the sea, made possible by the development of aerial communication, is attracting the attention and compelling the admiration of mankind. In the past few months, when devastating storms sweeping the ocean have shattered shipping and placed great vessels bearing countless lives in jeopardy, the world has had numerous instances of heroism manifested by men whose occupation it is to navigate the deep. The most signal illustration of the community of spirit which actuates seamen when perils from the elements threaten them was, perhaps, that given a few weeks ago when the United States liner Roosevelt during four days stood by a dismantled British freighter and after almost incredible difficulties and dangers rescued the crew of the doomed vessel from death in the waves. That demonstration of intrepidity by the Captain and sailors of the Roosevelt, continued as it was over so long a period, kept the nerves of two continents in tension and thrilled the heart of the world.

The task achieved by the Roosevelt other vessels may be called on to attempt tomorrow, and we may be assured that in that event similar resolution and equal courage will mark their efforts. It any such assurance were required, it was given in the gallant race of four ships on the last day of March to the aid of the stricken freighter Laleham, in deadly peril in mid-ocean with thirty-seven of a crew on board. The call for help seems to have reached two great passenger vessels, the Cunarder Mauretania and the George Washington of the United States Line, and two other smaller vessels, the tanker Shirvan and another freighter whose name is as yet unknown, at about the same time. No second call was needed. The response by all four ships was immediate, and was regarded as a matter of course. Full speed ahead was the order in each case, but the haste which they evinced was intended to

spell rescue, not rivalry. The imperilled freighter, which was on the point of sinking, was reached on time, and its crew transferred to safety as the damaged hull was set on fire to prevent it becoming a menace to navigation.

Is not this development of chivalry on the sea a happy sign of the better spirit which is beginning to pervade the nations? In times past heroism on the ocean was associated in the public mind with battle and carnage. The palm for courage went to him who showed the greatest ability to destroy, and the applause of history has remained with those who have shown ruthlessness in spreading death and disaster. If the merchant vessels of the nations continue thus to point the road to helpfulness and good-will on the sea they will not only pave the way for the reduction of naval armament, but they will set an example which may tend to the speedier dissemination of the spirit of peace throughout the world.

CHAPMAN WAS EXECUTED EARLY TODAY

Weatherfield Prison, Conn., April 6—Gerald Chapman, murderer and mail robber, was hanged here early today.

His life was taken by the state in atonement for the killing of Policeman James Skelly at New Britain on October 12, 1924.

The actual business of final justice required but a few minutes. The hour of midnight having passed and the murderer's last reprieve running out with the day, prison officials, accompanied by newspaper men and physicians walked through a high-vaulted echoing passage to the death chamber.

The door leading to the death cell opened and Chapman preceded by Rev. Father Barry, who held a crucifix aloft, and guarded on either side stepped into the room. A guard passed a strap around Chapman's legs, above the knees and with an almost simultaneous motion other guards slipped a black satin cap over his head. The noose was adjusted. The warden gave a signal as a foot pressed a release, in a corner of the room, the slack of the rope whipped up once and again and the murderer had paid the extreme penalty.

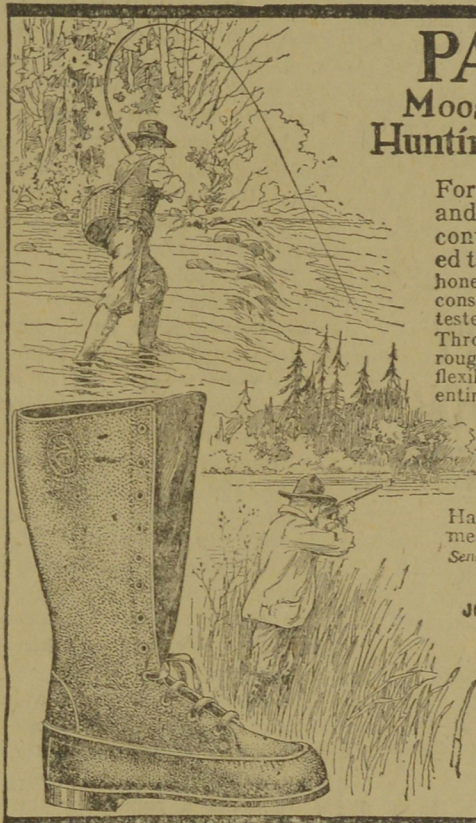

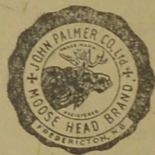
