## THE PAY OF JUDGES.

Federal judges in the United States are now paid \$7,500 per year and there is a bill before Congress to increase their salaries to \$12,500. In commenting on this bill the San Francisco Chronicle says:

"Good sense is back of the bill to increase the salaries of Federal Judges which has just been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee. We want the very highest type of men for the Federal bench. They must be expert lawyers, men of proved acumen and probity and of high standing in the community. And for all of this, in the district courts, we now pay the Judges \$7,500 a year—to rule on cases in which the attorneys may get that much for a single fee!

"It is good business to keep the standards of our Federal courts high and economize, if need be, in other directions. For the Federal courts are, in the last analysis, the very foundation of our system of government."

In Canada judges do not fare too badly. New Brunswick has seven Supreme Court, including two Chief Justices and six County Court judges. The Chief Justices receive \$10,000 per year, while an additional \$1,000 goes to Sir Douglas Hazen for performing the duties of judge in admiralty. The puisne judges receive salaries of \$9000 each, and the judges of the County Court \$5,000 in addition to travelling expenses.

## HARD WORKERS.

Look about you and listen. You will hear from one to a dozen men, every day, complain because they think they are "working so hard." In the same length of time, if you could go into the homes of the people, you would not hear one woman in 25 complain that she works too hard. Wives frequently complain because they have to work too hard. Husbands complain daily.

And the average husband has more fun, more recreation, more amusement in one day out among his kind than his wife can possibly expect. She has housework to do or manage—much of it monotonous. Much of it drudgery. Most husbands have far greater variety in their work. But they complain oftener and louder.

The York-Sunbury branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association at a meeting this week appointed a committee to confer with the Minister of Lands and Mines, with a view of finding some means of curbing the activities of the merganser duck on the fishing streams of the province. This type of duck is very plentiful on the St. John River and is responsible for the destruction of countless thousands of young salmon every year. Merganser ducks also frequent the Nashwaak and Miramichi Rivers and destroy young trout as well as salmon. Although protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty, it is to be hoped that some means can be found for curbing their activities.

A wise Chicago judge sentenced a bad boy to stay in the company of good books. He will work on schedule. His reading will be supervised and he will have to report on what he has done. The Dominion Government paid in gratuities to relatives of deceased judges last year the sum of \$7,166.67. Of this total \$1,500 was paid to the widow of the late Judge Chandler of the New Brunswick Supreme court and \$2,500 to the widow of the late Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice of Canada.

The travelling expenses of the Supreme and County Court judges of New Brunswick last year paid by the Federal Government, totalled \$7,547.28. Judge Slipp of this city whose district includes York, Sunbury and Queens, was the lowest on the list with expenses of \$275.
